Updates on Our Shared Ministry Proposal

By now, most of our readers are aware that we have been in conversation with the members of our sister United Church of Christ in Pecatonica. The joint task force has officially met on two occasions (one at each church) and have come very close to reaching a consensus. Both churches have also sent reps from their respective finance teams to hammer out the details on shared responsibilities for financing the operations (primarily how we would share costs) of the shared ministry which is mostly the pastor's compensation package.

Pastor Bob recently led a worship service in Pecatonica and met with the congregation afterwards to get better acquainted which included some informal conversation and a Q and A session. All signs are that we should continue the conversation in hopes of developing a plan for approval and a timeline for rolling things out.

We want to stress to our members that should we move forward, it would be for a one year trial period whereupon we would make a final decision whether to stay in a shared ministry or to return to the way things were. We want to further stress, that this not a merger; it is shared ministry which would include the creation of a "parish" (for lack of a better word) with a name and logo to encapsulate what our shared goals and mission would be for the future - with a plan for "branding' and "marketing." All involved have expressed a high level of enthusiasm and consider this a unique and welcome opportunity.

Once the joint task force has reached a consensus, we will hold a congregational meeting in hopes of receiving a formal blessing from the members of OSC. As always, we welcome input and support (and prayers) from church members.
