### **Christian Symbols**



Ark of the Covenant The ark was at the center of worship for the Israelites. It contained the stone tab-

lets of the Ten Commandments, a pot of manna and Aaron's rod. In the Old Testament, the ark was a visible representation of God's throne, or presence, on earth, where he communed with Moses and the high priests. It also represents our earthly bodies, where the Holy Spirit dwells.

RAM—This Old Testament symbol of Christ represents him as the leader of the "herd," as well as a sacrifice for people's sins. Jesus' sacrificial death is foretold in Genesis 22, when God instructed Abraham to kill his only son, Isaac. But God provided a ram to take Isaac's place, just as he provided Jesus, God's only Son, to take our place on the cross.

## What Does It Mean To Be Saved, Anyway?

ncore Post: Puffy, white clouds. People all dressed in white, wearing feathery wings, going in and out of golden gates. All of them strumming on harps they carry everywhere. This image shows up in American culture often when the subject of eternal life. Is this really what salvation is all about?

Not at all. People do not become **angels** when they die. There is a lot of singing before God's throne, but nowhere does the Bible say everyone will play the harp! The truth is, we do not know what being with God forever will look like. The Scripture uses many images. Jesus himself describes it as paradise and a great wedding feast that never ends. Other passages talk about a shining, gleaming city, full of mighty rivers. Life is described as very happy and as eternal rest. The images of a great judgement seat and a reward ceremony are also there. But salvation really is not about us — it is about living with God, seeing His face and being with Jesus.

# When we die, Christ takes our spirit to live with him, kept safe until the last day.

The Bible describes the relationship between God and his people as a marriage. In Eden, God walked and talked with Adam and Eve. When they ate the fruit of the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil, they traded another god for their creator. They were unfaithful to him. This broke the bond between God and his children. Jesus reconciled God to us by paying the price of our unfaithfulness. Salvation is all about our return home to live with God again — this time forever.

What this means for us is salvation begins now. When we were baptized, God adopted us as his children. He drowned our sinful self and a new life began in us. In this life, the old us fights back. We still sin a lot, but with the help of the Holy Spirit, we no longer *have* to sin. We can

hare God's Word; it is the only thing that has the power to change human hearts. There are many things we can share with people. Before we look forward into how to share God's Word with people, we must be clear on this point: God's Word is the only thing that we can share that can bring life and salvation to an unbelieving person. Therefore, we must be thoroughly committed to sharing God's Word with those to whom we are witnessing.

### **Items to Save**


The LWML continues to save the following items:

May this season deepen my gratitude, renew my spirit, and draw me closer to your heart. In Jesus' name, Amen.




# September Devotion



### Here Today, Here Tomorrow

(Jesus said)



n 1969, Martin Franzmann wrote the hymn, "Thy Strong Word Did Cleave The Darkness." It has always been one of my favorites.

It may well be a favorite hymn of the folks at St. Paul Lutheran Church in Bonduel, Wisconsin.

About two years ago, while she was looking for some old baptismal records to show her students, teacher Debra Court stumbled upon a German Bible that had been published in 1670. It's not the kind of find one expects to come across in Bonduel, Wisconsin — or any other congregation I've visited in the last ten years. That's especially true since nobody at Bonduel has claimed the book or knows how the Bible got there.

This is part of the reason it took so long to have the book's importance verified.

After a few years the book was sent to Lyle Buettner; he works with the Special Collections Department at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis. He said the Bible was one of 40 or so known reprints of Luther's translation.

Amazing! I can only imagine what people must feel when they look through those pages, as they admire the illustrations. Every believer would be compelled to imagine the *generations* that had read, been touched, moved and

saved by the story of the Savior's sacrifice.

For almost three and a half centuries those pages have shared the promises God made with sinful humankind. They spoke of our sin and the Savior's sacrifice, which moves us from hell to heaven and from damnation to salvation.

Of course you don't have to have a really old re-translation of Luther's Bible in order to appreciate the inspired Word and how it has come to us. In truth, all of us who own a copy of the Holy Bible have a direct link to the original writers and writings of Holy Scripture.

In every Bible we have God's unchangeable truth, which was penned by His inspired writers; in every Scripture God gives us all that is necessary to grant us eternal life.

**THE PRAYER:** Dear Lord, for sending Your Son to save me, for sharing His story in the Scriptures I have been given cause to give thanks. Now may I share the Savior and His Scriptures with others. In Jesus' Name I ask it. Amen.




# Stewardship







### **Work and Keep**



enesis chapters one and two are familiar to us. We know them best as the Creation Account. Chapter one is where we hear the familiar, "let there be...and there was" directives. Chapter two gives us the account of Adam (the man) being formed from the "Adamah" (the dust) and becoming a living being when he receives the breath of life in his nostrils. Because of this, it would be quite easy to simply lump these two chapters into the category of creation accounts.

But do not be too hasty in this! While these two chapters do faithfully relate to us the account of creation, they also give us the creation of the "office" of steward. The man, created in the image of God in Genesis 1 and formed from

the dust in Genesis 2, is created for a distinct purpose. He is created to be a steward of the perfect and beautiful creation that the Lord has made! In fact, this is THE reason that man was made. He — and we — were created in the image of God to be stewards of God's creation.

This purpose is spelled out in verse 15 of Genesis 2. The steward has one job, with two purposes. It is fitting that in the month that our nation marks Labor Day, we consider the task of steward. The first purpose of the job of steward is to work. The steward is the caretaker of the Garden. Being a steward is work! Before the fall into sin, this was not an onerous task. But it was an active thing.

Imagine being a farmer in the Garden of Eden! Work would be only harvest. No plowing. No planting. No cultivating. No weeding. The perfect garden that the Lord had made would simply produce automatically to provide for man, woman, and all living beings!

