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

#### 1994 ILLOWA Show

Several ICOS members participating, the Iowa City Orchid Society exhibit won the Aos award for the best exhibit in the 19th annual ILLOWA Orchid Show, held on April 8-10 The Duck Creek Mall in Bettendorf, Iowa! This prestigious AOS award, which is a beautiful medallion encased in acrylic, will be available for AOS members to see at the May eeting.

John Schwind, Nile Dusdieker, Cathy Wilcox, Laynez Ackermann, and Ann York assisted with the design, set-up, and tear-down of the ICOS exhibit. John Schwind, Nile Dusdieke. Anne Glenister, and Ann York provided the 39 orchid plants that made up the ICOS exhibit, which portrayed a peaceful oriental garden, complete with a Buddha and Chinese lantern.

Eighteen of the ICOS-entered orchids received ribbons, including one first, five seconds, and one third for John Schwind and two firsts, three seconds, and six thirds for Nile Dusc eker. The crchid plants that received ribbons included:

Phal. Hausermann's Fireball 'Meteor'; first: phals, pink with stripes; John Schwind.

Phal. Abendrot 'Evening Pink' x Evening Shade 'York'; second: pink with spots or bars; John Schwind.

Phal. Blanea Grande 'Lehua' x (Hawaiian Cloud x Hakalau 'Queen'); second: phals, white with colored lip, no markings; John Schwind

Sie. Dixie 'Reiko'; second: cattleyas, red; John Schwind.

Phrag. Nitidissimum 'Gleneyrie'; second: allied paph species; John Schwind

P al. Double Delight x Kathleen Ai 'Tokyo Beauty'; second: seedlings, flowering for the first time; John Schwind.

I'val. Hausermann's Candy 'York' x Phal. Lucille Lundberg 'Scott'; third: phals, white with stripes; John Schwind.

Nonna 'Goldilocks'; first: cymbidium hybrids, miniature yellow; Nile Dusdieker.

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## Laelia Laynez! Nope, Cattleya Ackermann: Cattleya purpurata

*Laelia (now Cattleya) purpurata)* is a beautiful species from southern Brazil that blooms late spring. Flowers come in many color forms as Laynez's pictures show. A bit of info from Orchid Wiz below. Nile D

ORIGIN/HABITAT: Brazil. Plants were originally found on the narrow, swampy, coastal plain, but the habitat is now known to extend from just east of Santos southward through the states of São Paulo, Santa Catarina and Rio Grande do Sul to the region south of Porto Alegre. Within this coastal zone, plants are uncommon in the swamp forest, but they are more plentiful in the heavy forest along small creeks, usually below 600 ft. (180 m). The habitat extends some 750 miles (470 km), but it is seldom more than a few miles wide. Laelia purpurata was originally common throughout much of this range. Early visitors to the region reported that plants were so plentiful that they even grew in the sand along the beach. Because of excessive collecting and habitat destruction, however, plants in the wild are now found only in very tall trees in remote, hard-to-reach areas. Miranda (1990) reports that in Rio Grande do Sul plants grow on large old trees a bit inland from the sea, in Santa Catarina they are found on scrubby vegetation growing on rocky hills directly facing the sea, and in São Paulo they grow in swampy areas. -- Source: Charles Baker

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#### Slippers in a Cage:

No this isn't another story about the "Tiger King" who kept wild things (large cats) in cages. This is about our cypripedium bed in the back yard. It used to be larger but several factors changed that. #1 - four legged creatures (deer) and under ground moles did a number on the large original clumps hence the need for cages and the new plants are growing in open slotted baskets buried in the ground. #2 - We lost some critical tree limbs and now late spring sunlight is bright enough to burn the leaves and wilt the plants - hence the shade cloth. New clumps are slowly being established and I will mulch with leaf compost as summer progresses. Here are some Cyp. Hybrids: NILE D

Cyp. x ventricosum (top) natural hybrid from northeastern China, cross calceolus and macranthos - seems hardy.

Cyp. Inge (lower side) cross of 2 continents: American parviflorum by Chinese fasciolatum. Both nice pale yellows.

Cyp. Annegret (below) cross of parviflorum Var. makasin (darker maroon petals) by shanxiense. It has rather unusual coloring for a Cyp. hybrid.
