

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

More on the Battle of Belleau Wood

This letter was written by Nina Staben, (Young Marines Master Sergeant) as a school assignment. It fit in nicely with the Battle of Belleau Wood presentation given by Mel Ellingsen at out last meeting.

Dear Beloved Momma,

If you get this letter, that means I'm alive. I served with 5th Marine Regiment and Captain Williams was our Commander of the 51st Company. We were accompanied by the French XXI Corps. We were about 30 miles South from Chateau-Thierry. The uniforms that the Marine Corps issued us were hot and thick like I was working in a factory without any windows for ventilation. I was in the 4th squad, led by squad leader Sgt Lilly. He always had something to say when no one was talking. The French Army wanted to turn back. Our Division was known for Marine snipers, so we were okay. We already made our first checkpoint at Lucy-le Bocage. Captain Williams said, "Retreat? Hell, we just got here!" The officers were talking 'bout how the Germans are taking their position North of Belleau. Heading North to Belleau, we crossed through a wheat field flooded by German positions. Marines were dropping left and right like flies. Eight hundred yards doesn't seem far, but when you're being shot at, it's much harder.

After the fight, the field looked like a slaughterhouse. A pool full of blood. Our men were everywhere on the field, dead. Praying that I wouldn't die, I hid in a German hole in the ground next to a dead soldier. I lost my helmet trying to find safety. I found one; it wasn't mine, but it kept me safe. I've never ran so fast in my life. It was already June 6th and we were running on fumes with no chow or water for two days. I met a good buddy of mine named Cpl Locke. He always motivated us, but it wasn't until another German position broke fire on us that we lost our motivation. In another sense, we lost a good friend too. I watched my best friend die that day as he was shot in the chest. I held him in my arms as he took his last breath. We had a failure in our position, so the Germans got as close as 50 miles to Paris. Pvt Heisel shook me awake as I heard the sound of German mortars firing about 500 yards away. As Marines plunged forward, 1st Sgt Dan Daly from 6th Marines yelled out, "Come on ya sons of bitches, ya want to live forever?" We ran low of ammunition so, our squad leader said until you see the whites of their eyes, don't shoot.

The night of June 8th seemed terrifying to hear nothing, but the sound of insects chirping. We finally got to eat our rations that night after two days of nothing. And then, I thought of your homemade fried chicken. It made me think of how good peach cobbler sounded right then. I closed my eyes and remembered hearing the laughter of soldiers. It was so sad that they don't know their lives are going to be taken the next day.

More on the Battle of Belleau Wood (continued)

June 9th, we finally reached Belleau Wood at 0430. I look down realizing my boots are drenched in blood. I walked through my brothers flesh for which they have given up their lives for others.

June 13th at 2100 finally felt normal when the boys and I were sitting in a trench playing cards. I closed my eyes and pictured grandpappy and big brother playing cards on a summer night. I snapped to reality and heard Germans in the woods. By the time we tried to get out of our trench, more than half of my squad was gone. I was surrounded by German Soldiers. Fighting was really hard because of how dark it was. I was pinned down by a soldier, trying to fight with everything I had. I manage to get him off me, only to see Sgt Lilly shot in the thigh. Running towards him, the Germans start to spray the woods with gas. I pulled off a mask from a dead soldier and held it over Lilly as he slowly took his last breaths of clean air.

Days go by of fighting and yelling and other days filled with dead, lifeless silence. We finally cleared the woods; I walked out into an empty field and the first thing I did was to drop down and cry. Tears of joy, sadness, fear and anger just poured out.

The Germans have pinned the title "Devil Dogs" on us, for our ferocious fighting. This battle may not have won the war, but it prevented us from losing it. We may have exterminated the Germans, but they took my brothers. Now, I'm ready to head home with hopes that they go home peacefully too.

I'm coming home Momma, I'm coming home.
