 - a. election judges for the eight days of early voting: <u>Polls Open</u>: Monday, October 26 to Friday, October 30, 10:00 am – 6:00 pm, AND Saturday, October 31, 10:00 am – 3:00 pm, AND Monday, November 2, 10:00 am – 6:00 pm

A training will occur Monday, October 26 at 8:00. I assume that polls closing at 6:00 each day (3:00 on Saturday) will mean that you'll be out of there about 6:30 pm. That means about 40 hours on 'the early week' and another 8 hours on November 2. The pay in June was \$13.00 – I'll confirm that rate on Tuesday before we call.

b. election judges for election day, Tuesday, November 3, 7:00 am – 7:00 pm.
A voter in line at 7:00 pm is allowed to vote, so easily I would assume 8:00 pm is the earliest you would be out of the room. Yep, that's a 12 or 13 hour day. The pay in June was \$13.00 – I'll confirm that rate on Tuesday before we call.

You <u>can</u> do both (a) and (b).

c. election judges for absentee ballots -

Mail-in or Dropped at the County Auditor's ballots are (for the time being) processed on November 2 and November 3. I think it's crazy to think these would not require 20 hours of work. The pay in June was \$13.00 – I'll confirm that rate on Tuesday before we call. You and a Republican will be working together to make sure that an envelope is 'legit' at its receipt, has a matching signature, and has a ballot. To ensure ballot security, every ballot is touched by four average citizens, two Rs and two Ds, before being placed in the hopper for counting (which occurs after the ballots from process (a) and (b) are also verified).
