



DIRECTOR'S VISION

"Women are the force, the storm, that motivates men."

The energy that flows between women and men is electric like a storm. The biochemical energy between sexes is like lightning, changing lives in an instant. Prospero, stranded on an island, uses Ariel and the Spirits to create a storm which maroons more people. The aftermath of the storm is the love that his daughter Miranda and Ferdinand, his enemy's son, discover at first sight. That love changes the hearts of those around them.

Prospero had the storm created for vengeance on the people who stranded him on the island and usurped his power. To revenge those people he utilizes the power of Ariel and the Spirits. The battle between opposing forces is most clearly seen in the characters of Caliban and Gonzalo. Caliban represents evil with his physical deformity and a heart filled with lust. Gonzalo represents good with his unwavering devotion to the King and his previous compassion for Prospero.

Love wins out in the end and Prospero is moved to forgive his enemies. Ariel and the Spirits influence the King and Prospero to put aside the past and step into a new future together as in-laws.

Cast Bios

Aaron Alexander (*Trinculo*) is a rising junior at SUNY U.B. and, at the tender age of 26, a long time veteran of the SSITP stage including leading roles as *Romeo* in *Romeo and Juliet* and *Mark Antony* in *Julius Caesar* the last two summers.

John Brackett (Master) is making his debut on the SSITP stage. He was last seen as Egeus in CNYP's Midsummer.

Bella Calabria (Miranda) was last seen as *Anne Page* in last August's *Merry Wives of Windsor* and *Juliet* in *Romeo & Juliet* for SSITP. Recently, Bella was *Helena* in *Midsummer* at CNYP. She has a BA (Theater) *Manhattanville College*. This fall Bella is directing *The Addams Family* for CNYP as well as marrying her fiancé Chris Lupia (*Ferdinand*).

David Forest Hitchcock (Antonio) is a veteran of many **Syracuse Shakespeare-In-The-Park** shows. His favorite role was Adam in **As You Like It** in August 2017. Three of David's poems have been finalists in international competitions.

Sarah Liebowitz (Iris) is making her SSITP debut. She was last seen as *Tourvel* in CNYP's Les Liaisons Dangereuses. Sarah is a grad student at SU studying English literature.

Jessica Lisi (Juno) made her SSITP debut in June 2019 as Queen Margaret in **Richard III**. She has worked on a number of other shows with **Open Hand Theater** and **SUNY Geneseo** where she majored in **History**.

Christopher Lupia (Ferdinand) is debuting with SSITP. He has performed numerous Shakespeare roles such as Demetrius in Midsummer as well as Roger DeBris in The Producers, both at CNYP. His next role is Gomez Addams in The Addams Family at CNYP directed by his soon-to-be bride, Bella Calabria (Miranda).

Jason Luscier (*Caliban*) played *Falstaff* in *Merry Wives of Windsor* and *Touchstone* in *As You Like It* the last two summers for SSITP. He has worked with Commonwealth Shakespeare (*MA*), Greater Hartford Shakespeare (*CT*), McKinney Rep(*TX*) and Shakespeare & Co. (*MA*).

Tone Merrick (Mariner/King's Entourage) has graced the SSITP summer stage in Romeo and Juliet and Julius Caesar among other roles. He was seen as the Bailiff in last December's Miracle on 34th Street at CNYP.

Jesse Navagh (Sebastian) played Romeo in the SSITP/SCSD high school tour of Abridged Romeo and Juliet in 2018 and was Slender in last August's Merry Wives for SSITP. He has played numerous ghostly roles for OHA as they present their Ghostwalks around CNY.

Griffin Netti (Boatswain) was last seen on the SSITP summer stage as Lord Dumain in All's Well the Ends Well in 2016. He is currently attending SUNY Geneseo.

Stephen Shepherd (*Stefano*) is performing in Thornden Park with **SSITP** for the fifth time. Most recently he was *King Edward/Richmond* in *Richard III* this past June and *Dr. Caius* in *Merry Wives* last August. Next, Stephen is in *Assassins* at **BTG**. You can hear him on WAER HD3 and SoundCloud biweekly as host/producer of **Stage Right Radio**!

Jack Sherman (Prospero) has appeared in numerous SSITP productions including Henry IV, Part I (King Henry); Winter's Tale (Leontes/Autolycus); The Merchant of Venice (Shylock); Measure for Measure (Duke Vincentio); Henry V (Fluellen/ Nym/Canterbury); and 2018's Julius Caesar (Brutus) and Merry Wives (Master Ford).

