

Wheat

Many of Jesus' parables liken the kingdom of heaven to wheat growing abundantly in a

field, as opposed to weeds planted by the evil one. When God "sows" the gospel broadly, some soil produces great crops of wheat (believers, people who become part of God's family); elsewhere, wheat (belief) flourishes briefly or not at all. Wheat also symbolizes the bread of Holy Communion and Christ, the bread of life.

Can You Make a Decision for Christ?

"Have you made a decision for Christ?" One often hears this question from radio and television preachers, or even from our friends and family. "Have you invited Jesus into your heart? Have you received Jesus as your personal Lord and Savior? Have you dedicated your life to Christ?" Many churches have a "Time of Decision" at the end of their services, with altar calls and emotional appeals for the person to respond. All of these questions rotate around this same premise: the unbeliever has the ability and responsibility to choose Jesus. But is this what the Bible teaches? Can the unbeliever make a decision for Christ?

What Can We Do?

St Paul speaks of our conversion as a move from death to life. "And you He made alive, who were dead in trespasses and sins" [Ephesians 2:1, see also 2:5 and Colossians 2:13]. Dead in trespasses and sins. Not sick, not crippled, dead. We are, says St Paul, dead in our sins, completely unable to choose or decide anything regarding Jesus. Again, St. Paul, "But the natural man does not receive the things of the Spirit of God, for they are foolishness to him; nor can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned" [1 Corinthians 2:14]. The things of the Spirit of God, this certainly includes the truth of Jesus and His cross and death for us, all these things are unknown and unknowable to the natural man, the mind of flesh. The Gospel is "foolishness" [1 Corinthians 1:23, 25] to those who do not believe. How, then, could we invite the unbeliever to make a decision for that which is foolish? It cannot.

Again, St Paul says, "For the desires of the flesh are against the Spirit, and the desires of the Spirit are against the flesh, for these are opposed to each other, to keep you from doing the things you want to do" [Galatians 5:17]. Far from accepting the good news of Jesus, our sinful flesh fights against it. As Stephen, the first martyr after Jesus' Ascension, preaches to the Jews in Jerusalem, "You stiff-necked people, uncircumcised in heart and ears, you always resist the Holy Spirit. As your fathers did, so do you" [Acts 7:51]. Such accusation stands over all the unbelieving world, "They are darkened in their understanding, alienated from the life of God because of the ignorance that is in them, due to their hardness of heart" [Ephesians 4:18].

Far from having a free will to choose or make a decision for Jesus, the Scriptures speak of the natural condition of man as an enemy of God. "For the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God, for it does not submit to God's law; indeed, it cannot" [Romans 8:7]. The fleshly

Such sure testimonies should answer the question "Can we make a decision for Christ?" The Scriptures plainly tell us "no". St Paul quotes from the Psalms, "None is righteous, no, not one; no one understands; no one seeks for God. All have turned aside; together they have become worthless; no one does good, not even one" [Romans 3:10-12]. And the Lord Jesus testifies, "The light shines in darkness; and the darkness comprehended it not" [John 1:5].

Conversion: God's Work

The Bible says that we cannot choose or turn to God, that we are completely helpless when it comes to heavenly things. How, then, are we to believe? Conversion, turning from death to life and from the devil to God is a work of God Himself; a work of God alone. We call this the teaching of monergism, God alone is the cause of our salvation; He creates faith [see Ephesians 2:8-10] and gives repentance as a gift. Such is the testimony of the Scriptures.

When they heard these things they fell silent. And they glorified God, saying, "Then to the Gentiles also God has granted repentance that leads to life" [Acts 11:18].

One who heard us was a woman named Lydia, from the city of Thyatira, a seller of purple goods, who was a worshiper of God. The Lord opened her heart to pay attention to what was said by Paul, [Acts 16:14].

Jesus says, "All things have been handed over to me by my Father, and no one knows the Son except the Father, and no one knows the Father except the Son and anyone to whom the Son chooses to reveal Him" [Matthew 11:27]. And again, "To you it has been given to know the secrets of the kingdom of heaven, but to them it has not been given" [Matthew 13:11].

"And we know that the Son of God has come and has given us understanding, so that we may know him who is true; and we are in him who is true, in his Son Jesus Christ. He is the true God and eternal life" [1 John 5:20].

