Christian Symbols

Wheat

Wheat is used to represent the bread (the body of Christ) in Holy Communion. "I am the bread of life" (John 6:48).

In the parable of the wheat and the weeds (Matthew 13:24-30), Jesus uses wheat to represent believers, while weeds, or tares, represent unbelievers.

Cornucopia



Cornucopia, a Greek word meaning "horn of plenty," has origins in Greek

mythology. But the cornucopia became a religious symbol and was even stamped on Jewish coins. Overflowing horns, now common as Thanksgiving centerpieces, came to symbolize abundance and blessings.

Thanksgiving in the United States

More than four hundred years ago, the Puritan settlers of Massachusetts had much to be thankful for. They had survived a severe first winter which had killed most of the first settlers of their colony. They were befriended by the neighboring Wampanoag tribe, who fed them, taught them how to hunt, fish and plant successfully in their new home and with whom they made a treaty to defend them against their enemies. The treaty was honored by both sides for a generation, which allowed the colony to establish itself, grow and thrive.

To thank God for these blessings, they invited their new friends to a feast. It was the first of many such feasts of thanksgiving, which Puritans would have after any great blessing. Other colonies in the United States would periodically celebrate days of thanksgiving, particularly at harvest time in October and November. The first nationwide day of thanksgiving was declared by George Washington on November 26, 1789 to thank God for establishing and blessing the new nation. The date of thanksgiving celebrations varied from state to state,

when in 1863, President Abraham Lincoln fixed the national day of

thanksgiving on the last Sunday of November. In 1939, President Franklin Roosevelt experimented with moving the date to the second last Thursday in November. In 1941, he signed legislation which fixed the date of Thanksgiving on the fourth Thursday in November.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Greetings in the name of Jesus Christ, the Lord of the Church!

One of the key tenets of Lutheran theology is that individual Christians are citizens of two kingdoms, the "right-hand kingdom" of the Church and the "left-hand kingdom" of the state. God works through both kingdoms, though in very different ways, to preserve and protect life (left-hand kingdom institutions and laws) and to bestow the gift of eternal life in Christ (right-hand kingdom means of grace). Christians are called to live and serve within *both* kingdoms. In the Table of Duties in the Small Catechism, Dr. Luther reminds Christians of their obligations to the state by quoting from the Scriptures (Matt. 22:21; Rom. 13:5-7; 1 Tim. 2:1-3; Titus 3:1; 1 Peter 2:13-14). Christians should not retreat from civic involvement. Instead, we should see that part of our calling from God as citizens is to engage in the processes of government and politics. We can fulfill this calling by educating ourselves on issues and participating in elections at the national, state, and local levels.

At the same time, we are mindful of Paul's encouragement in 1 Timothy 2:1-3 to pray for all those in authority. We, as LCMS Christians, should be active in the "left-hand kingdom" of civil government, while producing the fruit of the Spirit as we do so (Galatians 5:22-23). We are not afraid to be involved, but we strive to avoid adding to the divisive rhetoric that is so common in our current political climate. An election year is a good time to remember this, and I want to take this opportunity to provide you with some resources as you exercise your calling as a citizen and encourage members of your congregation to do the same in the coming months.

I also want to address a particular piece of legislation that will be on the ballot at the upcoming election: Amendment 3, a proposed amendment to the State of Missouri's constitution. The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod and her congregations have consistently spoken out on issues related to the sanctity of life. I am reminded of the words from Proverbs 31:8-9 to "Speak up for those who cannot speak for themselves, for the rights of all who are destitute. Speak up and judge fairly; defend the rights of the poor and needy." Over the years, our church body has adopted many official resolutions related to the topic of the sanctity of life. The LCMS holds that "The Bible clearly states that the child in a mother's womb is a living human being (Jer. 1:5; Ps. 139:16; Is. 49:1, 5; Luke 1:41, 44)" and that "with one voice the LCMS in convention denounce any legislation or action that supports or funds abortions" (2010 Resolution 6-02A).

Please help fellow members of our Missouri District congregations to become aware of the ramifications of the potential adoption of Amendment 3. It would not just legalize abortion, but it would be an amendment to the Missouri constitution that essentially guarantees abortion under almost any circumstances with no meaningful caveats. The amendment would mandate abortion

access through all nine months of pregnancy, including the right to what are commonly called "late-term abortions." It also would guarantee the "right" to an abortion — even among minors and without parental consent. Beyond this, the measure would repeal all relevant existing protections for women and children and prevent future ones from being put into place. It would also give public approval (and perhaps government funding) to abortions statewide for any reason at all.

