Christian Symbols

St. Andrew's Cross This cross is a symbol of humility and suffering. It first came into use during the Middle Ages. According to tradition, St. Andrew was crucified while preaching in Greece. He felt unworthy to be crucified in the same way as Jesus, so he begged that his cross be made differently. St. Andrew's cross is the national cross of Scotland. It's also called Cross Saltire.

Yoke The yoke is a burden of hardship and toil, as well as of subservience. But Jesus said the "yoke" of serving him is "easy" and that he provides rest for the weary (Matthew 11:28-30). The yoke also symbolizes human allegiance, as in marriage (2 Corinthians 6:14, NIV).

God Lets It Go, So Let It Go

orgiveness is simple, really. You tell someone they do not need to pay you back something they owe you. Yet, it is sometimes the hardest thing you'll ever do, when the thing you need to forgive is a deep hurt.

What God is calling on you to do is let it go. When we pray to have our sins forgiven, God wants us to remember he is releasing you from the debt you owe him and wants you to do the same.

The Greek word Jesus used ($\check{\alpha}\varphi\varepsilon\zeta$) in the Lord's Prayer for "forgive" literally means "to loose, to release, to let go." In financial terms, it is used to write off a debt and not expect repay-



ment. We daily rebel against God's will, break his law — sometimes deliberately.

Worse, we were born that way. Even though every non-Christian religion tells us we can repay that debt, we cannot. We rack up even more debt faster than we could possibly repay. But God loved us and in Jesus suffered and died to pay that debt in full.

When others hurt us, deliberately or not, the pain can eat us up. If we hold on to that debt day after day, year after year, it can cast a shadow over the rest of our life. When we pray that God forgive us, knowing he already has, it can give us strength to forgive others. That is why we pray to be forgiven — so that we can forgive others.

A Sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seeds fell along the path, and birds came and devoured them. Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil.... Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Other seeds fell on good soil and produced grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. (Matthew 13:3-5. 7-8)

e have something to share with people that they desperately need-whether they know it or not. As we Listen, Ask, and Seek with a person, what she has tried to fill her life with in place of Jesus should become apparent. Whatever that may be, it cannot compare to the love, mercy, and grace that the Lord wants her to know and enjoy. In His desire for all people to know His life and salvation, Christ sends us into people's lives to share His Good News. Our role as sharers is like that of the Sower in the parable Jesus told in Matthew 13. In that parable, the Sower went out into the field and sowed his seed. He didn't concern himself with making sure that all the seed ended up in good and rich soil. Instead, he



generously sowed the seed, knowing that some of the seed would land in the good soil and bear fruit. Some people may think that was wasteful or reckless to sow in this way, but it was the best way for the Sower to carry out his responsibility to sow.

Generously. That's how we are to "sow" God's Word with the people in our lives. Jesus explained that the seed represented the Word. He wants us to realize that our role in being a witness is to concern ourselves with sowing, not trying to make sure that the "seed" brings forth the desired fruit. It is the place of the Holy Spirit to cause the growth. And He often does so in soil that we see as unfit! The Share of LASSIE is in the words of 1 Corinthians 3:6-7. I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. So, neither he who plants nor he who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth. The planting and watering we are called to do is by sowing the word of the Lord.

reat Britain's 47-yearold Mandy Fleming is a lady who has a temper. A number of years ago, when she and her husband were separated, Fleming paid a visit to his vacht. There she was surprised to find he had made a number of improvements on the vessel.

Now fixing up your yacht is almost always a good thing to do. Just about the only time you don't want to improve your yacht is after you've told your estranged wife you have no money.

Having seen the yacht's upgrades, Fleming called up her husband and yelled at him. Then she returned to the yacht with a drill. The next day the harbor master noticed the man's yacht was slowly sinking from the three holes that she had drilled in the hull.

Then they also will answer, saying, "Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not minister to you?" Matthew 25:44

To make a long story short, Fleming pled guilty to sinking her husband's ship. When the judge sentenced her, he said, "You were a manipulative, angry and troubled individual." Then, because she had also turned on the gas so the ship would explode, Fleming was sentenced to jail.

When Fleming heard the verdict, she began to cry. It was almost as if she were shocked there would be any penalty for her crime.


It's sort of like those folks in Jesus' description of Judgment Dav.

Faithfulness: The Stewardship Standard



"Moreover, it is required of stewards that they be found faithful" (1 Cor. 4:2).

hat is the standard to which a steward is held? Ask the average person, and they might talk about percentages, tithes, and commitments. Too often, the default mode of measuring stewards is by how much and how frequently they give. This is not helpful. Measuring activity without any connection to baptismal identity is a recipe for disaster. It can either breed a sense of superiority and self-righteousness or create a culture of scarcity and despair. Neither outcome is godly or helpful.

