

### Andy's François Grehid Finds!

Andy and Will Coghill-Behrends were taking an after-dinner walk on their last evening in a tiny village in Lozére, France, at the end of June. As they approached a horse pasture, Andy pointed to a small plant in their way and excitedly exclaimed "That's it!" Over the course of the next half hour, Andy and Will found about two dozen plants of *Anacamptis pyramidalis* - a fairly common terrestrial orchid in the area, but which usually would have been done blooming by that time of year. (Above) As they were making their way back along the rural road, Andy saw something that he thought was an orchid that had set seed. As they got closer, they realized that it was actually in full bloom... It was the much rarer (and much stranger looking) *Himatoglossum hircinum*, otherwise known as the Lizard Orchid.. It's named *hircinum* because it smells like goat. Glad I didn't try to take a whiff.. (Below)

Cattleya intermedia native to SE Brazil. Below is pure white alba and right is the aquinii form parent for many splash petal hybrids.

Beautiful orange *Guarianthe au*rantiaca from Central America. What is unusual here is the spots on the lip, a know variation.



Cattleya walkeriana native to SE Brazil. It is recognized by the prominent petals that give it a stately rectangular shape. Above alba form and below coerulea or blue form






### LAYNEZ' QUIZ?



# Flying Dragons!

Anyone who knows anything about Dragons, realizes they are formidable but unreliable foes! They fly in groups of 30 to 50 and announce themselves with a subtle sweet musky fragrance. Well this dragon was unusually vexing! I'm speaking of this *Gongora scaphephorus* that spent most of the summer 'sleeping' comfortably in the pergola only to send out a long inflorescence late July with over 40 buds. Lois found a second spike curled in a pot which I gently untangled and it too became pendant with 40 buds. The buds grew and grew and sat there for two weeks. As mentioned above, they fly in groups which means they all open at once. I had so hoped to take them into Chicago for judging but 'no flying' till 3 days later.

The head of the dragon is the dorsal sepal, the wings the recurved lateral sepals and the body is a complex lip with hypochile, epichile and prominent callus. The column sits just under the dorsal sepal and has 2 petals closely attached till near the end. *Can you see the parts below?* This species comes from the wet Amazon rainforest of eastern Ecuador and Peru. Nile Dusdieker

PS these dragons don't bite or spit fire!
