Preacher's Job Most Important, Ministerial Graduates Told

The preacher's job is the most important one in any community, graduates of the College of The Scriptures, 713 W. Magazine, were told last night.

The speaker was Dr. Leland Tyrrell, president of Winston-Salem Bible College, Winston-Salem, N. C.

"Preaching is the biggest job in the world today. It is the only way to save men's souls," he said.

He listed the chief qualifications for ministers as education, courage, honesty, ambition, and holiness of life.

More Students Than Ever

"This is a proud moment in the history of Negro Churches of Christ, for there has never been a time before when we have had 15 ministry students in any one school," he said.

The college's commencement exercises were in Hill Street Christian Church.

Among the graduates was the Rev. Isaiah H. Moore, Paris, Ky., who has been a minister more than 50 years. He received his doctor-of-theology degree in 1932 from Pikes Peak Theological Semi-

nary, Colorado Springs. His bachelor-of-arts degree was conferred last night.

An instructor at the college, Moore also is pastor of Seventh Street Christian Church in Paris.

"I'm the third pastor of that church in the 80 years of its history," he said.

Won't Tell His Age

A small, cheerful, gray-haired man, Moore wouldn't tell how old he was.

"I'm a single man, you know, and that might go against me sometime," he laughed.

His associates at the college said he was past 70.

Diplomas were presented to the five graduates by Dr. Tibbs Maxey, president of the college.

Other Graduates were:

Bachelor of arts—Fred D. Patterson, Indianapolis.

Bachelor of theology—Cornelius Daniels, Millersburg, Ky.; William Johnson, Germantown, Ky., and Stephen White, Lexington, Ky.

The school, organized in 1945, has 15 full-time students.

Bourbon Pastors Pick Negro for President

Paris, Ky., Jan. 18 (AP) — The 36-member Bourbon County Ministerial Association has elected its first Negro president, the Rev. Isaiah H. H. Moore.

Mr. Moore, pastor of Seventh Street Christian Church, is one of five Negro members of the association. He will be installed as president Monday.

Paris Negro Named President Of Bourbon County Ministers

PARIS, Ky., Jan. 18 (Special) — The Rev. Isaiah H. H. Moore, pastor of the Seventh Street Christian Church here, Monday will become the first Negro ever to hold office as president of the Bourbon County Ministerial Association.

The installation ceremony will be held at the YMCA at 10 a.m.

Other officers to be installed, all of whom are white, include the Rev. Fred T. Moffett Jr., pastor of the First Baptist Church, vice president; the Rev. J. A. Thomas, Link Avenue Pilgrim Holiness Church, secretary-treasurer, and Dr. Floyd Rose, pastor of the Methodist Church, devotional chairman.

The association's membership is made up of pastors of 36 Paris and

Bourbon County churches — 31 white and five Negro.

The Rev. Mr. Thomas, who has been a minister here several years, will succeed the Rev. Harry Lee Wainscott as president.

College Honors Dean as Pastor And Educator

The Rev. Isaiah Moore last night was honored by the College of The Scriptures, 709 Magazine, for his service to the college as dean and his years as a gospel preacher.

Dr. Moore has baptized 4,000 persons. He teaches at the college during the week and serves as pastor of The Seventh Street Christian Church in Paris, Ky., on weekends. He is the first Negro president of the Bourbon County Ministerial Association, an interracial organization.

The college, which trains persons for the ministry, has an interracial faculty and student body.

Victor Maxey, a teacher at the college, was master of ceremonies at the program honoring Dr. Moore at the Central Christian Church, 17th and Jefferson.

New President Has Missions Meeting

The Missions Group of the Hillsboro Church of Christ met on Friday night at the parsonage. Mrs. Madge Griffith, the new president, opened the meeting by reading "The Ten Commandments of the New Year." Mrs. Goldie Blackmore read the third chapter of the Philippians for devotions. She also read an article on commitment to Christ from The Flora Christian and a poem, "Carry On," by Alice Hughes, whose husband died on the mission fields in the Bahamas. Mrs. Blackmore closed her devotions with prayer.

After the secretary's and treasurer's reports, a note of thanks was read from "The Christians' Hour" and also a letter from Mark Maxeys from Japan. Rev. Paul Jones announced that five young people from foreign countries who attend Milligan College in Tennessee will be in the services of the Church of Christ on Feb. 1. They will present the program in the evening. Also a quartet from the College of The Scriptures in Louisville, Ky., will sing at the church one Sunday in March. Rev. Isaiah Moore will be with them.

The meeting was dismissed with prayer by Rev. Jones and the Lord's prayer by the group.

Missionary Rally Slated At Grayson

GRAYSON, Ky.—Announcement was made today of plans for a missionary rally sponsored by Christian Churches and Churches of Christ of the tristate area and Kentucky Christian College March 4 to 6. Morning sessions are scheduled for the college chapel and other sessions will be held in the auditorium of the First Church of Christ, Grayson.

Keynote address will be given Wednesday night by Charles Sublett, superintendent of the Mountain Mission School of Grundy, Va. Chapel of College of The Scriptures To Be Dedicated Sunday Afternoon

The Samuel Buckner Chapel of the new College of The Scriptures building at 4601 Old Shepherdsville Road will be dedicated at 3 p.m. Sunday.

Dean Isaiah Moore will speak at the dedication of the chapel, which is named for a former slave who became a preacher and started a Negro congregation when the slaves left the Cane Pledge Meeting House near Paris during the Civil War.

