



### The perils of pest protection

Most conventional flea and tick products—including collars, topical treatments, sprays, and dusts—are registered as pesticides and regulated by the EPA. (Those given orally, like pills, must be approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.) But here's the ugly truth: Many of the pesticides allowed for use on pets are linked to serious health issues in people, such as cancer and neurological and respiratory problems. Pets can also suffer: Skin irritation, neurological problems, gastrointestinal disorders, and even organ failure have been reported as a result of pet poisonings.

The government has faced criticism from NRDC and other watchdog groups about insufficient safety standards for these products. Consumers, as well as some veterinarians, don't know the whole story, says NRDC senior scientist Miriam Rotkin-Ellman. "Many vets count on the EPA to make sure that the products on the market are safe if used correctly." Unfortunately, the ingredients in these products are still quite dangerous, and regular use can result in unsafe exposure, particularly for children and pregnant women.

For example, even low-level exposure to organophosphates and carbamates—two particularly dangerous families of pesticides found in some flea treatments as well as in agricultural and lawn products—have been linked to learning disabilities in children. For this reason, most household uses of these pesticides have already been banned. Unfortunately, kids can still be exposed to them from their furry siblings' flea collars or other products.

Going nontoxic. Fortunately for many families, fleas can be controlled without resorting to harmful chemicals. Always try the strategies below first before considering chemicals—safer chemicals—if additional protection is needed. Here's what you can do:

**Groom your pets regularly.** Common soap and water will kill adult fleas. In addition, comb your animal's fur with a fine-tooth flea comb, and dunk any critters into a container of sudsy water.

**Clean, clean.** Wash your pet's bedding weekly in hot, soapy water, and vacuum and wipe down pet-frequented surfaces often.

# **How Chemical Lawn Care is Hurting Your Dog and How to Keep Them Safe**

Research has shown that certain chemicals in some lawn care products have been directly linked to an increase in canine cancers like lymphoma and bladder cancer.



# How does lawn care impact my dog's chances of developing cancer?

It's probably not a surprise to you that chemical lawn care can have an impact on anything it comes into contact with, not just the grass underneath it. You, your dog, any children, and wild animals that come into contact with treated lawns can be directly impacted by it.

One of the main reasons for the danger comes from a commonly used chemical herbicide called 2,4-Dichlorophenoxyacetic acid (2 4-D). Which has been directly linked to a 70% higher risk for canine malignant lymphoma by the Journal of Environmental Research in 2012.1-8

But 2 4-D isn't the only dangerous chemical. According to a newsletter by beyondpesticides.org "Of 30 commonly used lawn pesticides, 19 have studies pointing towards carcinogens, 13 are linked with birth defects, 21 with reproductive effects, 15 with neurotoxicity, 26 with liver or kidney damage, 27 are sensitizers and/or irritants and 11 have the potential to disrupt the endocrine (hormonal) system.

# What homeowners should look out for in lawn care products

When you have control over your own lawn care, there are plenty of ingredients to avoid adding to your lawn. The problem is that lawn care products are not required to list all of their ingredients, only the active ingredients, which means that there is always a chance that even when you do everything right, you are still endangering the people and animals that come in contact with your lawn.

That being said, some active ingredients you absolutely want to stay away from aside from 2 4-D would be:

- Bifenthrin: commonly used in grub and insect control products. It's listed as a possible carcinogen by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.
- Glyphosate: an herbicide that is non-selective, it kills plants by taking away nutrients and weakening the immune system. It has been linked to kidney disease, cancer, and birth defects. It's commonly found in Round-Up weed killer.
- Atrazine (1,2): a widely used herbicide in the U.S. that was banned in Europe in 2004, it's been linked to being an endocrine disruptor.

Almost any chemical product that is designed to kill an aspect of your natural lawn—insecticide, pesticide, herbicide, etc.—will be a detriment to your and your dog's health in the long run. Even many chemical fertilizers are dangerous as well. If you are trying to put your pet first, changing your lawn care from anything chemical-based to a more natural and organic method of care would be best.1-8

### Other options for lawn care

Though the challenge of developing an organic lawn care system may prove to be more time consuming than buying a bottle of Round-Up and calling it a day, it is better for everyone in direct contact with your yard and for the future health of the planet as well.

To transition to a more natural lawn care system will take a bit of research on your part, but once you know what you're looking for and what needs you want to be met, it's as simple as keeping the ingredients on hand.

Think of the products that you use on a regular basis. What are they for? What are they doing to your lawn? Then it's as easy as Googling how to do that same thing naturally.

Weed killer? Replace with corn gluten meal (a natural weed killer and fertilizer).

Pest control? Try diatomaceous earth and boric acid. A little bit of time spent researching could possibly add years to your pet's life.





I tried one myself. I made them with healthy human food, so why not? However, I thought they were bland. With a little strawberry jam, it might have been better for humans. However, the dogs! It was love at first bite!

Have I mentioned how easy it is to make these things? Making homemade dog treats can be a little intimidating at first if you're not used to it.

Although most of the ingredients may already be in your pantry or refrigerator, so you won't rack up a huge bill. An added benefit is knowing that your pup is eating foods without preservatives, gluten, and other unhealthy preservatives -- And they're organic!

### **Organic Strawberry Oatmeal Cookies**

### **Ingredients**

1 ½ cup organic oats

1/3 cup peanut butter (I use Organic Smucker's Organic Natural Creamy Peanut Butter)

½ cup chopped organic strawberries

### **Instructions**

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350° degrees Fahrenheit.
- 2. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper.
- 3. Grind the oats in a food processor or high speed blender.
- 4. Add the chopped strawberries and peanut butter, and pulse. \*\*If this doesn't work perfectly to make a solid dough, remove the mixture and place into a bowl, then mash mixture with a potato masher, until it makes a nice solid dough.
- 5. Roll the dough out on a clean, flat surface.
- 6. Use the cookie cutter to cut shapes, and place the shapes onto the baking sheet.
- 7. Bake for 15 minutes.
- 8. Remove from the oven and set on a baking rack until completely cooled.
- 9. Place treats into an airtight container, and store in the refrigerator for up to 2 weeks.

(I use Organic Smucker's Organic Natural Creamy Peanut Butter – only ingredient is peanuts!)
