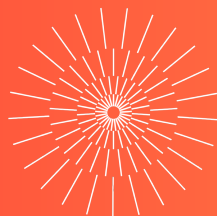

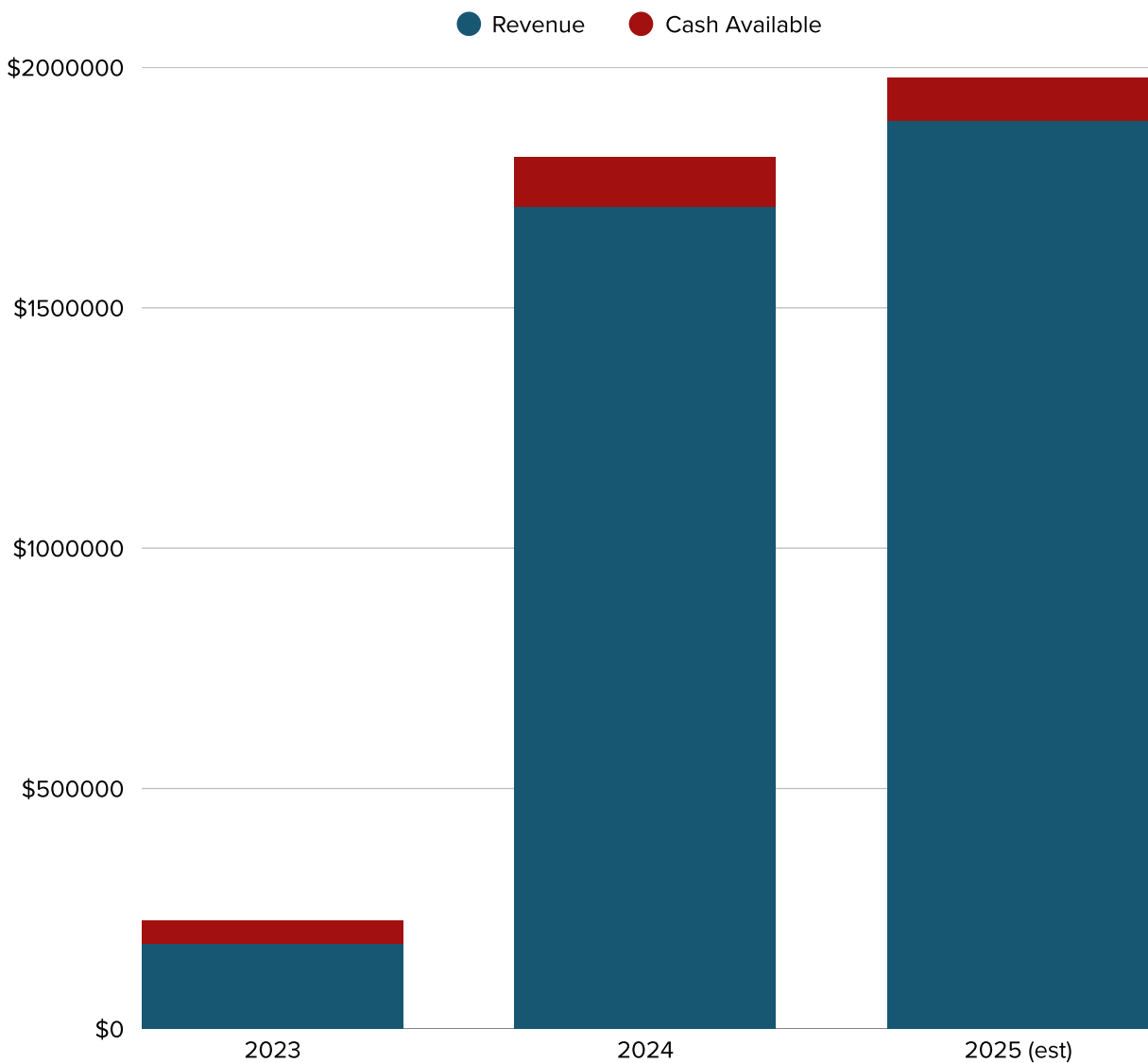

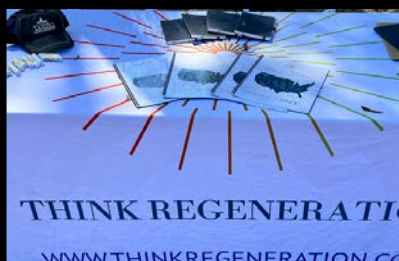

IMPACT SPOTLIGHT

Think Regeneration **improves local food supply systems** by building farmer-led capacity and connecting markets.



