The Governor Jospeh Hiester Chapter Quarterly Meeting was held on September 14th, 2017 at The Inn at Reading in Reading, PA.







William Via: Sowing the Seeds of Liberty

Patriot William Via was a descendant of Amer Viah, a French Huegonot who fled persecution and whose family eventually made their way to the mountains in what is now Greene and Albemarle Counties in Virginia.

William was born near Brown's Cove in Albemarle County in 1761. Although he grew up not too far away from Charlottesville and the land that would become Monticello, the estate of Thomas Jefferson, the Via family lived a very different lifestyle than their affluent neighbors. Few records of the family remain but, like so many of their neighbors, they appear to have been subsistence farmers and likely practiced some type of trade to earn a little bit of money but no records have been found to say one way or the other. Family lore tells of the Via's having fruit orchards but again nobody knows for sure.

Early 1781 was a difficult period for the Revolution in Virginia. The Southern Continental Army had been captured at Charleston, SC in May 1780 and with other battlefield losses it was difficult to recruit new men to serve in the Continental Army. While we'll never know what actually prompted William to enlist, it's ironically possible that the economic devastation caused by the British raids throughout Virginia could have left him and others bitter toward the British and with few options. In any case, in March 1781, William enlisted to serve as a Private in Captain Beverly Roy's company of the 3rd Virginia Regiment of the Virginia Continental Line under the command of Col. Thomas Posey.

By May 1781, the regiment had moved to Cumberland Court House and was under the command of Colonel Christian Febiger with Posey his second-in-command. When Febiger first met the troops he reported that "the men were so literally naked." For the rest of the war, supplying the unit and clothing the soldiers would be an ongoing challenge.

When General Washington moved the army to Yorktown to corner the British there, the order went out for all available men to join the combined French and American armies. Posey and the regiment joined Washington at Yorktown and the General also noted in his report the men's dire need for clothing. Regardless of their attire, the unit participated in the siege and was on-hand to witness the surrender of the British forces. However, there was little time to relax. On October 23, the unit was ordered back to Cumberland Court House to meet with new recruits and get clothing before marching south to reinforce General Nathaniel Greene's army.

Rampant disease and lack of pay led to a near mutiny among the soldiers. The sickness and turmoil delayed the departure of the Virginians until February 1782 when they finally marched out of camp without new uniforms. When the unit finally met with General Greene's army in South Carolina, they were ordered to continue on to Savannah, Georgia to join with General "Mad" Anthony Wayne. They arrived there on April 7, 1782. While keeping the British bottled-up in Savannah the soldiers fought one pitched battle with the Creek Indians, British allies, who attacked the American camp about 3:00 am on June 24, 1782. The Americans were caught by surprise and in great disarray but rallied to defeat the attackers. Three weeks later the British evacuated Savannah and the regiment marched north to join General Greene in

South Carolina. William was discharged on November

2, 1782.

Our young patriot married Mary Craig on Dec. 7, 1784 and built a home on top of Pigeon Top Mountain, near White Hall, VA very near to where he grew up. There the couple raised a large family which included a son, Thomas Craig Via who would later serve during the War of 1812. William passed away on 27 June 1836 followed a few years later by Mary. The remains of their simple house, a crumbling stone fireplace, can still be seen by those hearty enough to venture up the mountain and bushwhack through the undergrowth. The family cemetery, marked only with field stones, is less discernible but the determined hunter can still find it on the mountain.

Veteran's Committee Report - Summer 2017:



During the past couple of months, I noticed that our Veterans Multi Corps Survey Forms were not being process for the Certificate of Patriotism. Looking into it, I was informed that Chairman of the VRC, Colonel Chuck Sweeney had passed away, and that all the Survey Forms and Certificates were stored away and locked in his

computers. I didn't know that he had taken this program under his wings, so he could make sure that all Veterans would be recognize for their Military Service in a timely matter. He put his heart and soul and money into this program to keep it going. I for one will sorely miss him.

Just recently, I received email from the new VRC Chairman Major Walt Timoschik, informing me that because they can't unlock the old computers, so this program has to be built back up from scratch.

But as of November 6th, VRC Committee has informed me that the SAR Veterans Recognition Committee has received the blank Certificates from National and is able to finally get back at work.

Veterans Services Corps Totals as of October 2017 is still the same as it was back in May, since no Certificates of Patriotism have been issued.

WII -402 There was a total of 1,021 Compatriots in this Corps.

Korea –188 Vietnam –501 SW Asia/Persian Gulf-105 Special Operations-44 Military Service-343

For all six Veterans Corps, 2,123 Compatriots have been issued Certificates of Patriotism.

Compatriots Jeffrey K. Beil and Floyd N. Turner II Military Survey Forms have been resubmitted as of November 6th for their NSSAR Certificates of Patriotism for Military Service.
