Chapter Compatriot Serving in Afghanistan

Compatriot Master Sergeant David Shultz has been serving in Afghanistan with the Afghanistan District of the Army Corps of Engineers. His unit handles construction on US bases, builds bases for the Afghan National Army and Police and builds quality roads. David is in charge of the Sharana Resident Office in Paktika Province. He oversees construction/quality assurance and manages the contracts for two Border Police posts and an Afghan Army garrison. Most of the unit is staffed by civilians. David says "the main reason for having military personnel at all is because the civilians are not allowed to carry guns."

David's tour of duty will end late in May. With any luck he may be home in time for our meeting on June 11th. But, we can certainly forgive him if he has higher priorities than attending the meeting.

Passing of a Compatriot

The Chapter mourns the passing of Compatriot Olan B. Lowrey. He passed away at his home in Limekiln on the afternoon of April 22nd. He was born in Plainview, TX in 1930 and attended Southwest Texas University after graduation from high school. He later earned his Masters Degree from the University of Iowa. Compatriot Lowrey served in the Army during the Korean War. After his discharge he went on to Baylor University School of Law. He worked for several law firms and after a career as a trial attorney he became a professor at the Beasley School of Law at Temple University authoring several books on land use and real estate law.

Liberty Tree is Planted in City Park





Thanks to the work of the Shade Tree Commission and City Arborist, David Ruyak, the City of Reading was the recipient of a Liberty Tree Memorial grant consisting of a 14 ft., disease-resistant American Liberty Elm and a commemorative bronze plaque which will be displayed in City Hall.

Reading has been named a Liberty Tree Memorial town and joins over 300 other towns across the country that have been granted this designation.

The tree was dedicated on April 24th in a ceremony in City Park. The Liberty Tree is a green and growing tribute to the birth of freedom in America.

The Original Liberty Tree

The original Liberty Tree was an elm tree near Boston Common. In the years leading up to the Revolution, the Liberty Tree was a rallying point for gatherings of patriots, most notably the Sons of Liberty, resisting the LIBERTY TREE Thomas Paine, 1775

In a chariot of light from the regions of day, The Goddess of Liberty came; Ten thousand celestials directed the way, And hither conducted the dame.

A fair budding branch from the gardens above, Where millions with millions agree, She brought in her hand as a pledge of her love, And the plant she named Liberty Tree.

The celestial exotic struck deep in the ground, Like a native it flourished and bore; The fame of its fruit drew the nations around, To seek out this peaceable shore.

Unmindful of names or distinctions they came, For freemen like brothers agree; With one spirit endued, they one friendship pursued, And their temple was Liberty Tree.

Beneath this fair tree, like the patriarchs of old, Their bread in contentment they ate Unvexed with the troubles of silver and gold, The cares of the grand and the great.

With timber and tar they Old England supplied, And supported her power on the sea; Her battles they fought, without getting a groat, For the honor of Liberty Tree.

But hear, O ye swains, 'tis a tale most profane, How all the tyrannical powers, Kings, Commons and Lords, are uniting amain, To cut down this guardian of ours;

From the east to the west blow the trumpet to arms, Through the land let the sound of it flee, Let the far and the near, all unite with a cheer, In defence of our Liberty Tree.

growing tyranny of Great Britain. During the Siege of Boston, a group of loyalists cut the tree down and used to wood for their fires. This served to enrage the patriots and may have been the inspiration for various Liberty Tree flags that were used during the Revolution. For many years the "Liberty Stump" remained a reference point for local citizens. Today a bronze plaque marks it's location.

Eagle Scout Committee Report

David Leinbach from Troop 510, the winner of our Scholarship award for 2008, will be honored at our Quarterly meeting, June 11 at which time he will receive a \$200 cash award and medal.

Fourteen Eagle Scouts participated in the 2008 State Scholarship Competition and the 1st place winner was Hobart K. Kistler, Centre Co Chapter. 2nd place was awarded to Garrett E. Schneider, Tiadaghton Chapter and third place went to Daniel H. Brynien, Philadelphia Continental Chapter.

Thirty-six young men competed for the 2008 National Scholarship Competition. At this level the 1st place winner was Gerrit S.Bakker of Alma, Michigan. 2nd place was awarded to Shawn A. Goldsmith of Oceanside, New York and third place went to Samuel A. Cain, II of Gastonia, North Carolina.

To date our committee has attended 26 Courts of Honor and we have 5 additional Courts scheduled so far through June. Unfortunately, we continue to have to decline Courts of Honor, 14 this time, due to too few personnel and scheduling conflicts of those ever-dedicated committee members. It is so unfortunate that we have been unable to attend such a large number of Courts of Honor so early in the year. We obviously need more help. Please consider giving a little of your time to honor these outstanding young men.



After many meetings with the members of City Council, Planning Commission, Historical and Architectural Review Board and Penn's Common Neighborhood Group, the monument has been approved!!

On March 23rd Reading City Council adopted Resolution 29-2009 shown above. The Planning Commission opted to place the monument between the Women Veterans and Submarine Veterans monuments. This means that our monument will be to the right of the Women Veterans monument not on the left as was depicted in the artist's concept above.

Once approval was secured, the monument was ordered from P. F. Eisenbrown. The foundation will be installed sometime this summer and the monument should be erected in September.

We have started planning a dedication ceremony for the monument to be held on Saturday, October 10th. At this time it looks like we will dedicate the monument in the morning and follow up with a luncheon. More details will be in the next newsletter. But, for now, MARK THE DATE ON YOUR CALENDAR!
