VA HOSPITAL VISITATION TEAM

It is that time of the year when we start to get antsy about getting out and doing something now that the weather is warming up. We all want to get out and enjoy the new season and watch the flowers grow and the sun shining on our faces. It is also the time of year when a few of us decide that we made a commitment and must now start staying indoors a few hours every other week to visit the Veterans at the VA hospital.

We have made the commitment to see these veterans and try to bring a little joy into their lives at a time when they are near their lowest. It is never a good time to be feeling ill, tired, or just worn out and a lot of the veterans there in the hospital feel those feelings daily. They really light up when we walk onto the wards and start our visits.

The last visit we made we discovered that one of our regulars was in bed asleep. By looking at him we could see that he appeared to have slipped a lot since we saw him two weeks before that. He breathing was very shallow and his color was almost the same as a dirty white sock. Most of us felt that we have to admit he will not be with us much longer. It would appear his final orders are being processed.

With the thought of him receiving his final orders in mind I thought I would explain how a veteran is escorted to his final resting place after receiving his final orders.


Once the veteran passes, a message is sent out through out the hospital that John Jones, USXXX veteran has died. A time is set for his final salute. People from each and every unit of the hospital go to his ward and line the halls from his room to the exit door. A priest arrives and administers last rites over the body. The gurney is then draped with a flag and the group is called to attention. The gurney is then slowly taken past each of the people who render a final salute to the veteran. This procedure is the same for ALL veterans who get their final orders while in the hospital. This is a very solemn experience and one that each of us should witness at least once in our lives.

With that in mind, I guess I will gladly get up, put on my red shirt and meet the rest of the VA hospital team the second and fourth Thursdays at 2:00P.M. to visit the veterans who still remain patients at the hospital and thank them for their service and wish them a speedy recovery. We always have room for one more if you feel you would like to join us.