Pastors and church leaders are strongly encouraged to educate members about Amendment 3 and how it relates to the clear, Scriptural position of the LCMS on the sanctity of life. The Missouri District will provide a bulletin insert that will help people to understand the ramifications of Amendment 3. Links to other resources regarding the LCMS position on the sanctity of life, the actual amendment language, and other related resources can be found at https://mo.lcms.org/a-letter-from-president-hagan/.

Finally, please pray for the upcoming elections from the local to the national level. Our hope is that members of Missouri District congregations, and all Missouri voters, will be informed and exercise their rights as citizens to "speak up for those who cannot speak for themselves." We also pray that the Church would be active in demonstrating Christ's love and mercy to our neighbors in need, especially in caring for children and their mothers both before and after birth.

May God bless and guide your congregation and her leaders as you fulfill your vocations as citizens and speak up for life.

The Fool

The fool says in his heart,
"There is no God."

Psalm 14:1

e often think that denying God is a recent invention. It isn't. Back in the 1800s, the most famous atheist was a fellow by the name of Robert G. Ingersoll. So strong was his doubting of the Lord's grace that he took his show on the road, making speeches in large towns and small.

One time, Ingersoll took out his watch and said, "I'll give God a chance to prove that He exists. I challenge Him to strike me dead within 15 minutes!

Those who were there said: at first there was silence. It was so silent people in the back rows could hear that watch tick. The silence was soon replaced by Some folks left the lecture hall; one woman fainted. At the end of the 15 minutes, Ingersoll proudly said, "I am still here. My proof is solid: there is no God!"

That's when a Christian lady stood up and said, "But sir, you haven't proven that there is no God. All you've done is proved that God isn't taking orders from atheists tonight." Knowing that he had been bested, Ingersoll never used that illustration again.

Did that story make you smile? It most certainly brings about that reaction from me. When I think upon the courage of that lady as she took her stand, I smile -- and I smile a second time when I realize that once again God allowed a David to bring down a Goliath.

Sadly, in every generation there are many Christians who believe that the world is smarter than they are, may even be "righter" than they. Well, some unbelievers may be smarter than some of us, but we have something they don't have: we have the Lord's story of salvation.

We have God's truth which speaks of His Son coming to

earth so He might pay the ransom price for our salvation. The fool may not like that story which tells of Jesus' wonderful sacrifice and our redemption.

Indeed, like Ingersoll, he may continue to believe there is no God; it is his right. But the day will come that he will find the Lord remains in the driver's seat.

To warn unbelievers that Jesus Christ can save them from a most unpleasant day -- that is the message which we are privileged to share. It is our joy to let a lost and sinful world know the Triune God remains in control.

Let Us Pray: Dear Lord, the world wishes to deny You and intimidate us. May we recognize that when all is said and done, You remain in control. For having sent Your Son to defeat sin, death and devil, for allowing Him to save me, I give thanks. Grant me the gift to share Jesus' story with those who don't know the Lord of love. In my Savior's Name. Amen



ANSWERING OBJECTIONS TO THE FAITH:

The Basics of Christian Apologetics

Questions & Suggested Answers



The story is told of a man who wanted to start a new religion. An acquaintance told him, "Jesus of Nazareth died and rose again to found His religion; you could do as least as much." How does this story illustrate an important difference between Christianity

and other religions?

Suggested Answer: Jesus paid the ultimate price in order to establish His religion and the Church, His Bride. He provided the best possible evidence of its truth by His resurrection from the dead. No other religion can claim anything like this.



How does knowing for certain that Jesus rose from the dead influence the way you see death?

Suggested Answer: We have seen how the lives of the disciples were changed when they saw the risen Jesus. Seeing Him risen from the dead caused them to

have no fear of death. They knew that they would be raised from the dead just as Jesus had been raised. We have this same assurance of His resurrection and our own. One of the purposes of this column is to allow you, the reader, to see Jesus. You will not see Him in exactly the same way the apostles saw Him, but you can see Him in a very real sense nonetheless. The power of the Holy Spirit allows you to see Him in His Word and Sacraments.

EVERY ONE HIS WITNESS:

ASK: Basic Questions

asic questions can help us learn about people by obtaining information about them. Asking questions can encourage a person to share more about something they have already spoken about.

But use caution. It's easy to come across as an interrogator. As always, context is the key to asking good basic questions – as

is asking in a way that is inviting rather than threatening.

