

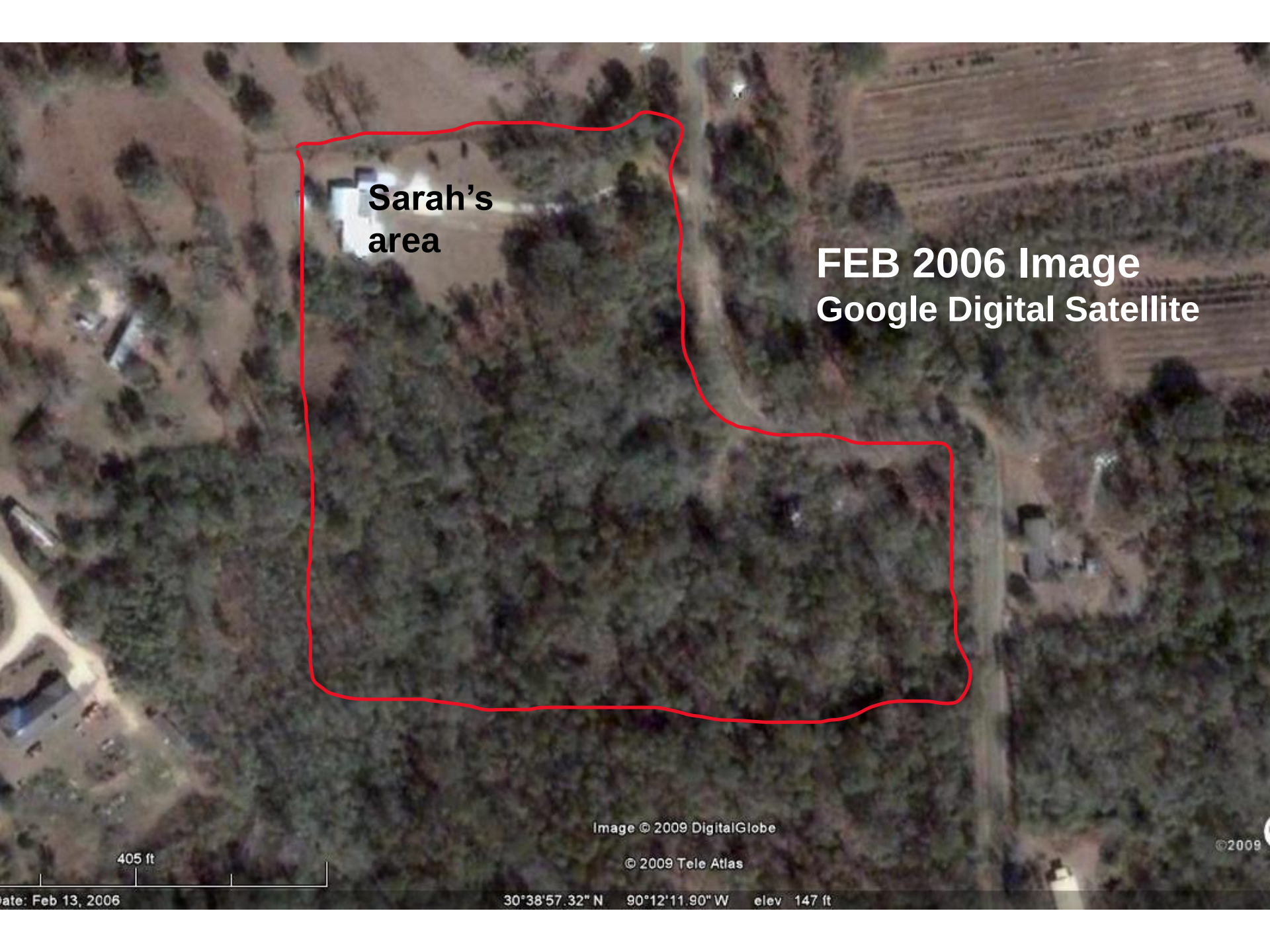

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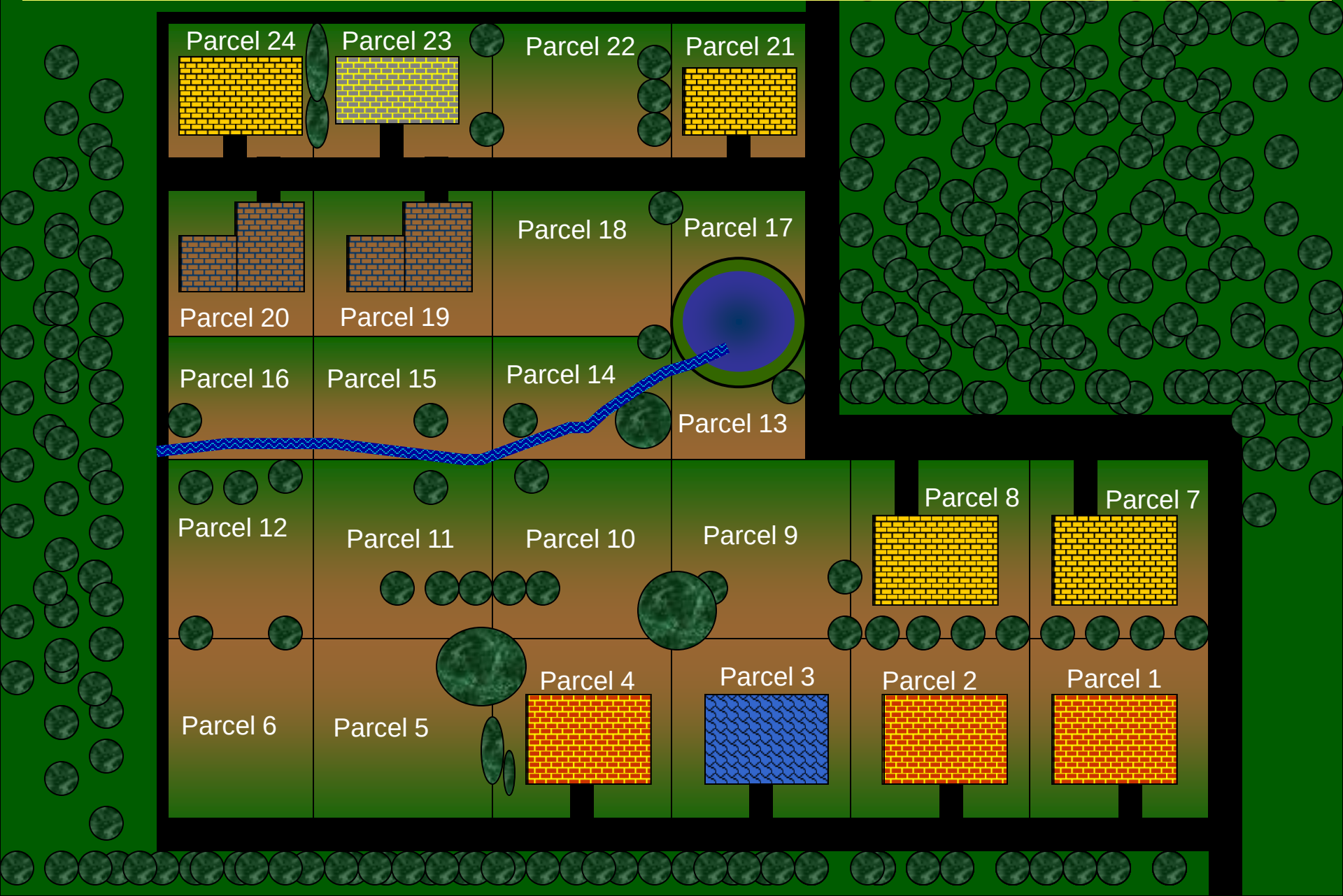
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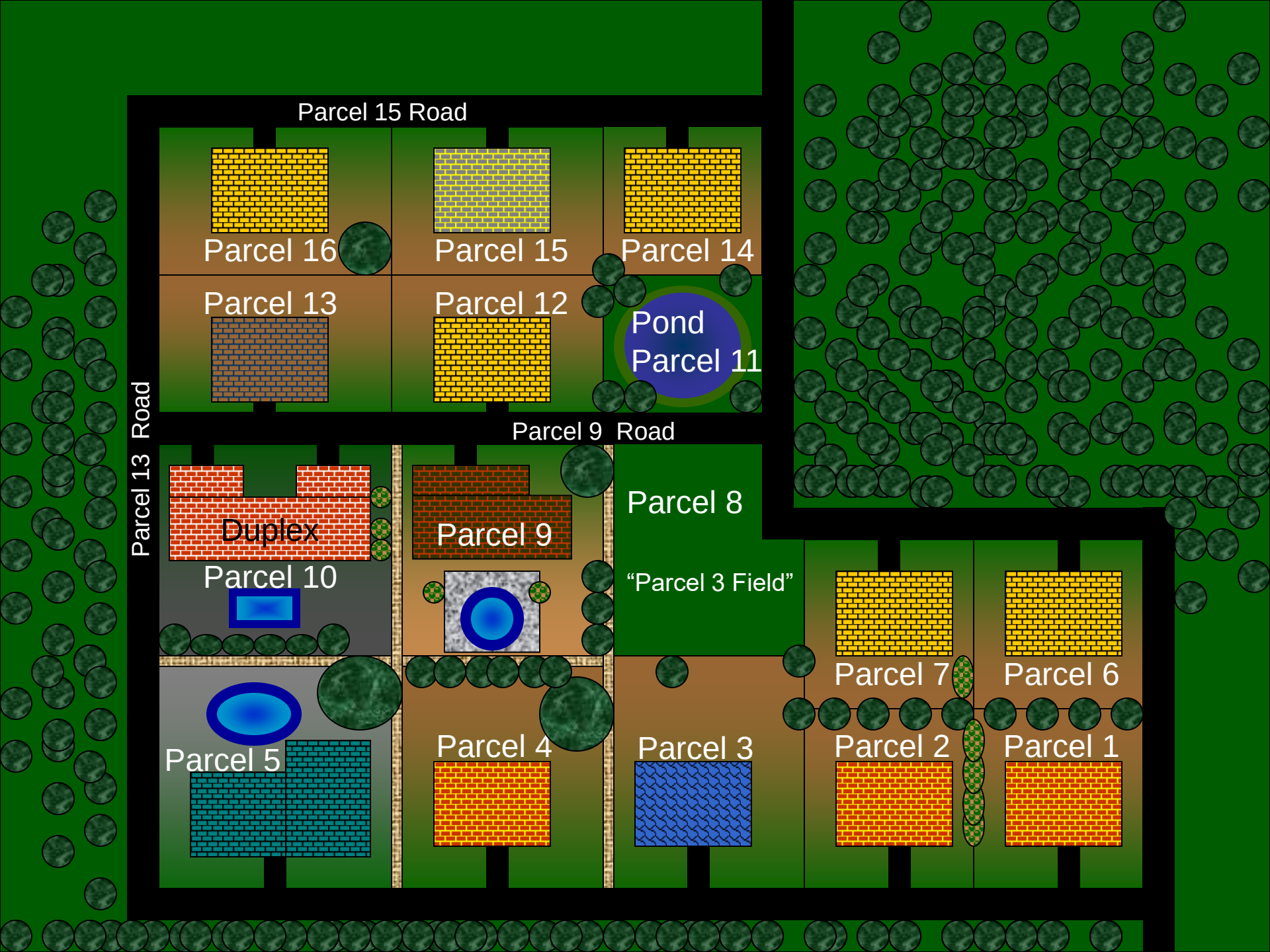

Vann saw the possibility of dividing the land into 24 parcels, or 8 acres divided into two 4-acre areas... the latter being owned by two or three siblings each. The BLUE line is a ravine that runs through the property and is predicted to expand over the next 30 years. Therefore, Parcels 17, 16, 15, 14, 13 cannot be built on. Likewise, the northern parts of parcels 12, 11, and 10 cannot be built on.

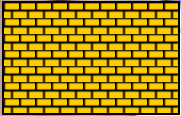
