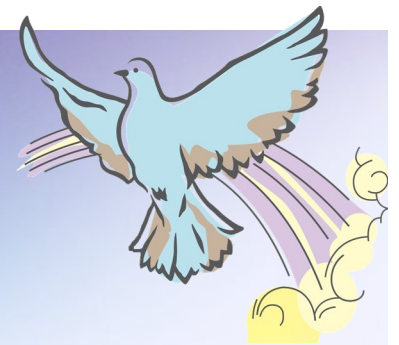

Palms



When Jesus entered Jerusalem days before his death, crowds welcomed him by waving palm branches, which were common symbols of victory and rejoicing. Thus, churches continue to use them in remembrance of that occasion, knowing that Jesus' crucifixion was ultimately his triumph over sin and death. As early as Leviticus 23:40, God commanded Israel to use palms in a festival of rejoicing. In Revelation 7:9-10, Christian martyrs carry palm branches as they praise the Lamb before the throne of God.

Easter is God's great affirmation of the earth and all it contains. The day when God says Yes to chocolate eggs and white bunnies, little girls' pretty dresses and elaborate family dinners, trumpeting lilies and bodies of flesh and blood.

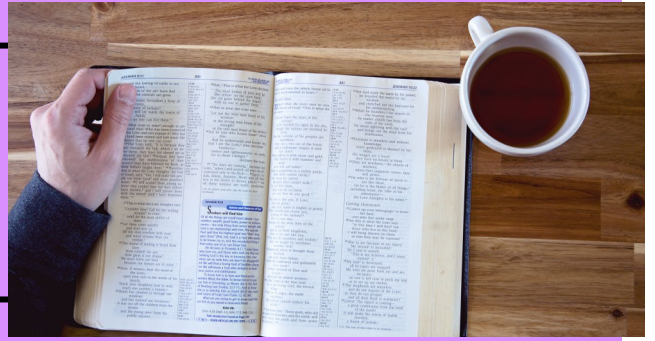

April Devotion



An Obvious Cure

And they said, "Believe in the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved, you and your household." And they spoke the Word of the Lord to him and to all who were in his house. Acts 16:31-32

The other day I had the opportunity to speak to a man who had, as a young boy, contracted polio.

He shared with me how he had been an active child, but one day woke up and couldn't get out of bed. Let me repeat that again: He woke up and couldn't get out of bed. Literally.

He shared the problems and pains he had suffered trying to reclaim his life. His story was a magnificent narrative of the power of God, the workings of a loving family and a powerful, positive spirit.

As I heard that story, I said a silent prayer giving thanks that polio had been almost eradicated. Almost.

A week or so ago the World Health Organization reported that polio has been found in China for the first time since 1999. Even more, they believe there is a high risk of the debilitating virus spreading because of the yearly Hajj, the Islamic pilgrimage which will take place in early November.

When I heard that news I thought why should there be polio when there is such an easy and obvious preventative? The World Health Organization answered that question. It said polio was showing up in remote locations where financial cutbacks had reduced the administration of the vaccine.

Maybe I shouldn't have been surprised. For almost 2,000 years there has been, in the precious blood of the Savior, a cure for the always-fatal consequences of unforgiven sin. And even though faith in the Christ has always guaranteed eternal life, there are many who remain doomed.

You know, it's a tragic thing when physical and spiritual cures aren't delivered because there isn't enough money. It's a terrible thing to know that someone will die physically or spiritually because those with the remedy didn't get it to the people who needed it the most.

Yes, it's a sad thing, and it's a preventable thing.



This takes us to the twofold purpose of this devotion. Parents, please check to see if your child's polio shots are up to date. And fellow Christians, do all you can to support missions that share the Savior's story of salvation with lost sinners.

The Prayer: Dear Lord, in our prayer we paraphrase the hymn writer who said, "Let none hear us idly saying, 'There is nothing we can do,' while the souls of men are dying and the Master calls for you. Let us take the task He gives us gladly, let His work our pleasure be, let us answer quickly when He calls out, 'Here am I. Send me, send me!'" In Jesus' Name. Amen.

[Jesus said,] "When they deliver you over, do not be anxious how you are to speak or what you are to say, for what you are to say will be given to you in that hour. For it is not you who speak, but the Spirit of your Father speaking through you." (Matt 10:19-20)



It should go without saying that a witness of Jesus Christ is wholly dependent upon the Holy Spirit to be effective.

Seeking the Holy Spirit is something we do even before we begin a conversation with a non-churched person and continue to do throughout that conversation.

It's a good reminder that the LASSIE approach is not a series of steps to be executed in sequence but rather elements of witnessing that often occur in a way that seems haphazard to us.

But God does not act haphazardly. We can always be confident that the Holy Spirit who

dwells in us is also at work in us. Trust the Holy Spirit and follow His lead. The best way to seek the Holy Spirit is to meet Him where He has promised to be.

We know that the Holy Spirit works through the Means of Grace. There is no better preparation to be a witness than to be active in the Word and Sacrament ministry of your congregation.

