




What's Going On In the Greenhouse?

As you can see, the greenhouse is FULL and a few things are starting to 'pop'! A couple tips on bringing orchids inside when they have been outside all summer. **Plan your time such that you can look carefully at each plant, spray for bugs and fungus (even if you don't see them - as you can use a stronger spray outside), look and be sure the name tag is intact, and finally remind yourself how the plant likes to grow so you can place it in the proper location.** Next, try to adjust your growing environment for a gentle transition rather than a sudden shock back to your inside conditions. I leave the greenhouse vents and windows open and don't adjust the shade cloth till November. I cut the daylight hours with artificial lights to about 10 hrs. a day from November thru December This tends to stimulate earlier spring blooming. These are some of my techniques, but you don't have to have a greenhouse to apply them. They work as well for growing under lights, a windowsill, or in the basement. GOOD LUCK!

The AOS Centennial Celebration - *Postponed until October 2021*




