
# I. The Foundation: A Legacy of Grandeur

# Forging a Dynasty of Power and Place

Soon, most of New York's upper-class families—including the Rockefellers, Roosevelts, and Kennedys—established residences here, cementing its status.



# An Architectural Tapestry Protected by Time

The character of the Upper East Side is preserved in brick and stone. Multiple overlapping historic districts ensure its architectural legacy—from Gilded Age mansions to stately pre-war apartment houses—remains an integral part of its modern identity.

- **Carnegie Hill:** Covering 400 buildings from 86th to 98th Street.
- **Park Avenue:** Encompassing 64 properties between 79th and 91st Streets.
- **Metropolitan Museum:** Properties on Fifth Avenue flanking the museum.
- **Upper East Side Historic District:** The largest district, running from 59th to 78th Street.


