What We Did Last Summer by Nile D

learn how to repot and pickup tips from others that grow similar orchids. One advantage of belonging to a 'live and in person' organization like our club is to be able to interact face to face with other orchid growers and learn each others' tricks!

At the Dusdiekers, Nile wrenched his knee and had a scope to fix it. Not a painless proce-

Sharon Neff and Ben Marion celebrated 50 years of marriage in Keokuk, IA




