I remain inspired by the passion and drive by so many in our church(es) to do what is necessary to continue our work and remain relevant. But please remember that it may look and feel different in the process. But this is actually a good sign that we are alive and well and doing our best to "be the church." Please, therefore, resolve with me to continue the effort in spite; to keep the faith and trust that God will help us find a way.
