American Alumroot (Huechera americana) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Part Sun/Shade Soil: Rich moist; drought tolerant Flower: Panicle cream, green, orange or purple Bloom time: June-August Height: Low to the ground; flower stalk 1-2 feet Attracts: Pollinators, specialized Bees, i.e., Colletid or short tongued bees. Special: Adds multi season interest spring through fall. A good container plant. Use along driveways and paths, rock or shade gardens. Roots contain the mineral substance alum (used as a dye fixative). Resistant to Black Walnut (juglones), deer, and rabbits. Native to Eastern & Central US Anise Hyssop (Agastache foeniculum) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Full/Part Shade Soil: Dry/Well drained/moist Flower: Light purple spire Bloom time: June-September Height: 2-4 feet Attracts: Butterflies, Bumblebees, Hummingb. Tespecial (It av) it is lectar source of long tongued bees such as Bumblebees. Leaves have been traditionally used for tea. Fragrant leaves, stems, flowers (smells of licorice). Pollinators LOVE this plant. Good for cut flowers. Deer & drought tolerant. Native to Central US

Appalachian Mountain Mint (Pycnanthemum flexuosum) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Full Sun to Part Shade Soil: Good drainage/Moist to occasionally dry Flower: White, purple/lavender. Bloom time: June-August Height: 2'-3' tall; 1'-3' wide Attracts: Bees, butterflies, moths and wasps. Deer and rabbit resistant. Larval host: Gray Hairstreak Butterfly and Wavy Lined Emerald Moth. Special: Traditional uses include medicinal. Nectar source for Black Swallowtail butterfly. Fall color (red/burgundy). Good in coastal gardens. Native to Southeastern US

Arrowwood Viburnum (Viburnum dentatum) **Perennial** (Shrub) **Sun:** Sun/Part Shade **Soil:** Moist/Well drained **Flower:** White **Bloom time:** Late Spring/Early Summer **Height:** 5-10 feet **Attracts:** Butterflies, Native Bees, Songbirds **Special:** Dark bluish-black drupe fruit. Tolerates variety of soils. Broadleaf. Good specimen for hedges. Native to Maine

Bee Balm (Monarda fistulosa) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Full/Part Shade Soil: Dry/Well drained/moist Flower: Very light purple Bloom time: July-August Height: 2-5 feet Attracts: Butterflies, Bumblebees, Hummingbird Moths, Hummingbirds Special: Favorite nectar source of long tongued bees such as Bumblebees. Leaves have been traditionally used for tea. Fragrant leaves, stems, flowers. Remains fragrant after drying. Pollinators LOVE this plant. Native to Maine

Black Chokeberry (Aronia melanocarpa) **Perennial** (Shrub) | **Sun:** Full **Soil:** Tolerant of a variety of soils **Flower:** White w/dark pink stamens **Bloom time:** May-June **Height:** 3-10 feet **Attracts:** Bumblebees, Native bees **Special:** Bees, Dark Blue Berries Small shrub with glossy green leaves. Autumn interest as the leaves turn orange, red & purple. Native to Maine

Black Eyed Susan (Rudbeckia hirta) Short Lived Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Full, Full, Full Soil: Dry (acidic) Flower: Yellow (dark centers) Bloom time: August-September Height: 1-3 feet Attracts: Bees, Bumblebees, Butterflies, Syrphid & Tachinid Flies, Wasps, Birds Larval Host: Gorgone Checkerspot, Bordered Patch butterfly Special: Nectar seeking pollinators. A favorite of a wide variety of pollinators. Will self-seed easily. Grows in disturbed 'hot spots' Zone 5a. Native to Maine

Blue Vervain (Verbena hastata) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Full/Part Shade/Shade Soil: Damp/Moist to Wet Flower: Purple (space) | Floom time: July-September Height: 2-5 feet Attracts: Bees, Bumblebees, Butterflies, Birds | Floom time: July-September Height: 2-5 feet Attracts: Bees, Bumblebees, Butterflies, Birds | Floom time: July-September Height: 2-5 feet Attracts: Bees, Bumblebees, Butterflies, Birds | Floom time: July-September Height: 2-5 feet Attracts: Buckeye. Traditionally used in herbal medicine. Understated, plant may be used in a rain garden or naturalized wet areas. Native to Maine

