Number 1 at Geneva is the easiest hole on the course. It is listed as the 18th handicap. The Geneva Open has proof. It registered six birdies and fifteen pars on Sunday. With 41 golfers that means over half the field scored par or better. Those of us who bogeyed should be ashamed. Three of those six birdies came from the Tim Hughes team. Blaise Plageman, Nate McCorkle, and Tom Prunte all birdied No. 1 but it only counted as minus 1. It was a great beginning to a sizzling round. Tim Hughes and Vince Gatto the other members of the team help put together a front nine that flamed like a Mell Voll tasty strip steak. Blaise birdied the difficult 4th hole catching a stroke giving his team an eagle tally on the score card. Blaise parred 5 catching another stroke. His blazing hot utensils continued to chop the field like a Japanese chef at a hibachi table and he sautéed the scorecard with a natural birdie on the 6th hole. Another par on 8 left an opening on No. 7 for help and Tim Hughes obliged. Tim's parred 7 carrying a 14 handicap gave the team another net birdie. Blaise played the outward side in 33 strokes and the team finished nine holes with a 7 under score.

The sizzle fizzled slightly on the backside playing the inward nine at 4 under par. After a disappointing par on 12, the easy par 5, Tim Hughes (missing from the photo but not missing on the course) gathered the team on his shoulders and parred holes 13 and 14 getting a shot on each. The "Geneva Factor" was taking a toll playing on their fourth day in a row and having consumed four cases of beer apiece, the team dug deep for their last bit of energy to finish strong. Blaise and Nate both parred the 400 yards 17th hole labeled "The Widow Maker" by John Skunza. With their handicap the team headed to the 18th sporting a 10 under par score. A natural birdie by Blaise on the 445 yards finishing hole and they then signed their score card totaling 61 strokes and looking good to capture the Best Ball title. Blaise closed with a score of 70, the best round of the day.

The Tim Hughes team finished early and gathered around 18 green watching the other foursomes end their round. One by one they were eliminated. Victory was in their sights. Then, out on the fairway, lurking like hungry and

confident beasts, were Ben Lloyd's team. Big guns Nick Boggess and Ron Szymczak prowled the grounds as if protecting Fay Wray (Matt Mazzocco and Ben Lloyd). Ron and Nick both roared to 37's on the backside. Remember Tim Hughes' team opened with three birdies on No. 1? Ben Lloyd's club began with three pars and Nick Boggess bogeyed on the first hole. That bogey got Nick's attention and he followed with a birdie on No.2 and an outward side of 36. Net birdies on the 3rd and 4th holes by Ron whipped the team into gear. Matt Mazzocco closed the front side with two pars catching a stroke on both. A team total of 5 under par after 9 holes meant much work was still needed to catch up.

Szymczak, Mazzocco, and Lloyd provided more than just roars to begin the backside chewing up the course with net birdies on 4 out of the first 5 holes. This set up an exciting climax. Nick Boggess lives for these moments. It is the stuff that created Geneva Legends in the past. Facing a 25 footer to tie for the win, Nick Boggess sunk his putt. A proud grin lit his face like a gorilla around a banana tree. I thought I saw him beat his chest. It was a classic finish.

Third place money went to the team of Jay Green-Mark Spangler-Shawn Dorn-Richie Heskett. They carded a nine under par 63 score.

Next year the co-champions will team to defend their titles. A footnote about this year's Best Ball Tournament came from Legend Vince Gatto who partnered with the Tim Hughes team. He shot an 83 and said, Blaise won't let me drink any alcohol." Hell, he had enough until his first tee shot that his pissing raised the water level of Lake Erie a quarter of an inch. The "B" and "C" players will draft squads to dethrone the champions. Don Rutherford who has been part of six winning teams will be back in the draft pool. He could be the first draft pick.

INDIVIDUALLY SPEAKING

All post Geneva articles have been about team competitions. Here is a piece directed towards individuals who earned honors and wine change without help. It may have been for only one hole but these men exercised precision and masterful execution of their weapons like Samurai Futaba (portrayed by John Belushi) handled his Samurai Katanas sword. The intent of this piece is to give these golfers their due.

Friday at Little Mountain yielded 5 Skins worth \$80 apiece. Mike Pagnanelli captured the first Skin with a birdie 2 on the tough 4th hole, a 166 yard par 3. Out of 44 golfers, six managed par, Pags birdied, and 37 shot over par, big numbers for a par 3. Jay Green won Skin No.2 with his birdie on 7. Nate McCorkle birdied No.9 and Nick Boggess deuced the par 3 No.12 hole. The last Skin of the day came via Mini-Legend Jack Berger when he nailed a 100 yard eagle on 16. His eagle bettered Todd Abdon's birdie. Jack glowed all night like a proud Papa at his first born son's birth and he refused to apologize of his success. For the past 50 years Jack's swing has been compared to Iron Byron and this eagle is a testament how a Byron Nelson swing pays dividends.