With Christ's good gifts, we receive the Holy Spirit, who guides us in our conversations with the people to whom we are witnessing.

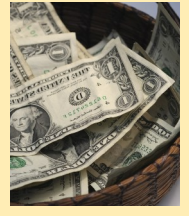
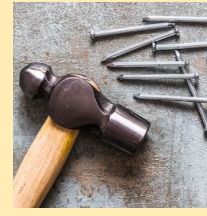

Blessed

“Blessed shall you be in the city, and blessed shall you be in the field. Blessed shall be the fruit of your womb and the fruit of your ground and the fruit of your cattle, the increase of your herds and the young of your flock. Blessed shall be your basket and your kneading bowl. Blessed shall you be when you come in, and blessed shall you be when you go out” (Deut. 28:3-6).

This is God’s promise to the Israelites as they stood beyond the Jordan outside of the Promised Land. He promises blessing to His people. He will make them prosper, whether they are in the city or the field. He will make their fruit of their work to prosper, whether from the ground or their wombs, their flocks or their herds. He will make them to prosper in all things, whether upon their coming in or their going out.

But there’s a catch. He would do this for Israel only “if you obey the voice of the Lord your God” (Deut. 28:2b) If they did that, He would cause that “all these blessings shall come upon you and overtake you” Duet. 28:2a)

If they didn’t obey the voice of the Lord, if they didn’t keep the commandments of the Lord and walk in His ways (Deut. 28:9), they would be met with curse and woe. The blessings would be replaced with curses. Everything that the Lord promised to prosper and bless would be cursed and fail.

Thanks be to God that our Lord Jesus Christ has come into our flesh, fulfilled the law for us – in our place and for our benefit; died for us – in our place and for our benefit; and is risen from the dead for us – in our place and for our benefit.

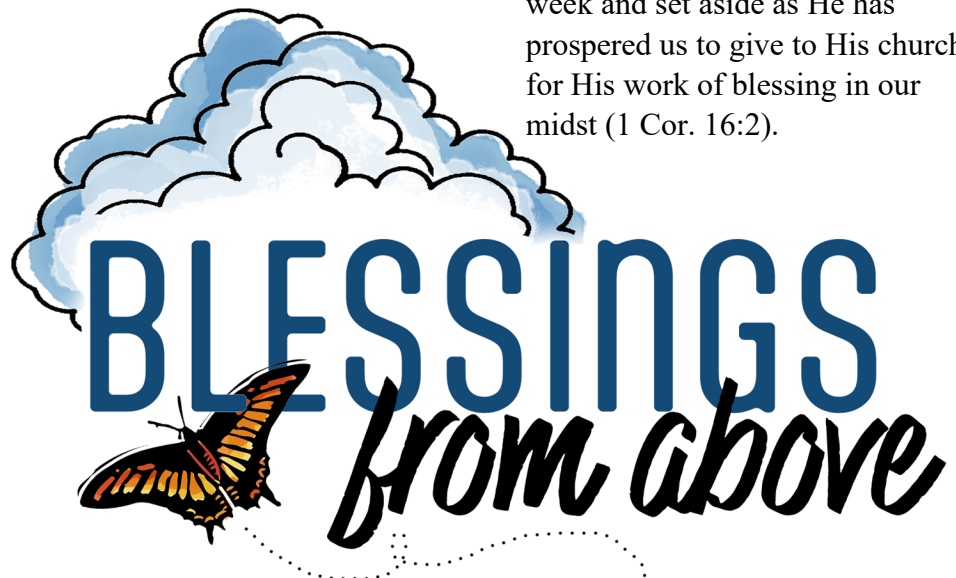
By this we have justification before God. We are forgiven, clean, holy, and righteous. The blessing of God is promised to us

in Christ Jesus. It depends upon His work and not ours.

All this is ours in Holy Baptism. For in Holy Baptism, God claims us as His own, makes us His children, His heirs, His holy people. And so it is that the work of our hands and its fruit is holy because we are holy in Christ. It is pressed into His service, and thereby it becomes a blessing to us and to our neighbor.

For this great gift, our reception of the blessings of God because of Christ Jesus our Lord, it is our duty to thank and praise, serve and obey Him. This is not in order to receive blessings but because in Christ we already have.

It is with this in mind that we sit down on the first day of the week and set aside as He has prospered us to give to His church for His work of blessing in our midst (1 Cor. 16:2).

March 11 Council Meeting

President Brock Kliewer called the meeting to order at 6:30 P.M. Pastor Brandt opened with prayer.

The following board members were present: **Pastor** Gary Brandt, **President** Brock Kliewer, **Vice President** Noah Estes, **Secretary** Susan Kral, **Evangelism** Cindy Kaminski, **Cemetery** Diane Borgmann, and **Church Members** Pat Callahan and Jayne Marie Trick

Absent: **Treasurer** Peg Callahan, **Financial Secretary** Brett Niebur, **Elder** Jeff Hedberg, **Trustee** Chuck Kral, and **Stewardship** Dawn Hedberg

The minutes from the January 12, 2025 meeting was approved as printed. There was no February meeting due to weather conditions.