ILLINOIS: SCALING FARMER-LED DISTRIBUTION MODELS

Illinois farmer Marty Travis of Down at the Farms, LLC, has doubled in size in the past three years working in partnership with Think Regeneration. From fundraising for trucks that transport fresh fruits and vegetables to enabling cross-state knowledge transfer among farmers, Think Regeneration enables regional supply supply transformation.



They didn't start there, Marty always says we started with an 8x8 cooler on the farm.

The Travis family started with an 8x8 cooler and expanded to a 1,900-sq.-ft. distribution center managing food grown on dozens of Illinois farms. In 2025, the Traveses expanded their operation to a 20,000-sq.-ft. distribution center and launched a distribution line that will connect Illinois farmers to the Nashville restaurant market.



"It's not a transaction, it's a relationship. That carries through the whole ethos without a doubt. I don't need to say anything more than that—that's the core piece that keeps us engaged, that keeps Ryan and his team engaged. I know when I can bring people to learn about Think Regeneration, they're not looking to make a one-time donation. They're realizing that this is the real deal and that they care about the relationship and the work that they're doing."

IMPACT SPOTLIGHT

We are **creating new business models for food and agriculture**. From Illinois to Arizona, our partnerships demonstrate how farmers, ranchers, entrepreneurs, and all professions can work together to sustain regenerative agriculture.



ARIZONA: BUILDING A CLIMATE-SMART MODEL FOR THE FUTURE

Arizona farmer Dr. Yadi Wang has partnered with Think Regeneration for more than three years to build and grow regenerative food and fiber distribution to vulnerable communities in the U.S. Southwest.



In 2025, Dr. Wang was named farm manager over a soon-to-be-launched model farm in the region that will actively implement regenerative systems for 99 years via a novel 501(c)(25) model in collaboration with Farmers Land Trust and Moline Regional Community Foundation.

IMPACT SPOTLIGHT

Food Is Medicine has moved from concept to action. Think Regeneration is connecting farmers and healthcare providers to deliver nutrient-dense food as a clinical intervention for chronic disease. The journey begins in Illinois, where pilots are demonstrating the close connection between soil health and human health. Now, the momentum is accelerating across the country.



DOWN AT THE FARMS RX: FARMER-LED PILOTS

In 2025, Think Regeneration launched Down at the Farms Rx in Pembroke Township, Ill., offering nutrient-dense food to diabetic patients through local farmers. This first-of-its-kind program in partnership with Run-A-Way Buckers is already making a measurable difference.



This healthcare model is unique because it starts with improving biological soil health on the farm to improve the nutrient density of food.

The pilot will measure outcomes such as A1C decline and weight loss. Additionally:

- In July 2025, a strategic planning meeting convened farmers, ranchers, healthcare professionals, policy leaders, educators, and public health advocates to plan next steps in this growing initiative.
- Highlight: One patient in our Pembroke Township pilot has lowered their a1c levels from the 13 to 6, from uncontrolled diabetes to pre-diabetic conditions.
- The Future: A broader Food Is Medicine coalition is forming nationally. Think Regeneration held a national event called Advancing Food is Medicine that included more than 150 farmers and health care professionals. They also led multi-state discussions in the U.S. Southwest on Food Is Medicine for a land-grant research program funded by Washington State University and New Mexico State University.

IMPACT SPOTLIGHT

Community building is central to every Think Regeneration program. In addition to helping reshape how food is grown and distributed, Think Regeneration is breaking down siloes across the food system by connecting unlikely allies across regions, professions, and generations. Our gatherings consistently demonstrate the hunger people have to work together on programs to strengthen our communities.



REGIONAL BASED COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

For the past three years, the Spokane Conservation District has worked with Think Regeneration to build its BioFarming network among farmers in the region. In 2025, Think Regeneration played an integral role in launching the BioFarming App for local community groups, along with a curriculum that will be used to guide new farmers through a quick yet in-depth look at biological farming principles and practices. The idea had been incubated for years, and Think Regeneration served as a catalyst, supporting local leaders to turn a strong framework into actionable education and training resources.

In Champaign, Ill., Think Regeneration invited 25 leaders from different backgrounds to a facilitated dialogue about the future of the regional food system. The conversation drew 100% attendance, despite the fact that many of the participants had never met before. By the end of the meeting, attendees asked Think Regeneration to share their email addresses so they could continue connecting and taking action together.



Through programs such as Hiring Our Heroes and SkillBridge, Think Regeneration is bringing military veterans with deep life experience into the movement. Other initiatives are leveraging the passion, talent, and creativity of college students and career professionals from outside the regenerative movement.