Bristly Sarsaparilla (Aralia hispida) Perennial (Shrub) | Sun: Full/Part Shade Soil: Moist/Medium Wet Flower: White/Green radial Bloom time: June-July Height: 4 feet Attracts: Bumblebees, Wasps, Native bees Special: Native Bees. Green as it it is all in an open habit. Very interesting globes of flowers that become dark blue berries. Fall interest as the spent flower stems and flower heads turn purple. Native to Maine

Brome-like Sedge (Carex bromoides) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Part Shade Soil: Moist to Wet **Flower:** Green fading to light brown **Bloom time:** May-July **Height:** Up to 1' with slightly larger spread Attracts: Butterflies and Songbirds Special: Wet soil. Clump or tussock forming. Native to Maine Bunchberry (Cornus canadense) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Full/Part Shade/Shade Soil: Humus rich (woodland) Flower: Green sepals; white bracts Bloom time: May-September Height: 6-8 inches (groundcover) Fruit: Bright red berrie in fall At race: Native bees, birds, large & small mammals. Sepals burgundy colored in fall. Prefered and Look, sol, sol, sol, sol, solland native. Often found in seasonal succession with Winterberry, Canada Mayflower, Partridgeberry, Low Bush Blueberry, Goldthread, Starflower (in that order) with Bunchberry as the last to bloom. Native to Maine Butterfly Weed (Asclepias tuberosus) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Full Sun Soil: Well drained/Sandy/Drought Tolerant Flower: Orange; Umbel of many small flowers Bloom time: August-September **Height:** 1-2 feet **Attracts:** Hummingbirds, Butterflies, Ants **Special:** Larval host Grey Hairstreak, Monarch Butterflies. One of the Milkweeds and the showlest native plants with its bright orange flowers. Traditionally used as a medicinal by indigenous people. Deer resistant. Native to Maine Buttonbush (Cephalanthus occidentalis) Perennial (Shrub) | Sun: Full Sun Soil: Consistently moist/Rich Flower: Small fragrant tubular flowers on round clusters Bloom time: June-September **Height:** Up to 12'-20' feet & 8' wide **Attracts:** Every pollinator! **Special:** Attracts as many pollinators as the non-native/invasive Chaste Tree (Vitex) & Butterfly Bush (Buddleia). Enjoyed by a wide variety of wildlife, including waterfowl, birds and mammals. Mildly deer resistant. Native to Maine

Cardinal Flower (Lobelia cardinalis) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Full Sun Soil: Moist/Wet, Loam, Clay or Sandy Flower: Red (8" terminal spikes w/multiple flowers) Bloom time: July-October Height: 1'-6' feet Attracts: Hummingbirds Special: Hummingbirds are the principal pollinator. Spectacular plant of river, pond and wetland edges. Prefers wet areas but grows in a variety of soils. One of very few truly deep red native flowers. Native to Maine

Clustered Mountain Mint (Pycnanthemum muticum) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Full Sun to Part Shade Soil: Moist to medium, well drained Flower: Pink Bloom time: July-September Height: 1'-3' upright stems Attracts: Native Bees, Honeybees and Bumble Bees, Butterflies Special: Traditional uses include tea and medicinal. Lovely scent of mint. Use in meadows and open spaces. Native to Southern Maine

Common Milkweed (Asclepias syriaca) **Perennial** (Herbaceous) | **Sun:** Full Sun **Soil:** Moist (but may grow in a variety of soils) **Flower:** Umbel with up to 100 flowers per head. **Bloom time:** June-August **Height:** 3-6 feet **Attracts:** Over 450 different lifeforms **Special:** Larval host to many species of insects including Monarch Butterfly; fragrant, HUGELY beneficial plant. Milkweed is a food, nesting and larval host to over 450 different species of insects, moths, butterflies, beetles, etc., etc., Toxic to livestock. Native to Maine

Common Yarrow (Achillea millefolium) **Perennial** (Herbaceous) **Sun:** Full, Full, Full, Full **Soil:** Dry (road edge) **Flower:** White (flat head) **Bloom time:** July-September **Height:** 1-3 feet **Attracts:** Native bees, Honeybees, Syrphid and Hover Flies. VERY drought tolerant can be used in poor soils. Scented leaves are traditionally used in skin care, i.e., soaps, lotions for the soothing properties. Also used as a calming tea. Native to Maine

Culver's Root (Veronicastrum virginicum) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Full Soil: Medium (well drained) to Dry Flower: White (spires) Bloom time: July-September Height: 3-6 feet Attracts: Bees, Bumblebees, Moths, Butterflies Special: Native Bees Adaptable. Great in a pollinator or cottage garden

Elderberry (Sambucus spp.) **Perennial** (Shrub) | **Sun:** FULL Sun (best for flowers & fruit) **Soil:** Variety Moist to Dry – Clay, Loam **Prefers rich, moist, acidic** **Flower:** White clusters small flowers; fragrant **Bloom time:** May-June (fruits July-Sept) **Height:** 5-12 feet (6-10 feet wide) **Attracts:** Many pollinators, Birds **Special:** Native bees May look unkempt from a distance; excellent as a hedge or in problem, moist areas. Traditional medicinal & edible uses. Native to Maine

Foam Flower (*Tiarella cordifolia*) **Perennial** (Herbaceous) **| Sun:** Shade/Deep shade **Soil:** Rich, well drained **Flower:** White or Pink with pink accents **Bloom time:** August-October **Height:** 6 inches to 1 foot **Attracts:** Native bees (small flowers) **Special:** Native bees. A plant of shaded woodland gardens. Understory plant that thrives under deepest shade provided by larger plants. Native to Maine

Fox Sedge (Carex vulpinoidea) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Full Sun to Part & Full Shade Soil: Moist to Wet Flower: Clustered spikelet turns bronze later in the season Bloom time: July-Sept. Height: 2'-4' tall w/equal spread Attracts: Bees, Butterflies, Syrphid Flies Special: Host plant of Skipper Butterflies. Narrow grass like leaves (gives a spray appearance). A plant of floodplains, sedge meadows and wet areas near ponds and seeps. Unpalatable to deer. Native to Maine

Golden Alexanders (Zizea aurea) **Perennial** (Herbaceous) **Sun:** Full/Part Shade **Soil:** Moist/Sandy or Clay **Flower:** Yellow umbel **Bloom time:** June-August **Height:** Up to 3 feet **Attracts:** Butterflies & Bees **Special:** A plant of moist woods, prairies and glades. Does well in a variety of soils & light conditions. Good in naturalized areas, rain or wild gardens. Native to Maine

Gray's Sedge (Carex grayi) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Part Sun to Part Shade Soil: Moist to Wet/Clay Flower: Green/Tan; club like capsules. Bloom time: June-July Height: 12"-18" with equal spread Attracts: Pollinators and Songbirds Special: Broader leaf than most sedges. Light green almost

Great Blue Lobelia (Lobelia siphilitica) **Perennial** (Herbaceous) | **Sun:** Full/Part Shade **Soil:** Well drained/Moist/Medium Wet **Flower:** Blue (spire) **Bloom time:** July-October **Height:** 1-3 feet **Attracts:** Birds, Hummingbirds **Special:** Bumblebees, Native Bees. Great for woodland gardens, meadows, streambanks. Striking blue color, a standout in a naturalized garden. Open-pollinated. Native to Maine

Green Headed Coneflower (Rudbeckia laciniata) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Full to Part Shade Soil: Variety inc. Clay, loam, sand & humus rich; Good drainage Flower: Yellow (green centers) Bloom time: July-October Height: 3-10 feet Attracts: Butterflies, Pollinators, Small mammals & Songbirds. Goldfinches eat seeds in fall. Special: Good for slopes, banks, meadows, and woodland edges. Resistant to deer, heat & humidity. Needs deadheading. Good cut flower. Native to Maine

Grey Birch (Betula populifolia) **Perennial** (Tree) | **Sun:** Full/Part Shade/Shade **Soil:** Dry to moist **Flower:** White w/dark pink stamens **Bloom time:** May-June **Height:** 3-10 feet **Attracts:** Butterflies, songbirds, mammals **Special:** Larval host Eastern Tiger Swallowtail. Short lived. Yellow leaves in Fall. White bark (hints of grey). Its catkins (seed pods) provide food for birds and small mammals at the beginning of the season. Considered a 'nurse' tree as it protects seedlings of slower growing, larger trees species. Native to Maine