Just as the Lord spoke and the universe was created out of nothing, so our knowledge and trust in the Lord is created out of nothing in us. "For God, who said, 'Let light shine out of darkness,' has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ" [2 Corinthians 4:6]. God's Word alone creates faith in us. For I am not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes, to the Jew first and also to the Greek. [Romans 1:16] So faith comes from hearing, and hearing through the word of Christ [Romans 10:17].

It is the Holy Spirit, working through the Word of God, who gives us faith and trust in Jesus and His cross, for it is God who works in you, both to will and to work for his good pleasure [Philippians 2:13]. So what we learn in the Catechism is a marvelous summary of this Biblical teaching:

I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him; but the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith. In the same way, He calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth, and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one true faith.

Our faith is a work of God the Holy Spirit through His Word.

Jesus' Work is Our Comfort

It is plain from the Scriptures that the unbeliever cannot make a decision for Jesus or invite them into their heart, but that the Holy Spirit, through the Word, converts the heart and gives us faith. But does this matter?

Jesus teaches us, "I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in Me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from Me you can do nothing" [John 15:5]. This is a verse of marvelous comfort, for here we have Jesus' promise that, abiding in Him, we will bear much fruit. But Jesus is also warning us to not think too highly of ourselves. "Apart from Me you can do nothing." Jesus means what He says, there is no doing anything good or holy apart from Him.

Far from making a decision for Jesus, the Lord's people rejoice that He has made a decision for us, to die for us, to forgive all our sins, to baptize us into His family, and to call us through His Gospel. Our faith is Jesus' work, and this is our great comfort.

May our Lord's words to His disciples also grant us peace: "You did not choose Me, but I choose you and appointed you that you should go and bear fruit and that your fruit should abide" [John 15:16]. Amen. Written by Pastor Bryan Wolfmueller





What to Share?: Substance



haring God's Word with people involves more than spouting off a bunch of Bible passages like some kind of "robo-witness." It involves listening, asking, and seeking in order to understand which passages are applicable to the person and how best to share them. It often means that we need to craft a narrative or story for a particular person.

Narratives are quite powerful. Throughout the ages, humans have shared truth, wisdom, and history with well-crafted stories. These narratives often shape the thinking and identity of the people who tell them and hear them. But human stories are limited as they can only speak of the little that we understand about life, purpose, and meaning. The best can only inform or entertain. In and of themselves, they are only words that cannot do anything.

God's Word is different. The Word is not only the greatest of narratives, but also does what it says: sets people from bondage, changes people's hearts, and brings life from death. The story of Jesus is the only narrative that can do that.

It can be tempting to simply tell "my story." I know my story well, know it to be true, and no one can argue against it. But it is only my story.

Some people will relate to it, but others will not. My story doesn't change anyone. It didn't even change me. It can only speak of how I have been changed by Jesus' story - the only story that can change people's hearts. His story is the only story that touches every human being in the world. His story is the only story that can bring life and salvation.

When we share a story, we need to share Jesus' story. Sometimes telling my story is a great way to get to Jesus' story and sometimes it just gets in the way of His story. Sharing my story is optional. Sharing Jesus' story is essential. A witness strives to keep things about Jesus by sharing His story.

October Devotion



God our Savior... wants all people to be saved and to come to a knowledge of the truth.

t seemed like an unusual custom, but many decades ago "auditioning" the pastor was a common practice in some denominations.

It was in such an age that one congregation, after some significant searching, had managed to pare down their list to two possible candidates. Each of these men was requested to present an audition sermon to their congregation. That's how it came to pass that on two consecutive Sundays the potential pastors found themselves preaching to a most attentive audience.

The first pastor preached on hell, as did the second.

When it came time for the congregation to make its selection, the vote for one of the pastors was made in a unanimous, first-ballot decision. After he was installed, the new pastor

found out both he and the other pastor had used hell as their topic. Understandably curious, he asked one of the congregation's leaders why the church had picked him.

The leader didn't have to think long before he gave his answer.

He said, "When the other pastor preached on people going to hell, he seemed to be almost satisfied that they were getting what they deserved. When you preached about people going to hell, everybody could see that it just about *broke your heart*."

That would, I believe, accurately describe the heart of the Lord.

When the Lord thought about the billions who would populate the world, the billions who would be lost without His intervention, it broke His heart. During His lifetime when Jesus looked upon the crowds who followed Him as well as the multitudes who never met, heard of, or paid attention to Him, His heart would have been broken.