This is not to say that stewardship should be regarded as "no big deal." St. Paul, within his discussion of the ministry to which he has been called, sets the standard of accountability for the steward: faithfulness. This removes any sense of superiority or self-righteousness and dispels scarcity and despair. When a steward manages what the Lord has entrusted to them — resources and all aspects of life for God's purposes, the focus is not on how much or how frequently they give.

This standard reflects the stewardship portrayed in the Gospels where Jesus entrusts varying amounts, each according to ability. The commended stewards were recognized for their faithfulness in their vocation, not the amounts they managed. Conversely, the condemned stewards were not castigated for their lack of performance but for their lack of faithfulness.

What does this mean for the steward in the pew? The Lord has entrusted you with various things. Luther captures them in his explanation of the First Article of the Apostles' Creed and the Fourth Petition of the Lord's Prayer. The familiar couplets of food and drink, house and home, spouse and children, land, animals and all possessions are the Lord's, and He has entrusted them to you for His purpose. This trust brings an active realization of thanksgiving.

This active thanksgiving is our stewardship. It can be distilled into two questions that the steward regularly needs to answer:

- 1. How has God blessed me?
- 2. How is He calling me to respond?

The first question is quite simple to answer: if the Lord has entrusted something to you, it is a blessing. This blessing is for God's glory and the benefit of your neighbor. The second question is more challenging to measure; it is not about percentages and charts. Instead, it is about a life of thanks giving that flows from the mercies of God revealed in Jesus Christ. This thanksgiving starts at and flows from the cross and the empty tomb. Our stewardship of the Gospel drives our stewardship of everything else.

The standard, then, is faithfulness. Faithfulness flows from eyes focused on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith. It does not come from our efforts but through the working of the Holy Spirit in our lives, through Word and Sacrament. It begins at the altar in the Divine Service but extends into the world from hearth and home to workplace and classroom, from commerce to leisure. The mercy of God, freely given in Jesus, leads us to demonstrate a faithfulness that reveals to others the same mercy we have received in Jesus. This faithfulness cannot be measured empirically. It is simply allowing the Holy Spirit to work in and through us for the glory of God and the benefit of our neighbor. Weekly. Daily. Faithfully. Reprinted from the LCMS Stewardship website

n June 16, 2025 LT Chris Williams from the Mid-County Fire Protection Department held a class at Peace.

We learned to use the new Automated External Defibrillator (AED) and were able to go through the entire process of activating 911, starting CPR, and applying and activating the AED.

The AED was purchased with donations from our congregation. Additional supplies were purchased with funds from LWML.

LT Williams shared the current statistics of surviving a cardiac event. He stated the rated of survival is 30% when an AED is not available and utilized, compared to 60% survival rate with and AED available. The rational behind this is most cardiac events do require a shock delivered to the patient/church member/visitor as soon as possible after the person becomes unresponsive.

Our AED is located by the coat rack in a white tray with additional supplies. There is a large sign above it that that says AED with a red heart with a lightning bolt in the center. If you are asked to get the AED bring the entire plastic container and the adjacent black bag to the collapsed person.

In the event of a member or guest suffering from an event that renders them unconscious, we will not move them out of the sanctuary or dining hall. We will have everyone leave in a safe manner to go to their cars as the Fire Department/ Paramedics, and an ambulance will be arriving at the church.

Please do not block the front of the church with cars or members/ visitors. Additionally, do not enter the drive way until emergency crews have arrived. This could delay life saving care to our victim.

If the AED is applied to a woman, their upper body clothing and undergarments will be removed, as recommended by the American Heart Association. A male's shirt will be cut up the center to expose the entire chest. For this reason, we are attempting to offer as much privacy as possible during this event.

One last note. We do have an increase of respiratory arrests secondary to narcotic usage. It was recommended by LT Williams that we have Narcan available in our AED kit. Narcan is use to reverse the respiratory limitations caused by a variety of narcotics. The Narcan has been obtained and is in the AED kit. Trained users will administer that as indicated.

All of the medications in the first aid kit have been updated and all expired items have been removed.

President Brock Kliewer called the meeting to order at 6:30 P.M. Pastor Brandt opened with prayer.

The minutes from the May 6, 2025 meeting were approved as printed.

Financial Secretary: Brett reported that contributions for May were considerably less than in April. The report was accepted and approved. Treasurer: Peg's report stated the following:

- All bills are paid.
- The cemetery CD has come due. The board voted to renew it at the new rate
- The new HVAC unit has been paid for using LCEF money.
- The cost of the new lavaliere (sound system) has been covered by an anonymous donor
- Sheryl Bald has two Thrivent cards that may be used for church projects. The report was accepted and approved.

Elders: Jeff Hedberg reported the following:

- Pastor Brandt, Jeff Emery, Larry Trick and Jeff attended the June 1, 2025 meeting.
- Jeff Emery presented attendance cards that are used by Trinity Lutheran in Cole Camp.