Each night this week, the college has been dedicating a different room in the \$50,000 building to some noted Kentucky Negro leader. At

7:30 tonight, the O. E. Singleton Music Studio will be dedicated and tomorrow night the Preston Taylor Lounge will be dedicated.

The college moved March 13 into the new building from its former location at 709 W. Magazine. Established here in 1945 primarily for education of Negro church leaders, the school now has an interracial enrollment of 36.

All classes and activities are now being conducted in the chapel building. Men's and women's dormitories, a classroom building, and a library are planned for construction later on the five-acre site.

R. Tibbs Maxey is president of the college.

To Speak For Bible School.

Tibbs Maxey, President of the College of the Scriptures (school for the training of colored young people for the ministry in the Churches of Christ), was graduated from Hillsboro High School in 1928, when his father was the minister of our congregation. Tibbs, at that time, was the first young person from the Hillsboro church to enter the ministry in twenty years. He was educated at Johnson Bible College and Bryan University in Tennessee, and in 1945 he opened the school in Louisville. The school was born from Tibbs' recognition of the great need of an educated ministry among the colored folk to serve New Testament Churches then in existence and to establish new congregations among the people of their own race.

**Dr. Isaiah Moore To Speak Before A
Missions Rally In Garrett Sunday**

Dr. Isaiah Moore, dean of the College of the Scriptures, a school for the training of Negro men for the Christian Ministry, Louisville, Ky., will be the principle speaker Sunday at the Missions Rally starting at 7 p.m. at the First Church of Christ in Garrett.

From a current article about Dr. Moore in the "Christian Standard," it states: "At age 83 Dr. Isaiah Moore still bustles about the streets of Paris, Ky., where he has been preaching for more than 20 years. A small man in pin-striped pants, neat white vest, and black coat, he hurries along the street on foot, taking communion to the sick, and doing his church duties. He teaches many Bible classes for

youngsters. As the children danced down the streets of Hamelin to the Pied Piper's sweet tune, so they follow Brother Moore, who charms them with the Bible stories and songs. He is beloved by the children, marries the young and buries the old."

This is in addition to his duties at the College of the Scriptures. Isaiah Moore preached his first sermon at the age of 13, and when he was 19 years old he had helped to gather together a church of his own.

Besides Dr. Moore, Tibbs Maxey, president of College of the Scriptures, and a male quartet will be at the rally. The public is urged to attend.

2 Highway Accidents

Grandmother Killed In Crash

A 72-year-old Providence woman was dead on arrival at Hopkins County Hospital from injuries suffered in a two-car accident at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday 1.6 miles north of Nebo on US-41A in which two other women were injured.

A short time later, at 2:45 p.m. on the Western Kentucky Parkway one mile west of Nortonville, two Louisville men were injured in another accident, this one involving only one car.

State Trooper John Dugger, who investigated the Nebo crash, reported that Martha Jean Cates, 28, Madisonville route 2, was driving a 1955 Ford station wagon north on 41A when the lower ball joint on the spindle support (the tie rod) on the right front wheel broke. The car went out of control, he said, crossed over into the southbound lane of traffic where it struck a 1965 Rambler being driven south on 41A by Joyce Ann Winebarger, 26, Providence.

The left front and center of

the Cates car struck the left front of the Winebarger car. Mrs. Ruth Ball, 72, Providence, Mrs. Winebarger's grandmother, a passenger in the Winebarger car, was killed instantly in the accident. Possibly the oldest person killed in an Indiana traffic accident this year, 91-year-old Isaiah H. Moore of Louisville, Ky., died Monday night in a three-vehicle crash on U.S. 52 near Lebanon.

Moore was thrown from a car driven by Edward D. Young, 20, also of Louisville, who was hospitalized in poor condition.

Estil W. Johnson, 33, Rt. 8, Liberty, Ky., driver of a second car involved, was injured critically. Another passenger in the Young car was hurt less seriously and the driver of a semi-trailer truck involved was not injured.

Minister killed in 3-vehicle collision

A 91-year-old retired Louisville minister was killed and three other persons were injured Monday night in a three-vehicle collision on U.S. 52 near Lebanon, Ind.

The Rev. Isaiah H. H. Moore, of 5018 Broadmoor Blvd., was killed when he was thrown from a car driven by his grandson, Edward D. Young, 20, of 4309 Silver Leaf Drive. Young was taken to Methodist Hospital in Indianapolis, where he was listed in good condition.

Another passenger in the car, Ronald E. Moore, 21, of Gary, Ind., was taken to Witham Hospital in Lebanon, where he was treated and released.

The driver of the second car, Estil W. Johnson, 33, of Liberty, Ky., also was taken to Methodist Hospital in Indianapolis and was listed in serious condition.

According to Indiana State Police, the two cars collided with a semi-trailer truck that was crossing U.S. 52. The driver of the truck was not injured.

The Rev. Mr. Moore, a native of Tennessee, was reputed to have baptized at least 4,000 persons in his lifetime. He served numerous Negro congregations in Kentucky and Tennessee, including 24 years as pastor of Seventh Street Christian Church in Paris, Ky.

In 1968, at the age of 87, he came to Louisville from Paris to become the first pastor of Prentice Street Christian Church, 1716 Prentice. He served in that capacity until his retirement on Nov. 7.

For many years, he served as dean of the College of the Scriptures on Old Shepherdsville Road, where he was graduated with a bachelor's degree in 1952. He also taught at the college on Wednesday nights and Thursdays, handling classes in logic, Old Testament and Genesis.

He received his doctor of theology degree in 1932 from Pikes Peak Theological Seminary in Colorado Springs, Colo.