It was the Lord's grace and desire to save lost humanity,

which had seen Jesus born in Bethlehem. It was the Lord's wish to bring all men to the knowledge of the truth, which had motivated Jesus during His years of ministry. It was God's goal to drag sinful souls from the brink of hell and into heaven, which motivated the Redeemer to

- remain silent during His trials;
- suffer without complaint as He was whipped, beaten, spit upon;
- offer words of forgiveness to those who nailed Him to the cross.

The Savior's passion, death and, above all, His resurrection show how God's heart was committed to the Redeemer's rescue mission — a mission and message we have been asked to share with a lost and dying world.

It will be a task we will be glad to do, if the idea of people going to hell breaks our hearts as it did the Lord's.

THE PRAYER: Dear Lord, for caring about humanity which disobeyed You and rejected Your love, I give thanks. For sending Your Son to live under the Law, reject temptation and defeat death so we might be saved, I should always remain grateful. Now may I share the story of redemption with those who remain lost. May I share that story in thought, word and deed. This I ask in Jesus' Name. Amen.



Stewardship







Harmonious Stewardship



"For as in one body we have many members, and the members do not all have the same function, so we, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members one of another." (Romans 12:4-5)

ne of the most forgotten concepts in stewardship is the interdependent nature that makes up the Body of Christ and the way that body supports the shared work of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. This is experienced in the local congregation, as well as in broader mission and ministry efforts at the district and Synod levels. Yet in these words, St. Paul reminds the Romans and us that we are indeed members of one another. This is true in our worship. It is also true in our stewardship of the Gospel. Stewards of all shapes and sizes, ages and abilities, affluence and influence are all assembled around Word and Sacrament in the local congregation with no one being more important than the other.

Part of this forgetting lies in what the eyes see and how our human mind operates. Our eyes and our minds are quick to come to the erroneous conclusion that the person who writes the biggest check is the more important steward. Human logic, flawed by sin as it is, could make a claim that the youngest child or the most infirm, aged member of the congregation would certainly be considered something less than important when it comes to the stewardship of the Gospel.

Paul makes it clear in these words that this is not how stewardship of the Gospel is measured in the Body of Christ. Rather, it would be better to view local stewardship like the lost art of harmony in congregational singing. This has been lost not only due to the performative nature of the lead singers of the local praise team, but also because modern hymnals are written to almost force the novice hymn-singer into unison voice. Creative harmonization by talented organists is beautiful to listen to but does not always support the people in the pews in singing in parts. This is a loss in demonstrating a very practical aspect of whole-body stewardship.

The sound that builds when choral and congregational singers settle into their voice parts is nothing short of heavenly! Yet when altos, tenors and bass sing their individual parts without any concept of how they fit together, the music doesn't sound as powerful. The narrow range of the typical alto line almost sounds monotonous. The tenor line can get painfully high, and the base line can get uncomfortably low. But, when interdependently entwined, along

with the melody that is so often carried by the sopranos, the music becomes a tremendously powerful tool in communicating the Gospel.

The same is true of individual stewards. Certainly, stewards with more financial means are in a unique place to "carry the tune" for ministry in a local congregation. But that doesn't rule out the faithful stewardship of the saint-like 94year-old Hulda, who prayed for her young pastor in German every night while the aches and pains of arthritis and the grief of losing a daughter to cancer kept her awake. This does not rule out Jimmy, the profoundly developmentally disabled confirmand whose basic but dramatically eloquent confession of the faith left an impression on a congregation long after he went to be with Jesus. It doesn't rule out the single parent, the recovering addict, the family coming out of bankruptcy, the elderly widow and everyone in between.

The Lord has entrusted all the baptized with stewardship of the one thing needful: the Gospel of Jesus Christ. No one member of any congregation is more important than another when it comes to this stewardship. The biggest check isn't always the best way to communicate the Gospel. In fact, it is almost always better communicated with the widow's mite, the tenacious stewardship of the talents and so much more.

In the local congregation and beyond, our corporate stewardship

of the Gospel needs each other to fill out our great confession. It is not about equal amount. It is about interdependence that only the Holy Spirit can work! Each of us has a role to play, a harmony to sing. The standard for that role is faithfulness. We do not have the same function, but we have the same Jesus! As we sing the parts entrusted to us by the Holy Spirit, the sweet music of the Gospel goes out!
