

FAA Approved Altitude—As reported earlier, the FAA has granted waivers to fly above 400 feet AGL at AMA flying sites. Clubs with fields in Class E airspace are approved for 700 feet AGL while club fields in Class G airspace are approved for 1200 feet AGL. We are fortunate to be in Class G airspace and therefore approved to fly up to 1200 feet AGL. About half of the AMA clubs in Iowa are only approved to fly up to 700 feet AGL. Those limited to 700 feet include: Marshalltown RC Flyers, New Hampton RC Crossed Signals, and Cedar Rapids Skyhawks.

Club Meetings

Commercial Drone Pilot's License—I will be teaching a class at Hawkeye Community College (Cedar Fall Campus) starting on Monday, November 3rd. The class is 4 two-hour sessions on Monday and Thursday evenings at 6PM. Advance sign up is required on the Hawkeye website.

Why would you want a Commercial Drone Pilot's License? Recreational R/C pilots have several limitations. For one, you cannot do anything with an R/C airplane or drone that earns you money. New rules are coming that will allow commercial drone pilots to fly beyond the visual line of sight. Drones now have the capability to fly up to 5 miles from the operator, which is well beyond line of sight. Anyone wanting to fly beyond visual line of sight (BVLOS) will need a commercial drone pilot's license. Flying multiple drones by once (i.e., a swarm) also requires a commercial license.

More Drone News—Presidential Executive Orders were recently signed increasing federal enforcement and prosecution of anyone violating FAA air restrictions or endangering the public. The Executive Order stated that drones (and model airplanes) pose a growing threat as criminals, terrorists, and hostile foreign actors increasingly weaponize these technologies to endanger public safety and national security The latest tools for detecting, tracking, and identifying drones will be made available to law enforcement, the Joint Terrorism Task Forces that are present for mass gathering events, and private operators of critical infrastructure.

The FAA Administrator is instructed to make Notices to Missions (NOTAMs) and Temporary Flight Restrictions (TFRs) freely available online for drone geofencing and Aircraft Navigation and Guidance system purposes. (Editor's Note: These already are available for free online.)

The FAA Administrator is to publish an updated roadmap for the integration of civil Unmanned Aircraft Systems (aka drones and model aircraft) into the National Airspace System, and use artificial intelligence tools to streamline and expedite drone waiver reviews. In other words, streamline the process to allow drones and manned aircraft fly together in the National Airspace.

Chinese Drone Ban—DJI, Autel Robotics and other Chinese drone manufacturers are on the verge of being banned in the United States by federal lawmakers who accuse the company of a variety of infractions, including benefiting from unfair subsidies and being a cybersecurity threat. Representative Elise Stefanik (R-New York) placed a provision into a defense bill that would ban the sale of new drones by Chinese companies in December 2025.

Sales could continue if a national security agency determines that the foreign drones do not "pose an unacceptable risk to the national security of the United States." But the bill did not state which agency is responsible for making that assessment, and so far, none have publicly taken on the task.

If the ban goes through, it will prevent new Chinese drones from receiving FCC licenses to fly. It would not immediately affect the hundreds of thousands of Chinese drones that already have permission to fly in the US. But over time, Chinese drones would fade away in the United States, as customers would not be able to repair or replace them. DJI is the world's largest drone manufacturer and has about 80% market share in the US.
