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Christian Symbols



Evergreen Tree

These trees, which keep their green leaves yearround, are symbolic of Christmas, eternal life and God's everlasting

love. In the Bible, evergreen trees are called the "cedars of Lebanon," suggesting growth (Psalm 92:12), height (Amos 2:9), fragrance (Hosea 14:6) and steadfast faith.



Poinsettias

This shrub, native to Mexico, is at the heart of legend about a poor girl who wanted to

bring Baby Jesus a gift one Christmas Eve. As she walked to church, she gathered a bouquet of weeds — which Jesus miraculously transformed into lovely red flowers. Thus the poinsettia (named for Joel Poinsett, the U.S. ambassador to Mexico who first brought the plant to America) is known in Mexico as la flor de la Nochebuena (flower of the Holy Night). The poinsettia is also an ideal Christmas symbol because its leaves turn red when deprived of sunlight and its flowers (the red inner buds) bloom in December.

Where Did Christmas Come From?

Encore Post: People are planning parties, shopping for gifts, decking their homes in greenery, cooking for feasts. Soon they will make merry, drink plenty of wine, stuff themselves, play silly — and suggestive games. Rich and poor, everyone will go to orgies — and may even disappear with someone of the opposite sex. Everywhere revelers shout *Io, Saturnalia!* (Yo! Saturnalia!) No, it is not 21st Century America, it's ancient Rome!

Beginning with December 17 and eventually lasting seven days, Ancient Rome would celebrate the harvest and the planting of the win-

ter crops. The patron god of the celebration was Saturn, said to have been the pre-Roman Italian king who invented agriculture. The celebration had the same feel and atmosphere as does *Marti Gras* in New Orleans and Carnival in Buenos Aires. It got so wild that even Roman Emperors — not exactly prudes — tried to reign it all in — unsuccessfully.

There has been a myth going around that the Emperor Constantine or the Bishops invented Christmas and placed it on December 25 to rescue Christians from the party. These days it is



mostly pagans, atheists, secular liberals — and interestingly enough — very conservative Christians who promote the theory. The problem is that no Christian writing from ancient times make that argument. So, how did the rumor get started?

To begin with, there is no mention of formal celebration of Christmas before 340 AD. The main focus of the early church was the celebration of Easter, which got quite a bit of discussion from the very start. Then again, there is no detailed description of Saturnalia before

400 AD, so it is hard to tell which came first. If we give ancient Christian and pagan sources the benefit of a doubt, both celebrations are very old. The date of Christmas has some variety to it until late in the 300s. Many Christians observed January 6 as the day to thank God for the many ways that the Son of God revealed himself — focusing on the incarnation and the baptism of Jesus.

Yet traditions die hard. The church never successfully brought an end to December parties, gift-giving and other customs. Rarely did it really try all that hard — beyond preaching against immorality and complaining that people do not focus on God's gift of his Son. Instead, Christians baptized many of these customs, infusing them with Christian meaning. It is how we have a different reason for the season.

Answering Objections to the Faith The Basics of Christian Apologetics



Consider the Jewish leaders who tried to find an explanation for Jesus' healing of the man born blind in John 9. How does that view compare with the view of today's sceptics who deny the resurrection of Christ?

Suggested Answer: We can't generalize, of course, but at the same time, those living now who deny the resurrection do so for the same reason that Jesus' enemies wouldn't accept Him as the Messiah. They simply refuse to believe. It's not a matter of some being worse sinners than others, or being more closed-minded than others, and the like. Jesus clarified the matter in His parable of the wedding feast.

(Matthew 22:1-14)

This parable explained that everyone is invited to the banquet. Some people accept and others do not. Why do some accept to be a part of God's kingdom and others refuse? Scripture does not answer this question. We simply do not know. (Freedom, even limited freedom, by its very nature cannot be explained.)

Ask Exploratory Questions

(Questions that target worldviews and beliefs)

Exploratory questions pick up where basic questions lead by examining the person's reason for saying what they have said.

Basic questions seek to find out what a person thinks, understands, and believes while exploratory questions seek to understand why he does so. While it can be challenging to phrase basic questions as openended questions, exploratory questions tend to be open-ended by nature.

The challenge is to not come across as condescending. They should be context driven based on the content of the conversation. For example: asking "Why do you think Darwinism is true?" is good for someone who believes in evolution, but not for someone who

The purpose of exploratory questions is to understand a person's worldview and how deeply they believe in it. Sometimes they really may know much about that worldview if they just pick up and repeat what is a popular idea.

doesn't believe in life after death.