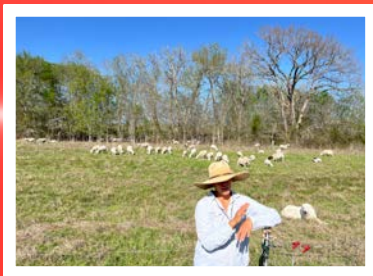

IMPACT SPOTLIGHT

Think Regeneration's **economic development** work is rooted in building business models that farmers and partners can sustain on their own. Three years on, from the Pacific Northwest to Texas to Illinois, we're seeing the beneficial outcomes of connecting regenerative agriculture to real markets and long-term land access.



DEVELOPING CIRCULAR ECONOMIES WITH THINK REGENERATION ENTREPRENEUR ECOSYSTEM (T.R.E.E.)

In the Pacific Northwest, our team is working with dozens of farms to create a land-access system designed for specialty crop farmers. The vision:

- Shift land use away from international commodity markets and into regional and local markets.
- Create opportunities for specialty-crop lease ownership so new and beginning farmers can thrive.
- Increase revenue per acre by focusing on diversified, high-value crops and local distribution.



This model offers a scalable path forward for this region and others like it: Farmers will grow more profitable crops. Consumers will gain access to fresh, local food. And communities will build economic resilience.



In Barton, Texas, Think Regeneration has established a formal partnership with Deeply Rooted Ranch. Our support is helping the ranch expand its fundraising capacity and organizational infrastructure, ensuring it can become a regional anchor for regenerative agriculture. This collaboration represents our broader strategy of pairing regenerative land stewards with the tools and resources they need to grow their impact.

At Think Regeneration, we don't just inspire change. We also **equip farmers and institutions** with the knowledge, tools, and support to make change happen and stick. Our technical assistance programs meet people where they are, whether our clients are family wheat farmers or college faculty. We walk alongside them as they transition to more resilient, nutrient-dense food systems.



TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE AND EDUCATION

Growing, Marketing, and Building Demand for Nutrient-Dense Food

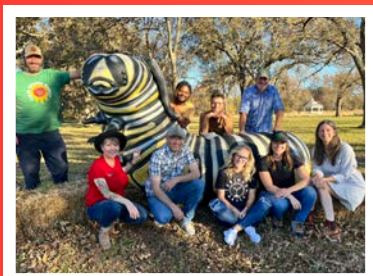
For three years running, we've supported Washington's Spokane Conservation District as they work directly with wheat farmers who are eager to diversify their crop mix and transition into growing nutrient-dense foods. The goal is ambitious yet practical: to build production that can be branded and marketed in local and regional communities. By combining regenerative practices with market development, Spokane farmers are beginning to see pathways that improve both soil health and farm income.



Training the Next Generation of Regenerative-Minded Agriculture Leaders

In partnership with Walla Walla Community College, Think Regeneration launched a leadership consulting practice to support the college's transition to a four-year curriculum focused on soil health and biological agriculture systems. This program is equipping the next generation of agriculture professionals with the skills they need to help communities thrive. More than that, it will ensure regenerative agriculture remains a viable career path for years to come at a time of tremendous change across the U.S. agriculture industry.





Identifying Barriers and Recommending Solutions for Greater Organic Farming Adoption

With funding generously provided by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Marketing Service, Think Regeneration implemented Transition to Organic Partnership Program (TOPP) funds to research and publish the TOPP Report on Barriers to Organic Agriculture. This study provides a critical blueprint for decision-makers seeking to understand the systemic challenges that face farmers who want to go organic, including certification hurdles and market access barriers. It outlines actionable strategies to overcome those obstacles for greater uptake of organic farming systems.

Practicing Excellence in Client Support, From Small Actions to Big Initiatives

Technical assistance doesn't stop in the field. Every member of our team provides hands-on support to farmers and partners navigating complex grants and compliance processes. Over the past year, our team has taken small but meaningful steps such as updating farmers' Wi-Fi connections and software to more time-intensive yet crucial initiatives such as helping them complete and submit 64-page grant applications.

LOOKING AHEAD TO 2026

We are building the next chapter of Think Regeneration's impact. Every year, we've grown our ability to support farmers, public health professionals, and other local leaders, and 2026 will be no different. Together with farmers, health systems, funders, and community leaders, we are laying the groundwork for transformation at scale.

IMPACT PREVIEW: **SCALING FOOD IS MEDICINE**

We are rolling our Illinois pilots statewide, ensuring families across the state can access nutrient-dense foods prescribed by their doctors. We are preparing to expand nationally, bringing our proven Food Is Medicine model to new communities ready to link soil health, nutrient density, and human health. New pilots are coming online beyond Pembroke and Peoria, with healthcare partners already lining up.

