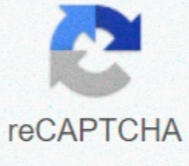

While Playboy is known for featuring obscene centerfolds and provocative photos of iconic women like Marilyn Monroe and Kim Kardashian, many issues mark moments in history, thus making some old Playboy magazines quite valuable. At just 27 years old, Hefner created what would become one of the most sought-after adult entertainment magazines to exist and a brand that still stands strong today. This was the first Playboy magazine issued. It initially sold for about \$0.50 in 1953 and is now worth thousands. During a 2015 taping of Pawn Stars, the issue sold for \$1,400, though they are expected to be worth much more. This issue sold at auction for \$431 in 2006, though some speculate it's now worth upward of \$1,500. In order for the magazine to hold value, it must be clean and show minimal signs of handling. It should also have the centerfold featuring Margaret Scott still intact. Mathes was the cover model and centerfold girl for the 1962 issue of Playboy. While we can't provide an exact value for this issue, eBaum's World says one sold at auction for \$4,000. A few others sold in 2019 for an undisclosed amount. Article continues below advertisement Article continues below advertisement A mint condition issue of Playboy featuring Bo Derek may be worth around \$12,000 as that is how much one sold for at auction, according to eBaum's World. The issue retailed for \$2.50 when it was released in 1980 (talk about a return on investment). Article continues below advertisement Article continues below advertisement Though you might find copies of this March 1980 issue selling for around \$40 on eBay, it's presumed that the original (in mint condition) with the centerfold still intact is where the real money lies. And if you'd like to sell it, there are a few places that might buy it. Antique dealers, auctioneers such as Live Auctioneers or Sotheby's, and pawn shops are often known to buy collector's items for a fair price. This is simply from the distributor or store owner handling it to unbox and place it on the shelf. Centerfold is intact and in perfect condition. Fine/Near Mint: Does not appear to have ever been read. Front and back covers are completely flawless. [62745484778.pdf](#) No scratches, folds, creases or blemishes of any type. The spine is also free of any scuffs or scratches. The delineator between FINE and NEAR MINT is that the staples on NEAR MINT will be in the best condition possible. In FINE condition the staples may show ageing but no rust. All inside pages will be flawless. The contents page and all others should be as white as possible considering the age of the magazine. The whiter they are, the more value the magazine carries.



Centerfold is intact and in perfect condition. Very Good: The issue has obviously been read and has a reasonable amount of handling evidence. Both covers should be free of any tears or folds. Some minor scuffing may be present. There should only be very small wrinkling near the staples but no tearing. All inside pages are intact and tight against the staples. Centerfold is completely flawless. No evidence of any humidity exposure. Sometimes we will add a plus or minus to the description for minor differences such as staple discoloration. Good: The cover will have obvious signs of wear and be only slightly pulling from the staples. Ordinary fading on cover and inside pages are allowed but nothing extensive. All pages including centerfold will be intact. Some folding at the upper corners of the pages is allowed. The staples may be rusted or discolored. Wear along the spine, or cover scuffing is permissible. We don't deal in issues in qualities less than the ones stated above. Sometimes the lower quality ones will arrive mixed in with collections we purchase. We put them on the site as LTP (Less Than Perfect) for around \$2.75.