Hoary Mountain Mint (Pycnanthemum incanum) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Full Sun to Part Shade Soil: Dry to moist Flower: White, purple; silvery foliage Bloom time: June-July Height: 2-6 feet Attracts: Native bees, butterflies, and Bumblebees; Deer eat leaves Special: Traditional uses include tea and flavoring. Has been used to repel mosquitoes (rubbing leaves on skin). Use in meadows and open spaces. Divide every 3-5 years. Supports biological control. Native to Eastern US

Jacob's Ladder (Polemonium reptans) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Part Sun/Part Shade/Shade Soil: Loose, Rich Soil Flower: Lavender/Blue Bloom time: May-June Height: 12" flower stem & leaves

Attracts: Bees, Syrphid Flies **Special:** Native Bees Spring ephemeral with long season foliage. One of the first to bloom in the late spring (stops blooming in mid-June). Understory plant. Happiest in early succession gardens. Lovely green leaves all season. Native to Eastern US

Juneberry/Shadblow/Serviceberry (Amelanchier canadensis) Perennial (Shrub) | Sun: Full/Part Shade Soil: Moist but well drained Flower: White with yellow anthers Bloom time: April-May Height: 3-30 feet Attracts: Native bees, wasps, beetles, songbirds (fruit) Special: Native bees; Browse food for deer. Beautiful in the spring when the wild plums are in bloom. Fruit is similar in size to blueberries but are eaten by birds before harvest. Native to Maine

Meadowsweet (Spirea alba) Perennial (Shrub) | Sun: Part Shade/Shade Soil: Moist/Wet Flower: White & pink Bloom time: August-October Height: 3-7 feet Attracts: Native bees, wasps, beetles Special: Native bees; Deer tolerant; Larval host: Spring Azure butterfly. Traditional uses include food & medicine. Understated may be used in a rain garden or naturalized wet areas. Native to Maine

Narrowleaf Mountain Mint (Pycnanthemum tenuifolium) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Full Sun to Part Shade Soil: Dry to moist Flower: White, blue or purple; flowers when grown to 1' foot wide Bloom time: July-September Height: 2-4 feet, stiff erect stems Attracts: Bees, Butterflies and birds; Deer eat leaves Special: Traditional uses include tea and flavoring. Has been used to repel mosquitoes (rubbing leaves on skin). Use in meadows and open spaces. Native to Maine

NY Ironweed (Vernonia noveboracencis) **Perennial** (Herbaceous) **Sun:** Full **Soil:** Moist (clay) **Flower:** Reddish purple (clusters) **Bloom time:** August-September **Height:** 5-8 feet **Attracts:** Bees, Bumblebees, Butterflies, Birds **Special:** Native bees; Tall plant of bottomlands. Good for fence lines or to add interest to empty corners. Will grow as wide as it does tall. Native to Eastern US

Path Rush (Juncus tenuis) **Perennial** (Herbaceous) **Sun:** Full/Part Shade **Soil:** Wet to Dry (variety of soils) **Flower:** Green pods (1/16" inch) turn straw colored when ripened. Sticky seed inside. **Bloom time:** August **Height:** 6-12 inches **Attracts:** Bumblebees, Skipper Butterflies & smaller bees **Special:**

Pennsylvania Sedge (Carex pensylvanica) **Perennial** (Herbaceous) **Sun:** Partial to Full Shade **Soil:** Dry to Medium, Sandy **Flower:** Greenish w/Pink edges **Bloom time:** April-June (Spring) **Height:** Up to 8" in bloom; very, very small delicate flowers **Attracts:** Bees, Butterflies, Syrphid Flies **Special:** Native Bees. Lawn alternative. Fills in overtime to form a dense low growing turf with textural interest. Perfect in a glade. Native to Eastern US