Financial Secretary: Brett Niebur submitted a written report. The February profit and loss statement shows a year-to-date loss of \$7310.00. Payments to our missions totaled \$5207.61. The trash service was paid for all of 2025. The amount was \$278.44. Several snow removals cost a total of \$1060.00. With these charges in mind, our income statement is not as negative as it appears. He is confident that we are financially sound starting out in 2025. His report was accepted and approved.

Treasurer: Peg's report included the following:

- All bills are paid and paperwork is current.
- Peg wrote checks to the organizations voters selected to support.
- The books were audited on March 10 for all of 2024 by Paul Bartels, Peg Callahan, and Jeff Emery.
- Reinhold Electric repaired the parking lot lights. The charge was \$814.50.
- The 2022 and 2023 treasurer reports have been moved to the downstairs storage room.

The report was accepted and approved.

Elders: The January and February reports included the following:

- Noah Estes is doing well following his surgery.
- Several congregation members' suggestions for messages to be displayed on our digital sign were approved.
- A member of the congregation expressed concern regarding members talking in the sanctuary

prior to services. Pastor Brandt will remind members to respect other members and to practice silence inside the sanctuary.

- A member is needed to attend the next Missouri District Convention in Columbia.

Our next voters meeting is scheduled for Easter Sunday. It has been moved to April 27.

The report was accepted and approved.

Trustees: Chuck submitted a written report.

- Tom's Heating and Air Conditioning will check all our units on March 19 as per our service contract.
- Pat Callahan removed the gravel that had accumulated in our parking lot.
- Pat will change the oil in the mower.
- The fire alarm in the sanctuary has been replaced. An anonymous donor gave \$500.00 to cover the cost.
- Chuck's report was accepted and approved.

Education: Vacant

Evangelism: Cindy reported the following:

- The cost of sending 221 outreach cards in January was \$218.79. Sending 144 cards in February cost \$142.56.
- The Lake Media bill was submitted to Peg.
- Cindy contacted Viper Media and Benne Media to air radio advertisements for our services.
- There was a good response to Life Line screening held at Peace on Thursday, March 13, 2025. Russell Schulz posted the event on Facebook.
- Cindy will place Easter Service announcements in the "Lake Sun."
- Cindy provided samples of business cards so that ours can be updated. The council approved one choice. She was given a budget of \$75.00 to pay for them.

Cindy's report was accepted and approved.

Stewardship: Dawn spoke with the fire station located on Red Oak Road regarding information for the purchase of a defibulator. She was told that we should purchase one that is compatible with theirs. A fire department member is willing to come to our church to teach any interested members the correct way to use it. The council will ask her to proceed with the purchase.

Member at Large: Vacant

Cemetery: Diane reported the following:

- She has ordered a Thrivent card totaling \$250.00 for cemetery upkeep. She will give it to Rodney Schulz for the purchase of seed, fertilizer, and animal control.
- Diane will order another Thrivent card in March to pay for fuel for mowing.
- Thrivent has requested photos of members working in the cemetery.
- A burial for the remains of Don and Barbara Schmidt will be held this summer.

Diane's report was accepted and approved.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Brandt reported the following:

- He attended the February 11 circuit pastors' conference held in Cole Camp. He attended the March 11 conference held in Sedalia.
- Our annual installation of church officers was held on January 19.
- He visited with Noah Estes' wife and mother during Noah's surgery.
- On February 2, we were blessed to receive Ned Soseman through re-affirmation of faith.
- He performed the Valentine's Day wedding ceremony for Tammy Snell and Kyle Wright. He thanks all who surprised them with a card shower at the January 26 voters meeting.
- He has prepared all six Lenten midweek sermons using the theme "A Prayer for All Seasons" which is drawn from the Lord's Prayer.
- He is preparing a nine-part sermon series based on Job. He has titled the series "Job: Blessed Be the Name of the Lord." Pastor's prayer is that these sermons will be meaningful to every worshipper.
- Pastor Anderegg has offered to cover for him so that he can have a few Sundays of vacation. Pastor Anderegg's health has slightly improved.
- He asks that we pray for Pastor Anderegg and all our members who are on the prayer list.

His report was accepted and approved.

President's Reports:

Old Business:

- Jeff Hedberg will look for an appropriate "No Trespassing" sign for our cemetery.
- Don Springer has requested that pads for the wooden chairs in the fellowship hall be purchased

to avoid scratching the floor. Pudge will look on Amazon for the purchase.

New Business:

Because our council meetings are held on the same day as the circuit pastors' meetings, it was suggested that our meetings be moved to the first Tuesday of each month. Those council members in attendance approved the change. President Brock Kliewer will call for an extra meeting to seek the approval of all council members.

Brock adjourned the meeting at 7:25. Pastor Brandt led the closing with The Lord's Prayer.