As life would have it, Friday swings into Saturday. There are always a few who have no clue Saturday is a new day. For the rest sunrise brings a fresh start and another Skins game. The difference with Saturday's Skins is the field is divided by "A" and "B" players. Twenty-one golfers consisted of the "A" flight and the ante topped at \$210. Six players won seven Skins pocketing \$30 per Skin. Birdies by Blaise Plageman on No.1, Legend Vince Gatto on No.2, and Nate McCorkle on No.4 dug deep into the pot early. Nick Boggess needed a total of 5 strokes with his birdies on 8 and 9 back to back. Mike Pagnanelli started the backside with his Skin on No.10 with a birdie. Irv Schumaker won the final Skin with a birdie on 17, the hole called "The Widow Maker".

The "B" ledger played this way. Twenty golfers battled the course, good luck, and each other for a piece of \$200. It did not take Ben Lloyd long to get his hands on some of the pot. He birdied No.1. Tom Black's birdie on the par 5

seventh hole was a Skin. Mini-Legend Jerry Graves earned his Skin on No.9 with a masterful birdie. The inward side produced two more Skins, one by Craig Marshall's three on the par 4 fifteenth hole. Steve Miller played the 18th hole as if strumming "Fly Like An Eagle" on his Les Paul guitar, not missing a chord for a birdie 4. Those five Skins put \$40 into their pockets.

Five holes were chosen to house the Skill Shots competition. Each hole paid \$50. Blaise Plageman won his half of buck by hitting closest to the pin on No.3. The 9th hole proved extremely generous to Mini-Legend Jerry Graves. Besides his \$40 Skin, he pocketed another 50 bucks by sinking a 35 footer to record his birdie and captured the prize for the longest made first putt. On a personal note, his play on No.9 cost Vince Gatto and myself three press bets, a pocketful of money and plenty of pride. Tim Black hit the closest to the pin on his second shot designated to the 13th hole and Keith Boggess staked his tee shot on 16 to win that closest to the pin award. The longest drive on No.11 was hit by Mountain Man Nate McCorkle.

I wish to take this opportunity to comment on the longest drive. Year after year this accomplishment seemed automatic. It felt like Don Jander won every time. The last couple years Don has been a scratch opening the gates for someone else. In 2020, Shannon Boothe drove the farthest on 11 fairway and this year Nate won. Should we thank Don? Without Jander something is missing from the Geneva tournament. We became aware last November how eerie the Masters without the roar of the gallery echoing through the magnolias and gardens of azaleas. That same emptiness is felt in Geneva without Jander's hearty laughter crooning through the oak and maple trees, harmonizing with the beat of the woodpeckers. Here is hope Don returns even if he makes wining longest drive unattainable.

A TRIBUTE TO AN INFLENTIAL 3

JOE B, WELBY, and G

So many traditions, so many highlights during a Geneva weekend. Each participant adds more nuggets with every act. This piece is about three men who played an important role in shaping Geneva, Joe Casa (aka Joe B), Mark Markovich (aka Welby), and Gary Miller (aka G). These men left their mark, introducing new concepts which have withstood time and we continue to practice today. Unfortunately, these men were taken from this world too early. They may be gone but I intend to be sure they are not forgotten.

If anyone exemplified Geneva's behavior, Welby would be the example. He could be the Geneva poster emblem for both its golf and late night partying. That skinny dude who could hide behind a telephone pole and not be spotted, pounded down spirits glass for glass with anyone. Puffing on cigarettes and blowing smoke like a steam engine, he left a dent in a bottle of 7 Crown at every bar on the strip. Seven and Sevens were his drink. Though he was not the first to portray a constant thirst for Geneva's nightlife, he may have been the best. Jay Green talking about Geneva once said, "Golf gets in the way of a good drunk." Not so with Welby. He returned to his room at 3 A.M. every morning after the saloon doors were locked, the chairs sat atop the tables, and alcohol was no longer served. The following morning you would find Welby at Mary's Kitchen soon after they opened, preparing to do it all over. Hungover like Dolly Parton's breasts, he would stumble to the first tee and still play "A" caliber golf. He was a man who consistently overcame "The Geneva Factor" and never complained no matter how bad his head hurt. Any animosity or frustration with any person, place, or thing remained bottled inside him. He never met a man or a liter of 7 Crown he didn't like. The young guns who follow in Welby's footsteps today, need to toast this man for creating this Geneva trail.

