Yes, he is the same Don Rutherford who was part of the Super Team in 2019. Since there were no fivesomes this year, Don reentered the draft pool and was a key choice of Captain Pat. Irv' par on three kept the team from starting over par. That save boosted Pat Dorn into gear. His natural birdie on No.4 scored eagle on the score card and the captain awoke from his long slumber.

"If there is anything I can do to help," Jack performs his lines like a Broadway Tony Award winner, "don't hesitate to ask. I am here for you." This year, the Commissioner took him up on his offer.
