Dear Compatriots and Friends,



Honoring His Patriot Ancestor



Several months before our visit to Salem Belleman's Church for Allegiance Sunday, Compatriot David Loose made arrangements to obtain a government marker to be placed on the grave of his patriot ancestor, Johann Georg Loos, whose grave was unmarked. About a week before the Allegiance Sunday service, he visited the churchyard, after obtaining permission, and installed the new marker next to Johann's son, Jacob.

If your patriot ancestor is a veteran and his grave is unmarked, consider requesting a grave marker from the Department of Veterans Affairs. If you can prove service, the marker will be provided at no cost. You will, however, need to make arrangements to have it installed.

Chapter Recognizes Outstanding Cadets

The SAR awards the ROTC Medal to foster the principle of the "citizen-soldier", exemplified by the Minuteman of Revolutionary War days. This award is presented by a chapter, a State Society, or the National Society to ROTC or JROTC cadets who are selected for having a high degree of merit with respect to leadership qualities, military bearing and general excellence. The recipients are selected by the Commanding Officer of the ROTC or JROTC unit, who should be given full latitude in making the decision.

The SAR ROTC Medal is approved by the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force. Each service has notified its ROTC and JROTC units of this approval and has authorized presentation to its cadets or midshipmen.

Each of our five units has fewer than 500 cadets or midshipmen, thus one medal is awarded each year. The ROTC medal is struck on a circular planchet. The obverse shows a Minuteman holding a rifle and standing next to a plow, with the Liberty Bell in the background. It is inscribed with the letters "ROTC". The reverse is inscribed "Awarded for Leadership, Soldierly Bearing and Excellence to ______." The medal is suspended from a ribbon of the SAR colors. A ribbon bar in the SAR colors is included and a certificate is awarded as well.

When children get sick and their families need a place to stay, they go to a Ronald McDonald house. Well, when active-duty military and veterans get sick and their families need a place to stay, they go to a Fisher House.

The Fisher House Foundation is a public-private, nonprofit partnership that provides aid beyond that of the Departments of Defense and Veterans Affairs. Since our service personnel are stationed far and wide, sometimes they have to travel very far to seek specialized treatment. The Fisher House Foundation provides these service men and women and their families with "all the comforts of

home". This allows service members and their families to remain together, even as treatment is received. And you know what the best part is? **No family pays to stay at a Fisher House.**

There are currently 54 Fisher Houses located on 21 military installations and at 17 VA medical centers with 16 more houses under construction or in design.

This year's National Project is to raise funds that will then be donated toward building a Fisher House that still demonstrates need in April 2012.

And so, I humbly ask that you join me in "Living the American Dream" this year and supporting Fisher House.

"Let's Roll with PA C.A.R."

On September 11th,2001, the United States found itself under attack. Two planes were flown into the twin towers of the World Trade Center. One plane was flown into the Pentagon. Another flight was intended to attack some landmark in our capitol of Washington D.C. It was only through the acts of heroism on the part of the passengers onboard United flight 93 that fur-

ther destruction as averted. That flight crashed into a field near Shanksville, Pennsylvania, after a group of passengers stormed the cockpit and prevented the plane from reaching its intended target.

It is our project this year for PA C.A.R. to raise funds to donate towards the construction of the Flight 93 National Memorial. The memorial will honor the passengers of Flight 93, who stopped the terrorists from reaching their intended destination. A temporary memorial to the 40 victims was established soon after the crash, with a permanent memorial slated to be constructed and completed by 2011.

Eagle Scout Committee Report



No Respect For the Flag

On May 28th I watched the annual Memorial day Parade as it passed through Wyomissing. There were many flags passing by, even one huge flag carried by dozens of people.

But I observed none of the observers salute let alone remove hats and stand attention as the red, white and blue reminder passed by.

What has happened to our patriotism? Do we put more emphasis on the candy tossed out to the crowd and with the cries of delight as it is retrieved by the children?

Of course, the wearing of hats by the menfolk is a longforgotten thing, but rendering the salute of the hand over the heart is still the proper way to honor our country's flag

As the poem by Henry Holcomb Bennett said: "Hats off! The flag is passing by!"

Conduct During Hoisting, Lowering or Passing of Flag.

During the ceremony of hoisting or lowering the flag or when the flag is passing in a parade or in review, all persons present in uniform should render the military salute. Members of the Armed Forces and veterans who are present but not in uniform may render the military salute. All other persons present should face the flag and stand at attention with the right hand over the heart, or if applicable, remove their headdress with their right hand and hold it at the left shoulder, the hand being over the heart. Citizens of other countries

present should stand at attention. All such conduct toward the flag in a moving column should be rendered at the moment the flag passes.
