Overview


The following statements reflect a sample of some of the important information contained in the MDIV Evaluation Survey. There is more to be gleaned from a careful review of the survey results.

- When asked where they acquired most of their Biblical knowledge, students indicated that 83% came from Lectures and 16% from Assignments and Reading.
- When asked which of the following shaped their Biblical Worldview, students indicated that 75% came from Lectures; 12% Class Presentations; and 12% from Chapel Services or Sermon.
- When asked which of the following shaped their spirituality during their HTU education, students indicated that 14% came from Lectures; 28% from Chapel Service or Praise; 28% from Sermons; 14% from Class Presentation or Group Discussion; and 14% from Fellowship or Association with other classmates.
- When asked which of the following shaped their values and attitudes at HTU, students indicated that 53% came from Lectures; 13% from Chapel Service; 13% from Sermons; 6% from Assignments or Reading; 6% from Counseling or Association with other classmates; and 6% from Class Presentation or Group Discussions.
- When asked about the source of most of their general knowledge; students indicated that 55% came from Lectures; 11% from Chapel Service; 11% from Sermon; 11% from Assignments and Readings; and 11% from Class Presentation or Group Discussion.
- ➤ When asked which of the following helped shape their personal skills, students indicated that 100% came from Lectures.
- When asked which of the following were helpful in developing their communication skills, students indicated that 21% came from Lectures; 42% from HTU community; 14% from Fellowship or Association with other classmates; and 14% from Christian Service Program.
- ➤ When asked which of the following played a major role in advancing their problemsolving skills, students indicated that 21% came from Lectures; 14% from Chapel or Sermon; 14% from Assignment or Reading; and 21% from Counseling.