Geneva grew into a three day event because of the initiative of G. Just a year or two before the new millennium, G landed a job in the Cleveland area. During his short stint on the North Coast, the idea of golf on Geneva Eve ate away at him. Unfamiliar with Northeast Ohio courses, he contacted Joe B. Together they scoured the available venues and G made tee times at Manakiki. The success

of year 1 brought on a year 2, then 3, and 4. Friday's players grew with each year and soon nearly all of Geneva's field played. The growth occurred during the Tiger Woods phenome which peaked interest in golf. Manakiki made it difficult to secure so many tee times and the Commissioner grabbed the baton and raced to new horizons. Hemlock Springs in Geneva served as host for several years before the concept of rotating tracks began. Eventually, the official tournament expanded to three days. Personality wise, G was easy going and always enjoyable company. Little rattled him. Mike Weilbacher recalls and later verified by Jay Green, while returning home from Geneva one year, a group of motorcyclists weaved in and out of traffic like a swarm of bees causing a more erratic drive. G's bags were not so securely tied to the luggage rack. The strap gave way and G's clothes ended on the berm of I-90 West. Instead of retrieving his belongings, G laughed and said something about a homeless guy in Cleveland will be wearing his clothes. There was a sense of pride to help the poverty stricken.

Another tradition credited to G and his friend Joe B is the practice of giving away Geneva participating favors. They collaborated with Legend Fritz Ford and each year the Geneva field received a new golf towel. Their complimentary contributions were quality productions. Each version differed in color and design but never lacked style. After years of towels, the Merchandise Committee adopted an alternate plan and the towels have been replaced by diverse products, most recently yetis, coolers, lounge chairs and clubbrellas.

Joe B had one more Geneva dream. Influenced by Lord Stanley's Cup, he commissioned me to have such a trophy constructed to be passed each year to the winners of the three day event. Several hundreds of dollars invested from Joe B's pocket were donated for the project. The perception of a trophy capable of holding a fifth of tequila for the champions and their comrades to gargle in triumph could not quite be fulfilled. Still, the trophy stands proud and glorious like the Statue of Liberty and is an honorable representation for the fireplace mantel after a spectacular week at golf.

I tried naming the trophy the Joe B Cup but he would not have it. His success in business was evident among his colleagues but never towards his friends. At a Commissioner's Dinner when held at the Restaurant Lounge he ordered a round of Cuervo Gold for the table of 28. Embarrassed about the fact

he could not show his appreciation to his Geneva family when told they did not have 28 shot glasses. He calmly looked the manager in the eye and said "Get 'Em". As nice of a guy as Joe B was I believe he could have backed down Saddam Hussein. Just minutes later we toasted another successful Geneva trip with shots of Cuervo Gold. Despite all his success, he stayed close to his long time buddies and politely thanked us in his humble way whenever invited. An avid biker, Joe B would render his car keys to John Skunza after Sunday golf and bicycled 75 miles home.

These three remarkable men left behind a Geneva Legacy still cherished today. The first year after Welby's death the Geneva caps had an inscription which read "Play Like Welby". The champion's hats given to the Best Ball winners had inscribed "Played Like Welby". Those who knew these men miss them. The unfortunate who missed these men are now introduced. Anyway we look at it, Joe B, Welby, and G are still a part of Geneva.

ANOTHER OVERTIME FINISH

You may have read about the exciting finish of THE BEST BALL TOURNAMENT and the ending of THE SCRAMBLE is proof history does repeat itself. As Yogi Berra proudly said, "It's déjà vu all over again." Nick Boggess lives for these moments. It is the stuff that created Geneva Legends in the past. Facing a 25 footer for the win, Nick sunk his putt. A proud grin lit his face like a gorilla around a banana tree. I thought I saw him beat his chest. It was a classic finish. Don Rutherford caught the spectacular putt from putter to hole and the boastful reaction. It goes to show we come to expect sensational play from Nick Boggess.

The roar from the crowd could have scared the King of the Jungle but on this day, the loudest cheers came an hour earlier. There was an earth shaking uproar from behind the 9th green when Tony McGuckin knocked his tee ball nearly pin high twenty feet or so from the hole. The initial shouts from the onlookers were followed by the chant "Jelly! Jelly! Jelly!" These were songs of praise and Tony ate it up. Not to displease his fans, Mr. McGuckin knocked in the putt. The enormous voice explosion preceded another chorus of "Jelly! Jelly!"

Why was the mob yelling "Jelly! Jelly! Jelly?" Tony McGuckin was more than happy to explain. When he was much younger in the youth of his life, friends called him Jelly Bean. They told him his head was shaped like the Easter candy. Some nicknames from our past stick to us until the day we die.
