Black Forest Festival 2025: A Celebration of Community and Joy by Leilani Richie

The 2025 Black Forest Festival was a resounding success, bringing together community members for a day filled with fun, food, and festivities. The event, held at the Black Forest Community Center, showcased this year's theme beautifully: the Heart of the Forest – 56 years Strong!

The festival kicked off with the traditional pancake breakfast, where volunteers served around 700 delicious breakfasts. The volunteers and our local Boy Scout Troop 70 did an outstanding job feeding the community. A huge thank you to the Omelette Parlor, Golden Pine Roasters, and Dawn and Louie for sponsoring this year's breakfast!

The booth fair was another highlight, featuring 90 enthusiastic vendors. The fair benefited from recent backyard grading, making the area more accessible and visually appealing. Many vendors reported good sales and positive feedback, with categories ranging from artists and 3D-printers to homemade goods and coffee. The demonstration booths were also a huge hit with many, many people appreciating the variety of animals around the festival grounds. The petting zoo, tractor rides, alpacas, sheep and especially the wolves received many compliments and resulted in many gleeful smiles of children.

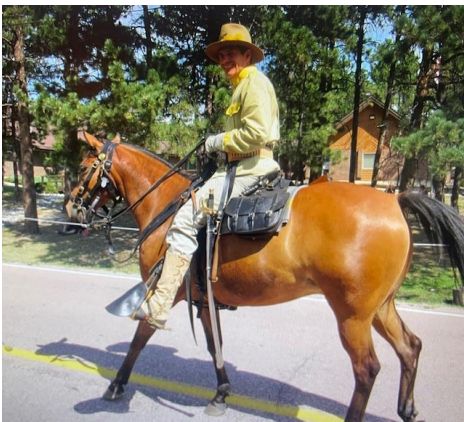

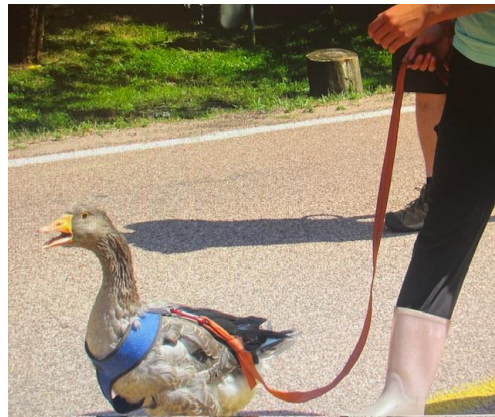

Upcoming Citizens' Academy

The El Paso County Sheriff's Office is excited to announce applications are now open for our upcoming Citizens' Academy. This free, in-depth program for community members begins on **Wednesday, September 10, 2025,**

and runs **twice a week from 5:30 PM to 8:30 PM,** concluding with a graduation ceremony on **Thursday, October 9, 2025.**

Designed to provide a behind-the-scenes look at local law enforcement, the Citizens' Academy offers participants a comprehensive overview of the Sheriff's Office and its many responsibilities.

Topics include:

- Use of Force
- Illegal Marijuana Operations
- Targeted Traffic Enforcement
- Emergency Services (including Wildland Fire and Search & Rescue)
- SWAT and K9 Operations
- Jail Operations and Civil Processes

Attendees will also follow the course of a criminal investigation, guided by detectives who will explain each step of the process. A tour of the El Paso County Jail is included to give participants an understanding of the challenges faced by our detention staff.

The program culminates in **realistic, scenario-based training**, giving participants the opportunity to experience what it's like to serve as a deputy.

There is no cost to attend, but all applicants must pass a standard background check. Space is limited to the first **40 completed applications** received. Don't wait to apply! Applications must be returned no later than 4:30 PM on August 22, 2025.

Air Conditioning in the BFCC Hall

After 15 years of talking about it and a lot of hard work from those involved, we have finally got AC in the hall. It started with a meeting in February with Bob, Ned and Doug from Black Rose and Jim and Leif from the Club. We discussed the many options to get this project done.

It was decided to get estimates from three local companies to see what our options were and what the project would cost. One of those companies was **High Country Air**. Jim had met owner **Josh Eker** at a **Business Connect** meeting at the Club. Josh offered to do this monumental task for cost. This offer turned out to be at half the cost of two other bids received.

With a proposal in hand we started our journey through Regional. We found **Plant Engineering Consultants** to do our mechanical and electrical engineering. They gave us a pretty good discount. With those two reports in hand, we were able to get through Regional and obtain our permit. **Will from Headley Electric** attached an electrical permit to Josh's permit. By the way, he only charged us the permit fee for this, as Jim did all electrical work with the help of **Rylan Eker (Josh's son)**.

With Josh and his son **Tristen** who is also an H-VAC tech, we worked two long weekends to get this work completed. On July 20th all units were pushing cold air into the club.

A special thanks to the **Eker Family** for their hard work and extreme generosity to make this happen.