Plantain Pussytoes (Antennaria plantaginifolia) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Sun/Part Shade Soil: Thin/Acidic/Dry Soils Flower: Creamy white Bloom time: June-July Height: 1-3 feet Attracts: Butterflies, Adrenid, Halictic and Cuckoo Bees Special: Tolerates drought; deer & rabbit resistant. Host plant of American Lady Butterfly. Spreads to form a mat. Perfect for poor soils at the edges of woodlands. Needs well drained to dry conditions. May be used as a turf substitute, rock gardens, dry beds, etc. Tolerates more shade than Prairie Pussytoes (A. neglecta). Native to Maine

Poverty Oat Grass (Danthonia spicata) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Full to Part Sun Soil: Dry, rocky slopes and roadsides Flower: Green Bloom time: June-July Height: 1-2 feet Attracts: Butterflies Special: Good for erosion control, groundcover, lawn replacement. Meadows, green roof, restoration and waterwise planting. Good candidate for use in regenerative landscaping. Native to Maine

Prairie Pussytoes (Antennaria neglecta) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Full Sun Soil: Dry-Medium; does well in some clay soil Flower: White w/silvery leaves Bloom time: June/July Height: Up to 10" stem Special: Deer & rabbit resistant. Spread up to 12" as a groundcover. Tolerates more intense sun than Plantain Pussytoes. Especially important to overwintering native pollinators. Host: American Painted Lady Butterfly. Native to Maine

Purple Coneflower (Echinacea purpurea) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Full/Part Shade Soil: Moist/Well drained Flower: Purple/Magenta Bloom time: July-September Height: 6-20 feet Attracts:

Rattlesnake Master (Eryngium yuccifolium) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Full Sun Soil: Dry/Well Drained Soil Flower: Greenish/white (1" globes) Bloom time: July-September Height: 12" leaves up to 3-6 feet flower stems Attracts: Bees, Butterflies Special: Aggressive self-seeder. Rigid stems hold multiple globular flowers. Adds interest in all seasons. The stems and flower heads dry to a bronze color in the fall. Native to Central US.

Red Twig (Osier) Dogwood (Cornus sericea) **Perennial** (Shrub) | **Sun:** Sun/Part Shade/Shade **Soil:** Moist/Wet **Flower:** White (very small) grows in an umbel. **Bloom time:** August-October **Height:** 3-12 feet **Attracts:** Birds, Butterflies. **Special:** Waterfowl, marsh birds, shorebirds; Deer browse. Large & small mammals. **Larval host:** Spring Azure butterfly. A plant of wet areas, riverbanks, lakes wooded or open streambanks. Most distinctive in winter, red twigs against white snow are striking. Native to Maine

Rose Sedge (Carex rosea) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Part Sun to Part Shade Soil: Moist to Wet/Clay Flower: Green/Tan (star shaped clusters) Bloom time: June-July Height: 12"-18" with equal spread Attracts: Pollinators and Songbirds Special: Great for wetland restoration. Tolerates periods flooding. Native to Maine

Silverrod or White Goldenrod (Solidago bicolor) Perennial (Herbaceous) | Sun: Full Sun/Part Shade Soil: Sandy/Poor/Rocky/Heavy Clay Bloom time: August-October Height: 3-6 feet Attracts: Butterflies, Bumblebees, Birds Special: Native bees. Beautiful, unusual as only Solidago with white flower rays. Stands out in areas where other plants may not thrive well. Broad, soft leaf. Glossary

Deciduous – Woody shrubs & trees which drop their leaves in the fall. Woody stems remain above ground.

Groundcover – Sometimes herbaceous, sometimes evergreen. Grows low to the ground (less than 6" high) may spread via **rhizome** (horizontal underground roots & nodes) or **stolon** (or runners, sprout from the base of the plant, run along the surface of the soil (e.g., Strawberries)).

Herbaceous – Plants die back in the late fall/early winter and re-emerge with new growth in the spring.

Shrub – Indicated by multi-stemmed growth. May grow from 2' – 20' tall. Many understory 'trees' are shrubs, e.g., Hazelnut, Chokeberry, Serviceberry, etc.

Sapling Tree – A young tree, usually 2-5 years old (based on growth of the species) with less than 2" diameter stem. Not yet producing fruit or seed.

We strive to have all the listed plants available. We are a small nursery and have limited quantities of many species. Additionally, we may have plants which are either listed/not listed which may not be ready for market until later in the season or the following year.