It also may clarify what someone has said to you. Asking a question is a good way to clear things up and to continue the conversation. Remember to avoid the "don'ts" of asking questions and to avoid trying to trap the speaker.

Basic questions usually focus

on who, what, where, when, how, sometimes why. Phrasing open-ended questions will help avoid coming across as though you're giving a quiz because it encourages longer answers and may also end up answering questions that have not yet been asked. It may even prompt more questions.

Either way, they're keeping the conversation going. Here are some examples of basic questions that may be useful in many witnessing conversations:

- You mentioned God earlier. Who is God?
- I noticed you spoke of Jesus in a positive way. What do you know about Jesus?
- When you said you are spiritual, what did you mean by that? What has been your church experience?
- What do you think about the Bible?

Asking basic questions will help obtain information, comprehend meaning, and keep the conversation going.

 - In the U.S. one out of eight women will develop breast cancer in their lifetime.²



The Consequences of Shallow Thankfulness

an you imagine a Thanksgiving dinner without turkey, mashed potatoes, gravy and pumpkin pie? I know I can't! To not have these on the menu, or worse, to run out of them with the family around the table, would be a culinary sin of epic proportions. An attempt to serve bratwurst and hamburgers in place of the standard fare would ring hollow and seem totally inappropriate and out of place. It isn't that the food would be bad; brats and burgers are pretty tasty. But not for Thanksgiving — they just don't go together!

This month, as we continue to walk through the stewardship hymn, "Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness" (LSB 788), we turn our attention to verse three. Here, William Watkins Reid, Sr., the man who penned this text, draws attention to some things that do not go along with faithful, thankful stewardship.

Forgive us, Lord, for selfish thanks and praise ...

We see this often with small children. They greedily snatch the candy out of a grandparent's hand, savagely destroy the wrapper, and attempt to stuff the entire delicacy in their mouth in one bite, only to have a parent say, "Tell grandma thank you." This is followed by the pro forma thanks that is uttered between chocolate chews. It isn't really thankfulness; it is simply checking a box to keep mom or dad off their backs.

We never really outgrow this either. Our shallow thankfulness takes the form of feigned humility when praise is being offered. We are thankful that our admirers noticed and called us out: "Look at me! Aren't I special?" No thought at all is given to the fact that the Lord was the One who gave us the ability and opportunity for accomplishment. Our false blush is really only masking our selfish, credit-seeking gain. Once again, we find ourselves idolatrously thanking ourselves.

For words that speak at variance with deeds ...

What carries more weight:

words or action?
The steward who gives voice to the Gospel in the Divine Service but then lives like a pagan in the world does great damage, not only to others but to the Gospel itself! This is the consequence

of failed stewardship. It is idolatry that separates the steward from the Lord.

Worse yet, it also impacts others negatively. When the failed steward is the reference point outside the Christian community, there are those who want no part of being Christian or following the Christ they claim. We see this play out in the impact of overt political activity among Christians based on governing policy as opposed to fidelity to the Word of God. When our lips and our lives are out of sync, like what used to happen with old movie projectors, the impact isn't funny — it obscures the Gospel!

Forgive our thanks for walking pleasant ways unmindful of a broken brother's need ...

Our creature comforts often become an obstacle to faithful

stewardship. This is true of both individual and corporate stewardship. Financial stewardship is often limited by our desire to be comfortable and have the latest toys and gadgets. Congregational stewardship is often limited by the desire to focus on what is best for the congregation as opposed to how resources might be best stewarded to reach the community with the Gospel.

When we see someone in need, or broken by the world, we often look at them as freeloaders. We admonish them to get a job. We insist that they learn our language, learn our customs, and make them their own. But this gets in the way of seeing every human being the way that Jesus sees them. Remember, that broken person is one for whom Jesus went to the cross to die and rise. When we are unmindful of these needs, our shallow thankfulness also stands in the way of the Gospel.

This stanza reminds us of the challenge we face. Our hearts are master idol-makers. Our shallow thankfulness threatens our souls and hinders others from seeing Jesus as their Lord and Savior. Stewardship is serious business. It is a task for which we were created. In our sinful failings, we are never relieved of these duties. In our Baptism, we are restored to be stewards of the Gospel. Our faithful stewardship is all about that Gospel.

Forgive us when our thanks are shallow, O Lord! In this month of Thanksgiving, grant us the grace to offer heaping helpings of this stewardship so that others may see Jesus!
