# Dominant Chords in Cycle of 4ths (7 out of 12 keys)

These types of chords, the ones with a letter and 7, create tension that want to resolve. Each "dominant" chord wants to resolve 4 scale tones forward. If the resolution chord is also a dominant chord then THAT chord will want to resolve up 4 scale tones too! The resolution feels more settled when we land on a chord that is NOT a dominant chord, ie C or Am.

These dominant chords are the "MOTOR" of music that keep propelling the music forward.

MEMORIZE this pattern:
B-E-A-D-G-C-F

The rest of the pattern would be:
$\mathrm{Bb}-\mathrm{Eb}-\mathrm{Ab}-\mathrm{Db}-\mathrm{Gb}$ or $\mathrm{F} \#$ then back to $\mathrm{B}-\mathrm{E}-\mathrm{A}$ etc.
