PLUM CREEK WETLANDS PRESERVE MOVING FORWARD

The purpose and mission of the PCWP is to conserve water quality with responsible management of wetlands, to protect wildlife habitat and to promote an appreciation of the natural world through meaningful educational, recreational, and research opportunities. GBRT continues to work with the Texas Parks and Wildlife, the Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority, and other supporting agencies to make PCWP an asset to the school districts, local clubs, and the general public. Our plans are to use this property to advance the mission of the PCWP by providing a space that can be utilized as an outdoor classroom, recreational site, and natural habitat for all to enjoy. Our hope is to have a fully staffed education center where all can come and learn about nature and the value of preserving and conserving land. Trails will be used for walking, hiking, birding, and other low-impact activities. Your contribution to support the PCWP is appreciated!



ABANDONED CRAB TRAP REMOVAL PROGRAM

The Texas Abandoned Crab Trap Removal Program was created in 2001 giving the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) authority to create a community-based program to systematically remove abandoned, lost, or derelict crab traps during a 10-day crabbing season closure. It was an honor to work with the San Antonio Bay Partnership and other organizations supporting the 2019 Abandoned Crap Trap Removal Program. A total of 838 traps were removed. The GBRT will continue this partnership by volunteering in 2020.

2019 was a divergent year for the Guadalupe-Blanco River Trust (GBRT). It was a year of major transition and one I was happy to be a part of. Our previous executive director, Carrie Kasnicka, accepted a new position as the South West Program Manager for the Trust for Public Lands in Colorado. Carrie began working with GBRT as a grant writer and eventually took over as the director. Her tenure with GBRT was a fruitful one. She was able to complete three conservation easement transactions, develop many partnerships and relationships, and continue our mission of outreach. I have known Carrie since 2016, when I was a part of the land conservation cohort, learning alongside her as the conservation manager at Green Spaces Alliance. Her enthusiasm and energy was the first thing I noticed. Carrie's hard work and love for GBRT's mission was even more evident when I took the reins in October, trying to fill her shoes ever since. Carrie left behind many great projects and has been guiding me through some of those from afar. While it was sad to see Carrie go, it afforded me the opportunity to begin my own endeavors as the new executive director. GBRT wants to thank Carrie for all of her dedication and support.

The GBRT Board of Trustees hired an executive director, and decided to hire a second full-time staff member for the first time in GBRT's history. Lisa Adams began working as the development director in October alongside myself. We have been working diligently to continue moving the needle when it comes to conserving the Guadalupe River Basin. We look forward to continuing the great mission to preserve one of the most diverse river watersheds in the United States. Staff anticipate 2020 will be a strong year for the Trust as we navigate the rapids of conserving the watershed from Kerrville to the Texas coast. Our biggest goal for 2020 is to complete the application for becoming an Accredited land trust. We are thankful for the dedication, leadership and support of our Board of Trustees and partner organizations, including the Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority.