But there is a second task in verse fifteen. The word "keep" is not just a synonym for work. This second task is related to defending. This garden, holy by virtue of its being called into existence by a holy God, needed to be defended. Here is where the vocation of steward becomes priestly. The

steward was to defend the perfect and holy garden from that which was unholy. Later in the Old Testament, this was the task of the priests in the tabernacle and temple. They were to defend with their lives the Holy of Holies. This too is the labor of stewardship. It is a labor that calls the steward to be willing to put the garden before life!

Stewardship was always work. It only got burdensome after the original steward, Adam, failed to defend the garden from the alien word of the serpent. But this was not a failure of harvest. It was

a failure to defend the garden! As a result, all work that followed that failure became burdensome.

The steward failed but was never fired. That is why we have such an issue with stewardship to this day. We continue to live out a prefall vocation in a fallen world as failed stewards. That is why we in the church need to be reminded of our vocational call to be stewards. We so easily forget that this world is not ours to do with as we please. Nothing is ours. We are but stewards entrusted with managing the creation for the glory of God and the benefit of the neighbor.

It is a daunting task. But it is the one to which we have been called. We cannot do it on our own. Apart from the grace of God shared with us through Jesus, we would be burdened to the point of temporal and eternal death. But the Holy Spirit calls us by the Gospel! This Gospel connects us to the fertile garden of Christ's Work on our behalf. Now we are stewards of that grace! The Holy Spirit works this in and through us today and every day.

This is the work of the church. It is also the work of the individual steward. The Lord has placed us in the "garden" with the same twofold purpose: work and keep! Enjoy your labor. For in the Lord, our labor is never in vain!

### **Council Meeting August 8, 2025**

President Brock Kliewer called the meeting to order at 6:30 P.M. Pastor Brandt opened with prayer.

The following board members were present: Pastor Gary Brandt, President Brock Kliewer, Financial Secretary Brett Niebur, Treasurer Peg Callahan, Secretary Susan Kral, Elder Jeff Hedberg, Evangelism Cindy Kaminski, Cemetery Diane Borgmann, and Church Members Pat Callahan and Rodney Schulz

**Absent: Vice President** Noah Estes, **Trustee** Chuck Kral and **Stewardship** Dawn Hedberg

The minutes from the July 8, 2025 meeting were approved as printed.

**Financial Secretary:** Brett reported that contributions for July are \$1400.00 ahead of this time last year. An anonymous donor paid for the restriping of the parking lot. The report was accepted and approved.

**Treasurer:** Peg's report stated the following:

- All bills are paid for the month of July.
- Peace received a \$1600.00 gift from a community member for capital improvements.
- Sheryl Bald provided a \$250.00 Thrivent card for the purchase of bicycles and candy for the October Trunk and Treat.
- Peg stated that several of our service providers are starting to charge 3% of their bill for processing checks. She asked for council approval to set up automatic drafts for SWEC, Como Connect and other repeat providers as the need arises. The council granted approval.
- There has been \$1500.00 spent on capital improvements this month.
- The cost of renting the stump grinder for tree stump removal will be taken from general funds.

The report was accepted and approved.

**Elders:** Jeff Hedberg presented the informational flyer that will be given to visitors. Jeff's report was accepted and approved.

**Trustees:** Trustees reported the following:

- The mowing crews have kept the church grounds mowed. Thank you to Pat Callahan, Jeff Emery, and Kyle Wright.
- Chuck Kral repaired four gutter downspouts.
- Chuck contacted Tom's Heating and Air to properly hook up the new AC unit and to install the proper valve for propane.

- Pat installed new posts and signs for handicapped parking and visitor parking. He also arranged for new lines to be painted in the parking lot.
- Rodney discovered leaks in the cemetery water line. He repaired two leaks and then discovered more. Chuck contacted All Service Plumbing to bid on repairing the water line to the cemetery. The bid came to \$2450.00. Kyle, Pat, Rodney and Chuck repaired the part of the line that was leaking at the time.
- Chuck sent a water sample to the state for testing.
- Pat and Kyle removed several stumps from the cemetery. There are stumps that cannot be removed without using a stump grinder. The council approved the \$250.00 rental of a machine.

The report was accepted and approved.

**Education:** Vacant

**Evangelism:** Cindy reported the following:

- The cost of mailing 243 outreach cards in July to new move ins to our area was \$240.57. Cindy calculated that 1157 cards were sent from January through June at a cost of \$1145.43. After comparing the visitor list provided by Brett and Cindy Niebur, she found no names that matched in the two lists. The council agreed that the money spent on the cards should be put to better use. Cindy will contact the company to cancel if we are not on a contract.
- There will be no Life Line Screening this fall.
   The fall screening was assigned to the VFW facility.
- LWML members have organized visitor gift bags containing a coaster with a scripture verse, a bookmark, candy, a Portals of Prayer booklet and a church brochure. It was decided that the bags would be given out following the service.
- Cindy offered to create flyers for the upcoming yard sale.
- Cindy will make flyers for the October Trunk or Treat.

The report was accepted and approved.

Stewardship/LWML: There were no reports.

Member at Large: Vacant

**Cemetery:** Diane reported the following:

- Rodney Schulz applied spray for tick removal and applied Roundup on the cemetery road.
- Rodney purchased 130 feet of garden hose and one more watering tripod. He is able to control the watering through his phone.

• Rodney ordered a privacy sign for the cemetery. The report was accepted and approved.

**Pastor's Report:** Pastor Brandt reported the following:

- Pastor attended the ordination and installation of Ryan Groh on July 12. Pastor Groh is serving St. John's in Schubert and St. John's in Meta.
- Pastor is healing nicely from his bone spur surgery. The stitches were removed on August 6.

Pastor Brandt led the closing with The Lord's Prayer.


