

Hello again, my confederate brothers and sisters. Hope June is treating everyone well.


I would like to take this moment to wish all the fathers a late Happy Father's Day.

1851 Brass Frame Confederate Griswold & Gunnison

Pietta 1851 Confederate Navy Black Powder Revolver

This six-shot .44 caliber revolver was made under contract to the Confederate government. It is a brass framed copy of the Colt 1851 Navy revolver. Connecticut Yankee Samuel Griswold set up a cotton gin factory in Georgia in 1830. The village of Griswoldville grew around the factory. In 1862, Griswold produced pikes for volunteers from the state of Georgia. The factory soon began producing revolvers for the Confederacy. No other Confederate factory produced more revolvers than Griswold & Gunnison. Griswoldville was the first town burned by Sherman's troops on his march to the sea. This 1851 navy model features a brass frame, blued parts, brass backstrap and triggerguard, hexagon barrel, and a walnut navy size grip. A beautiful replica to add to your collection!

June in History



The First Battle of Memphis - June 6, 1862

As a result of the federal victory at Corinth, the railroads that linked Memphis with the eastern part of the Confederacy had been cut, severely reducing the strategic importance of the city. Therefore, in early June 1862, Memphis and its nearby forts were abandoned by the rebel army. Most of the garrison were sent to join units elsewhere, including Vicksburg and only a small rear guard was left to make a token resistance. The River Defense Fleet was also to have retreated to Vicksburg, but it could not get enough coal in Memphis. Unable to flee when the federal fleet appeared on June 6, Montgomery and his captains had to decide whether to fight, or scuttle their boats. They chose to fight, steaming out in the early morning to meet the advancing flotilla and the rams trailing behind it, with Memphis citizens cheering them on.

The battle started with an exchange of gunfire at long range, the federal gunboats setting up a line of battle across the river and firing their rear guns at the cottonclads coming up to meet them as they entered the battle stern first. Two of the four rams advanced beyond the line of the gunboats and rammed or otherwise disrupted the movements of their opponents; the other rams misinterpreted their orders and did not enter the battle at all. With the federal rams and gunboats not coordinating their movements and the Confederate vessels operating independently, the battle soon was reduced to a melee. It is agreed by all that the ram flagship, Queen of the West, initiated hostilities by slamming into CSS Colonel Lovell. She was then rammed in turn by one or more of the remaining cotton clads. Ellet was at this time wounded by a pistol shot in his knee, thereby becoming the only casualty on the Union side. (In the hospital, he contracted measles, the childhood disease that killed some 5,000 soldiers during the war. The combination of the disease and the debilitation caused by his wound was too great, and he died on June 21. The remainder of the battle is obscured by more than the fog of war. Several eyewitness accounts are available; however, they are mutually contradictory to a greater degree than usual. All that is certain is that at the end of the battle, all but one of the cottonclads were either destroyed or captured, and one Yankee boat, Queen of the West, was disabled. The sole boat to escape, CSS General Earl Van Dorn, fled to the protection of the Yazoo River, just north of Vicksburg.

The battle, which took less than two hours in the early morning hours of June 6, resulted in the immediate surrender of the city of Memphis to federal authority by noon that day. The Confederate casualties totaled approximately 100 killed or wounded and another 150 taken prisoner. The Union forces captured and repaired CSS General Price, CSS General Bragg, CSS Sumter, and CSS Little Rebel, and added them to the Mississippi River Squadron.

The battle of Memphis was, aside from the later appearance of the ironclad CSS Arkansas, the final challenge to the federal thrust down the Mississippi River against Vicksburg. The river was now open down to that city, which was already besieged by Farragut's ships, but the federal army authorities did not grasp the strategic importance of the fact for nearly another six months. Not until November 1862 would the Union Army under Ulysses S. Grant attempt to complete the opening of the river.

He is also survived by his brother-in-law Pastor Doyle Evans and his wife Gena Hannie Evans; brother-in-law Fred Hannie; sister-in-law Charmayne Hannie Crawford; brother-in-law Judson McCann, all of Lake Charles, Louisiana; and sister-in-law Amanda Hannie of Galveston, Texas. Numerous cousins, nieces, and nephews will miss their Uncle Frank dearly.

Frank will be long remembered for his signature "neck-rag" look that represented the character, integrity, and honor of a Southern Gentleman. His strong work ethic made him a valuable employee of ExxonMobil for over 30 years on their Safety and Response teams. Upon retirement, Frank and Becky moved to Gorman, TX, where he joined the ranks of Gorman's Volunteer Firefighters, battling fires and ensuring the Tanker Truck was refilled with water. He also served his country in the Army National Guard and was a life member of the American Legion. Frank had a profound love for horses. He was a longtime member of the American Quarter Horse Association, and his dedication to horses followed him into retirement, with his last ranch chore

As many know, Frank was an avid student of history. He could provide intricate details of battles from the War Between the States or describe a musket used by Texans. He was Southern to the core, demonstrated by his over 30 years as a member of the Sons of Confederate Veterans, showcasing his knowledge and passion for history.


