LINUX - Back in the 1980's it was called **UNIX** - and was expensive. In 1991 a Finnish student Linus Torvalds asked the question: Hmm, could I create a clone? He did and he let it loose on the world under what he called Copyleft - the opposite of Copyright. You can have it for free, you can make

changes, if you let someone else have a copy it has to be for free. So what is Linux? It's a computer operating system - same as MS Windows - which is Copyrighted and expensive. Ah, and what can I do with Linux? Anything

you want to do. MS Windows has "Word" - LInux has "Librewriter". and Librecalc and Libredraw and other office programs. How about a web browser? Choose from over 18. Depending on how you like the looks, the functions, the layout. Cadd, games, > long list.

What if I want to try it out? Cost? Free. How? Well there are several versions. (think ford, chev, gmc, honda, etc). Personally I use Fedora. Ask Google for "fedora download", stick a thumb drive in your computer, download and reboot. - Don't click on the button [install to hard drive - yet] and go walkabout. It will run a bit slow because it's running off the thumb drive. Once install on your hard drive it's about 4 times faster the MS Windows.

Is it any good? Well 98% of the top web servers run ... Linux. 100% of the top 500 supercomputers run ... Linux.

Important Road Changes Frank Rudy

Changes to the Black Forest Intersection of Shoup and Vollmer: Over the years there have been a number of serious accidents at the corner of Shoup and Vollmer including multiple deaths. It appears most of the accidents were caused by traffic heading east bound on Shoup, who fail to stop and run the stop sign. As a result, about two years ago the intersection underwent some minor improvements ie...trees removed or trimmed to improve visibility, larger stop signs etc. Additionally, 2023 El Paso County developed a plan to assess the intersection for a long-term fix. After evaluation it has been determined the county will be moving forward with the installation of a single lane roundabout. There is no 'start' date yet revealed, but most likely not before 2026. First Aid Classes, CPR classes, Basic Pistol Class

This is some of the information Franklin Blaha who retired from our fire department fifteen years ago but still teaches a little Emergency medicine has sent to me.

"I can teach certifiable classes, but CPR and First Aid training has become a big business now that organizations require it and I get charged \$30 per student for the card and book. That does not stop me from doing short single topic presentations.

I currently teach for National Safety Council and they charge \$30 for any of their courses whether it be just adult CPR, Adult Child Infant CPR or First Aid or any combination. That fee covers the textbook and certification card. All certifying agencies now charge a fee as it has become big business. Twenty years ago I was a volunteer instructor for the Red Cross. They had super condensed their classes and were charging \$120 per student for a 6-hour class that I was teaching for free. I told the students that I considered bringing a pole and jumping up on the table to do pole dances so they could get their money's worth. Fortunately, no one took me up on that. I stopped teaching for them at that point after volunteering for about 25 years. I have been teaching CPR for about 55 years for multiple agencies and they are all the same.

For the last 10 years or so I was teaching nurses and physicians from UC Health (Memorial Hospital) not just CPR but part of two other courses called Advanced Life Support and Pediatric Life Support. They do offer public courses but I do not know the costs. Two years ago, when Covid calmed down they fired me because I was the only instructor left who was not on their nursing staff, even though I had taught several of that staff how to teach the class. I think the real reason was I was too old and too ugly, but no one is allowed to tell you that.

Now CPR is covered under the Colorado Good Samaritan act, so unless you need a certification to meet a job requirement, there is really no good reason to be certified.

I have put together my own condensed course that covers:

Hands Only CPR - taught but not certified by anyone

Adult Child Infant CPR with choking and AED - one and two rescuer

Advanced use of pocket mask and bag mask

My estimate is about 4 hours for the informal CPR or First Aid Class.

First Aid would be a more condensed class and just include modules which you are likely to run into at the slash site like:

Bleeding Control & Shock

Heart Attack & stroke

Heat and Cold Emergencies

Splinting - although at your location it is more important to know what not to do than how to do splinting as you can wait for the FD to get there

The choking module is also usually added into First Aid for those who do not take the CPR class

Other stuff could be added if there is interest like poisoning and overdose.

I mention below that I teach a firearm safety/marksman ship class for children which is free and done in two four hour sessions through the gun club and I would love to be able to provide information on that to the community club members.

I also teach a Basic Pistol class which will qualify for obtaining a CCW permit in Colorado. Much more extensive training will be required for this beginning of 2025 of this year.

I can attend some of your club meetings and do mini presentations on either home defense, firearm safety or isolated first aid topics. There is no mini presentation on CPR, having only a little knowledge can prove hazardous and too much equipment is required.”
