confidence in their men who fought harder for them than any other. They are proof that having faith in, living for and keeping a good line of communication with God will guide you through even the hardest times.



2ND LIEUTENANTS REPORT




Happy New Year Y'all,

January Birthdays



Micajah Parker Lindsey 2nd Great grandfather of Eddie Cox

Micajah was Born January 23, 1824 in Alabama. In 1840 he moved with his parents and his other brothers and sisters to Tishomingo Co Mississippi. He married Sileta Emily Miller in 1844 in Intawamba Co. Mississippi. After the war started, he joined Co. C 9th Regiment, Tennessee Cavalry where he fought in several different battles, then he went to Co. B 48th Regiment Tennessee Infantry (Voorheis) where he fought at Chickamauga, first at Underwood's sawmill about 1/2 mile from Reed's bridge. After the war was over, he moved his wife and their 9 children to Freestone Co. Texas. Micajah died on May 2, 1879, in Freestone Co and is buried in the Salem Cemetery along with his wife and several of the children.



John Robert Pilkinton

(January 24, 1843-May 26, 1926) 3rd great uncle of Brenda Guise.

He was farming with his father in Giles County Tennessee when the war started. On November 15, 1862, in Campbellsville Tennessee, at the age of 19 years old enlisted as a private in K 53rd Tennessee Infantry CSA.

His company was first sent to Port Hudson, Louisiana, then to Georgia. When asked about his experience in the war from his first battle until the end, he summed it up in his words,


"I went to the distributing hospital in Georgia. I spent furloughs. In skirmish fighting through Missionary Ridge campaign. It lasted until the end of the war. I ate a quarter of a pound of beef and a piece of bread every 4 days. I slept on the ground in exposed weather. I was discharged at Nashville and walked home. "

After the war John returned to farming, married, and fathered 9 children. John Robert Pilkinton died on May 26, 1926, in Giles, Tennessee, when he was 83 years old. He is buried at Gibsonville cemetery Giles County, Tennessee.

Edward T. Cox, 3rd great uncle to Eddie Cox, was born on Jan 28, 1831, in Jefferson Co. Tennessee. He moved with his parents and brothers and sisters to Roane Co. in the mid-1839. In 1851 he married Sarah Coffee. In the 1860 Census Edward was list neighbor to his father Sampson Cox both were House Carpenters.

On Nov. 9, 1861 he enlisted in Co. F, $43^{\rm rd}$ Tennessee under his neighbor and that he worked for some,

Sterling Turner who was a Captain. Edward was assigned as a nurse in the General Hospital in Knoxville. In Dec 1862 the $43^{\rm rd}$ was sent by train to Mississippi where Edward was wounded on May 22, 1863 near the Railroad Redoubt at Vicksburg, Mississippi. Capt. Turner was killed the same day. Edward, as well as his brothers William D., James J. and Gainer R, were all captured on July 4, 1863 and paroled July 15, 1863. Being wounded and sick he was sent to Mobile Alabama. He made it back to Tennessee around 1865 to his wife and 9 children. He died in Apr. 1889 and is buried in Mount Zion Cemetery Meigs County Tennessee.



THE TEXAS FLAGGERS AT THE FORT WORTH RODEO PARADE



Saturday February 14, 2023 most everyone knows that the Virginia Flaggers were out in Lexington Virginia for Robert E. Lee's birthday. Though we may not be as well-known as Susan Lee's organization, we too were out in mass that same day at the Fort Worth Rodeo Parade. There were 6 SCV camps and 2 TSOCR chapters represented. We met in downtown Fort Worth at 9:00 am to coordinate and plan our mission to represent and honor our brave and beloved ancestors with the Cross of St. Andrews (battle flag), that the parade officials deemed "unwelcomed and inappropriate" in their parade years ago. Since that time many unreconstructed southerners have rallied and met to flood the sidewalks with our beloved flag.

We stationed ourselves in various positions throughout the parade route handing out flags to any and all of the spectators who wanted one free of charge. We handed out approximately 1000 or more flags. Even some that were IN the parade took some.

calvin Allen and David Wilson led a group of Terry's Texas Rangers Cavalry wearing Confederate uniforms in the parade. They carried their camp flag and the flag of Terry's Texas Rangers, but since they were not allowed to carry the battle flag in the parade, Frank Bussey walked the sidewalk along beside them throughout the parade carrying St. Andrews Cross shouting "Good Morning Dixie".



For the most part we were very well received with very little opposition or bad comments. The parade was enjoyable to watch as well, with many beautiful horses, carriages, wagons, riders, and marching bands. The entire parade lasted about 1 1/2 hours. After the parade 10 of us met at Uncle Julio's for lunch and fellowship before departing homeward.