Cory Simon (*Mariner, King's Entourage*) has recently transitioned from back stage tech work for **SSITP** to on stage acting for us in *Richard III* (*Lord Grey/Gentleman*) in June. We hate to lose his tech help but he is developing so well as an actor that he is in demand with other CNY companies.

Alan Smead (Mariner, King's Entourage) is making his SSITP debut. He is an area cab driver and musician trying his hand at theater.

Rebekah Tadros (Ariel) is making her second appearance at Thornden Park with **Syracuse Shakespeare in the Park**, previously playing *Portia* in *Julius Caesar* (June 2018). Recently, she performed with **CNY Arts Center** as *Betty Haynes* in *White Christmas* and *Irena Synkova* in *I Never Saw Another Butterfly*.

Samuel Tamburo (Gonzalo) is an old-school Shakespearean style actor with a penchant for appearing twice in the same role: The Duke in **Othello**, The Prince in **Romeo and Juliet**, Baptista in **Taming of the Shrew**, Lord Lafue in **All's Well**, Lord Frederick in **As You Like It** and an Assassin in **Julius Ceasar**. This is Sam's first turn as Gonzalo.

SYNOPSIS

The First Half of the Show

A1, S1- A ship at sea...

Alonso, King of Naples, and his son, Ferdinand, Alonso's brother, Sebastian, and the Duke of Milan, Antonio are caught in a storm created by the spirit Ariel, under the magic art of Prospero. They are terrified in the storm as the ship crashes.

A1, S2– Prospero's cell...

Prospero's daughter Miranda, afraid for the ship, is told the passengers are safe. Prospero explains that he is the real Duke of Milan, usurped by Antonio, and they had arrived on the island many years before after being sent out to sea by the usurpers. Miranda sleeps, while Ariel reports that she has done as commanded and separated Ferdinand. Prospero and Miranda. Ariel visits Caliban, a savage, also controlled by Prospero. Caliban expresses his hostility to Prospero but is forced to obey. Prospero gets Ariel to lead Ferdinand across the island so that he meets Miranda.

Act 2, Scene 1– A beach on the island...

Alonso and his entourage begin their search for Ferdinand. Antonio persuades Sebastian to usurp the king and claim his throne, but Ariel overhears the plot. Ariel awakes Gonzalo, who had been kind to Prospero when he was being banished. Alonso also wakes and continues his search for Ferdinand.

Act 2, Scene 2– The island shore...

Caliban, alone and frightened, encounters Alonso's jester Trinculo and butler Stephano. He decides to serve them with the aim of persuading them to kill Prospero. They get drunk and head out to find Prospero.

Act 3, Scene 1- Prospero's cell...

Prospero has ordered Ferdinand to carry out menial tasks. Ferdinand carries wood to Prospero's cell. Miranda follows him. Miranda and Ferdinand fall in love. Prospero tests their love.

Act 3, Scene 2– Another part of the island...

Caliban details his plot to kill Prospero to Stefano and Trinculo. Ariel creates havoc by making mocking replies while invisible. Trinculo gets the blame but the drunken group agrees to kill Prospero.

Act 3, Scene 3– A different part of the island...

Alonso, Gonzalo, Sebastian, Antonio and company come to a clearing. Alonso decides to give up his search for Ferdinand. They are fiercely reprimanded for their past deeds by Ariel. Prospero sees that his plot is working. Alonso runs off, followed by the others.



Intermission: 15 minutes

SYNOPSIS

The Second Half of the Show

Act 4, Scene 1- Near a forest where Caliban lives...


Prospero directs Ariel to bring Iris, Juno, and Ceres to a masque celebrating Ferdinand and Miranda's engagement. Later, he tells Ariel and the spirits to chase Caliban, Stephano, and Trinculo away to end their plot against him. He then vows to give up his magical powers once he has achieved his ends, and to free Ariel, who has been begging for her liberty.

Act 5, Scene1- Near Prospero's cell...


Ariel and the spirits lead the wandering royalty party to Prospero who makes them stand in a confused trance. He releases them and grants them forgiveness. Prospero is restored to his dukedom. Ferdinand and Miranda are revealed as still living. Ariel and the spirits lead in the ship's crew, and Caliban, Trinculo, and Stephano. Caliban regrets his service to Stephano and Trinculo and promises to behave. Prospero sets Ariel free, and asks for his own freedom.