IMPACT PREVIEW: **GROWING MARKETS FOR FARMERS**

We are expanding specialty crop leasing models through Carnation Farms and partners, creating pathways for farmers to own land, grow high-value crops, and access local markets. We are strengthening distribution channels, such as the Illinois-to-Nashville restaurant pipeline, to connect farmers directly to buyers while increasing revenue per acre.

IMPACT PREVIEW: **BUILDING LEADERSHIP FOR THE FUTURE**

We are launching regional leadership cohorts to deepen the pipeline of regenerative leaders, including veterans, student leaders, and next-generation farmers. We are investing in capacity-building partnerships ensuring long-term viability for farmers and communities.



BOARD PRESIDENT

In 2022, I first accepted the position of president on the Think Regeneration Board of Directors to volunteer my time to the regenerative agriculture movement in partnership with my friend and longtime colleague Ryan Slabaugh. We are now finishing our third year, and it's been incredible to watch how much we have been able to grow our impact and business in the process.

The team at Think Regeneration is the foundation of our mission, which directs our impact and progress illustrated in this second annual report.

Even as we wrap up just their third year, Think Regeneration has proven to get results. It jumped right out of the gate and created meaningful change in communities in Illinois, Washington, Arizona, Oklahoma, Colorado, and beyond. For example, the regenerative agriculture leadership programs Think Regeneration has organized for the Spokane Conservation District underscore the importance of peer-to-peer learning and social support for transformation. In addition to putting boots on the ground, Think Regeneration is creating paths for entrepreneurs to help fill gaps in farming and food supplies across the country.

Think Regeneration has momentum, and its leadership team is building more partnerships daily. They have a strong work ethic, a commitment to long-term relationships, and an underlying base of deep trust with producers and the regenerative community. They're tackling some pretty complex problems and not shying away from them.

As a Board, we ask Think Regeneration to give a voice to people who operate small farms and ranches, and those finding success with regenerative systems at a larger scale.

The regenerative movement could lose its way easily, which is why Think Regeneration provides the necessary focus on specific activities

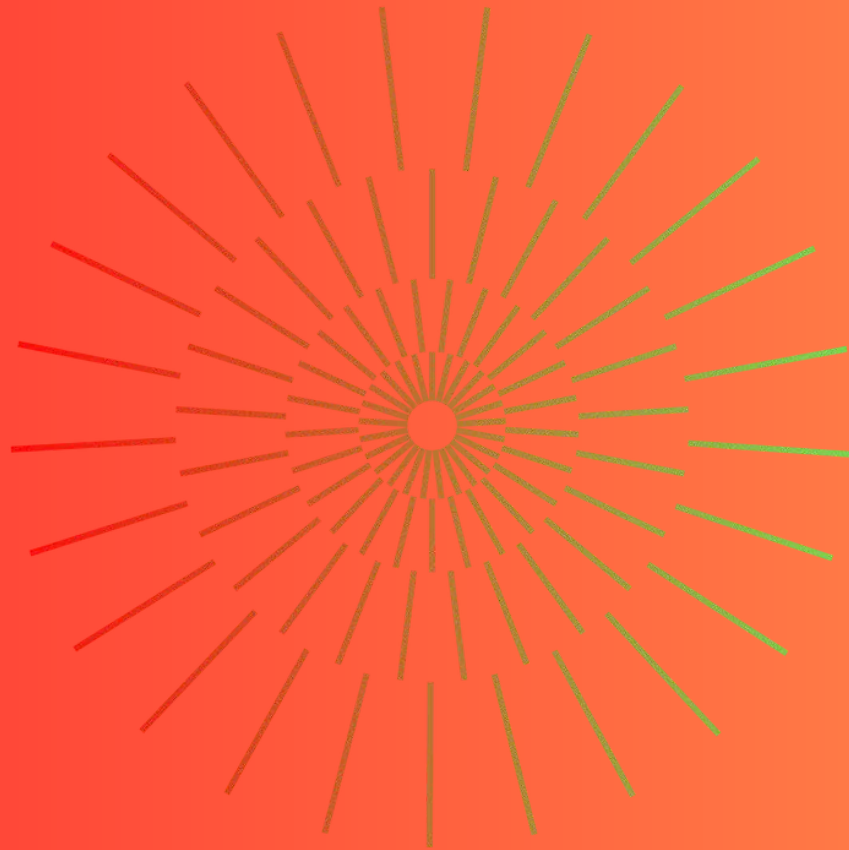
