

Crested Gecko Care Sheet

Introduction

Housing

1. Enclosure

- Maintain 72-80°F (22-26°C) during the day, slightly cooler at night.
- UVB lighting isn't mandatory but can benefit their overall health.

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- 1. Main Diet
 - Offer commercially available crested gecko diets as the staple. Supplement with live insects like crickets, roaches, and mealworms dusted with calcium + D3 powder.
 - You may choose to offer occasional fruits such as mango, peach, or banana.

2. Feeding Schedule

- Feed juveniles little, but daily. Feed adults every other day. There are multiple commercially available food dishes and cups for proper portioning of mixed food.
- Ensure a shallow dish of water is always available for hydration.

Handling

1. Gentle Approach

- Handle your crested gecko gently and infrequently, especially during the initial acclimation period.
- Avoid grabbing their tail, as it may detach.
- Always support their body properly to prevent injury.

Health

1. Regular Check-ups

- Monitor for lethargy, loss of appetite, or abnormal feces.