Questions like," What led you to believe there is no life after death? "or " What evidence do you have that there is no Creator?" encourages people to think about how much of a particular worldview they really know and understand.

Remember, asking questions is not a way for us to set a trap to make one feel as though you're trying to paint them into a corner. Being sincere in the questions you ask will help keep the conversation going.

Old News



ewsweek will no longer be going to the printer. Even though I didn't have a subscription to the magazine, I still am somewhat saddened by the announcement. I guess I thought the weekly periodical would always be there.

I was wrong. *Newsweek* was done in by old news. Let me explain.

Most of us like our news to be, well, we like it to be ... new. We want our information to be both recent and reliable. To make that happen, networks put cameras and reporters into the field. They use computers,

satellite links, and the Internet to make sure you know what is happening, even as it is happening. Sometimes, as in the case of national elections, news reporting goes one step further, as it announces victors before the ballots are counted and sometimes before the voting booths are closed.

Sadly, a magazine which must be printed and then distributed by the Post Office is condemned to sharing events that are days old, and news which is days old is no longer news, it is ancient history. That explains why, to get back into the "news game," beginning next year, Newsweek is going digital.

Old news. Some 2,000 years ago some angels appeared to some shepherds and gave them God's "good news of great joy." Since that message was delivered a long time ago, a person might easily think that what the angels said is old news and of little value.

If a person thought such a thing, he would be wrong.

The coming of the promised Messiah, His perfect life, His

innocent death, His glorious resurrection is news that every person, in every nation, in every century needs to hear. Every sinner who is condemned to hell -- which means every human being -- needs to know the Lord has provided a way for them to be forgiven, redeemed and saved. Every baby born needs to be told God's Good News: Jesus Christ is not just a Savior or the Savior ... He is their Savior.

Good news of great joy ... Good news that is always *new*. That is what we have in Jesus. That is the good news the Lord has asked us to share.

THE PRAYER: Dear Lord, we live in an age when the story of the Savior is being treated as if it is unimportant news of little consequence. Let us be of help in opening doubting hearts to a realization that the Redeemer's work is the most important news they will ever hear. In Jesus' Name. Amen.


















Soup Suppers

Repenting of "Yours" and "Mine"



etailers have had their Christmas displays up since before Reformation Sunday. The kids have made their list and checked it twice, or three times or more. It won't be long before the tree will start shedding its needles, the stockings emptied, the gifts unwrapped, toys broken, and the too small or out of style clothes returned. Before we know it, the annual celebration of Christmas will be over.

But for the children of God, we know that the gift of Christmas doesn't ever end. Week in and week out, the Lord continues to shower His gifts on us. Every time the Lord gathers us to His house, and we are led to kneel at His table, the gift of forgiveness is repeatedly granted to us. It is nothing we deserve. It comes to us freely!

The fourth stanza of the stewardship hymn, "Forgive Us Lord

788) highlights both this gift and our response. Teach us. O Lord. true thankfulness divine, that gives as Christ gave, never counting cost To learn thankfulness is necessary. The parents of young children are wellversed in the fact that they must teach their chil-

dren thankfulness. It does not come naturally. The spiritual genetics inherited from our parents allow us to think that the world revolves around us. When we receive something, there is an inward desire to think that we in some way deserve it.

But there is no way that we deserve anything we get from our Lord. We need that ongoing lesson from God Himself. Thankfulness toward God is worked in us by the Holy Spirit. God's Word works this thanksgiving in us. We need this weekly reminder that Jesus didn't consider "equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied Himself' for us, to the point of death on a cross (Phil. 2:6). He didn't bat an eye. He paid the price! Our life of stewardship is one of daily and weekly thanksgiving inspired by the Lord Himself.

That knows no barrier of "yours" and "mine,"

assured that only what's with held is lost.

Because Jesus gave us everything and more, there can be no ownership. The child at Christmas is quick to claim that the newly gifted toy is "mine!" But as Psalm 24:1 asserts, "The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof, the world and those who dwell therein." There isn't anything in creation that is ours. When we cling to and claim ownership of anything in creation, we are losing out on the continual gifts with which the Lord desires to shower upon us. Closed hands cannot receive anything new. We cling to the old and dead and miss the new thing that the Lord desires to do in and for us.

We are led to repent of the "yours" and "mine" and remove the lie that we have any ownership. In this we have the promise that God will continue to give to us. Not just at Christmas, but every Sunday at the altar in the Lord's house.

Old Business: The church carpets, pew pads, and kneelers were cleaned by Ashley Carpet Cleaning on November 6th.


New Business:
