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




# PRESIDENT'S BLURB

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
# PERGOLA SUMMER ACTION,

As many of you know, most of the Dusdieker orchids live outside in our pergola from late May to October. The change in scenery is associated with lots of new growth but not so many blooms. With our isolation this summer, the orchids have received a bit more attention. Almost daily I find something new - a bud, new flower spike, resurrection of a plant that looked like a 'goner', and of course some crown rot and deceased plants as well. I try to inspect each orchid in May when I take them out. Repot those in need, remove diseased leaves, spray with systemic insecticide and drench with fungicide. I check off the plant name and identification number on my excel plant list. I will note if plant was virus tested and negative with date as well as the health of plant and update flowering dates. Interestingly, those orchids that I listed as sickly in May usually were true to form and didn't survive the summer. Enjoy some pictures. Nile

the emerging flower spike into a cascade for perfect presentation. Unfortunately, just as the buds were beginning to open, I noticed some mealybugs had found them. I hand-picked, I sprayed, but in the end my efforts were in vain. I managed to get rid of the bugs, but – in the end – only one of the eight buds on the spike survived. Sometimes no matter how much work you put in, something unexpected can come along and derail your efforts. And so it is with the EIOS Orchid Show and Sale. After receiving feedback from many members of the club, it is clear that the overwhelming sentiment is that we should cancel our October Show and start planning again to come back even better in 2021.

We will also need to find a platform that the club can use for our monthly meetings. Shueyville UMC has let us know that no groups will be using their facilities through at least the end of this calendar year.
