## How do I read the numbers for the chords?

There are 4 numbers. Each number corresponds to a string (It's TAB without the lines!) The bottom number is on the 4th string The number above is on the 3rd, then 2nd, then 1st

The actual number itself refers to the fret

So on a G chord, the 4th string is open and has NO finger on it. This is represented by a "0"

Just to reiterate: A "G" chord is fourth string open, third string 2nd fret, second string 3rd fret, 1st string 2nd fret
