COMMANDANT'S COMMENTS

Good morning quarantine shut-ins! I am hoping that all of you are doing well on this dreary day. The weather seems to be fitting in with the rest of the situation right now. Everything seems to be a little bleak at the moment. We know though that if you wait a little while the weather will change here in Illinois. So too, we hope, will this situation soon change.

I am hoping that most of you are following the guidelines put out by the State and the CDC on how to handle yourselves. I must say, I am not following those guidelines. I have been out and about for the past six weeks or so delivering food and other things to people who need help.

I have been working with Mission BBQ to feed our US Sailors at the Naval Base at least once weekly. Many of them finished Boot Camp or their service schools and cannot be transferred to their next duty station. This has led to a great increase in people aboard the station, and with social distancing; it is very difficult to get into the chow halls to eat. We have even gone to the Recruit side to feed the Company Commanders when they were recalled to the Base for quarantine until this is over. While I do not recommend this activity for any of you, I have been doing well with it and find it really rewarding. They have enough to deal with being separated from their families that they know a just a few miles away but can't see. Then they have to go about training the next generation of sailors. They are so thankful for us being there for them.

In a short while we are going to have some restrictions with the quarantine. I would like to caution you at this time to be very careful what you do the first few days of that relaxation of restrictions. I would hope that all of you would take actions cautiously when venturing out. Just because restrictions are lifted will not mean that it is truly safe to jump back into crowded areas and began mingling with groups of people. Once people began coming out of their homes there will be an upturn of infections once again if people are not careful. It will not mean that is totally safe to go where you want.

I would suggest that you be very careful what you do. If you go out to eat, try to find a place that isn't crowded. Try to eat outside if they have a space. Get your food and eat in a park someplace. You are still outside and still not close to people. Will people still get sick, Yes. Will people still die, Yes. There will still need to be a concern for your safety.

I believe this. If there is a problem and you know about it you have two choices or options. If you can do something about the problem, do it. If you can't do anything about it, don't worry about it. Worrying will not help the situation and will only make matters worse for you. Until we meet again I am hoping that you are able to handle all your problems. Stay safe and healthy. We will be together before you know it. Let's make sure that we all get there. See you soon. If you need anything just call or text and let me know. We will see if we can make it happen. We have to, we are Americans!


As we continue to “shelter in place” let’s not despair, isolation doesn’t

I remember a Friday evening when my lady and I were out to a local restaurant and as we were walking to our table spotted two couples we knew. My lady continued following the waiter to the table while I stopped to say, “Hello”. The one asked me why I was not a member of the Marine Corps League, and I replied I didn’t know anything about it. He started to tell me, and I said, “Not now, another time. She is waiting at our table”. The following Sunday afternoon, who should come around the corner of the house with an MCL application in hand but Will and after a very lengthy and impressive presentation, I signed it.

Not long after I first joined, the Detachment was just beginning the annual Toys for Tots Drive. The Commandant called me and said to get my sorry a— out of the house. He was stopping by to pick me up and we were going to deliver some toy boxes to several charities. Okay, whatever! We drove to the Children's Advocacy Center in Gurnee where we proceeded to carry in several boxes of toys.

As we continued carrying armloads of fuzzy animals and other kids’ stuff, the workers there had tears in their eyes as we unloaded box after box for them. I was hooked!

The next week, he called again and told me he was sending me out with the Quartermaster to load boxes on the trailer. I didn’t know the QM. Hell, I didn’t even know we had one, but showed up. Tried to carry on a conversation with the Marine driving the car to no avail. If I made a statement, all I heard was silence. If I asked a question, all I got back was a grunt. Could not figure out why he was mad at me. He wasn’t, I found out later. After several hours in that car we became more conversant and I had a new friendship that endures to this day. Such was my introduction to Toy.

Several months later while leaving a meeting at In-Laws, I was passing the patio area when I heard a voice, “Hey, Rookie, you’d be a great candidate for the Color Guard if you would shave that fuzz off your face”. That was my introduction to Russ, and many hours of sitting at his table listening to more stories.

I also listened to a Captain explain how in his first duty assignment, as a young Lieutenant he picked the tallest Marine he could find as his radioman because he knew a tall one would dig a deeper fox hole for them. That was Jim.

One week-end while “shaking the can” for Toys for Tots, I was writing names of those attending. One of them asked me why I was doing that, and I told him it was to prepare one of the participation certificates for those who came out. He said, “Forget the certificate, they have never spelled my name correctly on one”. I said it would be correct this time, and it was. I knew that a persons’ name is a very personal possession and as such is very important. That was my introduction to Ed.

I listened as two Marines discovered they were in the very same place in Viet Nam only a month or so apart. They laughed and talked excitedly about being in the same places. The rest of us shared their experiences as they shared with each other around the table.

The reason I mentioned all these, and there are more, believe me, is those occurrences happened at Detachment events. I learned more about our Detachment and the members by attending these functions. After a nearly 60 year hiatus, I was re-introduced to the Marine Corps.

What better way to spend an evening then sitting at a table with your favorite beverage/snack and swapping lies with good friends that have shared similar experiences. Every one of us is uniquely different, but every one of us are also in many instances the same. “Every Marine a Rifleman! Once a Marine, Always a Marine”.

Thank God, Will buttonholed me all those years ago. Think of all the good times and great people I have met. Priceless!!! Thanks Will!

We cannot now sit and visit safely at a table, but we can visit over the phone. Why not give it a try and introduce another Marine to the Marine Corps League?
