Words From Wang - "Language Without Love"

If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. (1 Corinthians 13:1)

From the time we could speak, our parents taught us the importance of saying "please" when asking for something, and saying "thank you" when receiving something. The meaning behind these seemingly trite words is profound. In simple terms, it's all about common courtesy, a concept that has been lost to many in recent times. And with the current battlement of language and words these days, many of us still believe in the power of using words that build up and not tear down.

Our words are an expression of who we are and what we stand for. From politics to religion, our backgrounds and families of origin, even down to the teams we cheer for, with every word we utter there is always an underlying and inherent bias that conveys to others the essence of our very being. In short, our words are an extension of our personality; for better or for worse, a reflection of our true nature.

What we're hearing these days in our everyday language has gone beyond the level of disgusting. Common decency is sorely missing. But beyond some of the many profanities that are spoken even in the most casual settings, it's often the deceitful and disrespectful nature of our words, spoken and written, that are the most offensive. When speaking their minds, people no longer use filters. The level of irreverence and disrespect in our words is extreme and many people don't really care that their words offend.

This is the world we live in and I for one want to challenge each and every one of you to join me in a new revolt; that we call for a moral revolution of words. In short, that we hold people accountable for what comes out of their mouths. Maybe a metaphorical "Lifeboy" moment is in order (inspired by the generation that washed their children's mouth out with soap). And we can call it a "common language revival." This would require a return to the basics. So, we would do well to remember certain parental advice like "Mind your P's and Q's," whatever that means. That we reclaim the meaning of common courtesy.

So, if we considered launching this worthwhile revolt in November, then the obvious go-to theme for our common language revival would be in how we express gratitude; giving thanks to God and to one another.

There's an old phrase that we don't hear used much anymore; a phrase that conveys a stronger message than simply saying "thank you." That phrase is "much obliged." As the words imply, it's about showing gratitude but with a sense of obligation - that we owe something in return. So, when we give thanks to God, "much obliged, Lord" we're saying in essence, "God, I am indebted to you and want to repay you for all that you've done for me." Likewise, if we extend gratitude to a friend or loved one by saying, "much obliged, honey, mom, dad, brother, sister, or friend," it's like we're saying, "I owe you one."

Never has there been a better time for speaking words of kindness than the times we are living in. The theme of compassion runs deep in the gospels of Jesus Christ and as the Apostle Paul wrote, when we speak without love we're just like the clashing symbol. So, remembering what I said about words being an extension of who we are, as Christians we should therefore put our faith where our mouths are. Actions do speak louder than words but the words we speak are no less important. Speak therefore, that your words become a reflection of what you truly believe as a disciples of Christ. The time is now! For our words are the script that define us; what we believe, what's in our hearts, and how true we are to our calling.

Looking forward to December we are happy to announce the long awaited "A John Denver Christmas" featuring the music of the late singer songwriter.


The Old Stone Church Presents:
