Cross Crosslet

This cross is formed of four smaller Latin crosses joined at their

overlapping bases. The cross as a whole represents the spreading of the gospel to the four corners of the earth. This cross is often used in connection with missions.



Olive Branch

The Olive Branch is a symbol of peace, harmony and healing. Olive trees pro-

vide shelter, as well as oil used for ointment and consecration. The Olive Branch also represents deliverance from hardships and anxiety because a dove brought an olive leaf back to Noah's ark after the flood ended (Genesis 8:11).

The Wisemen, the Star and the Gifts

Encore Post: At Christmas time, we see them everywhere. The crèches-Nativity scenes- appear on lawns, in malls, under Christmas trees and especially in our churches. They are not only great decorations, but they are ways to tell the Christmas story to those who cannot read. In virtually all of them are three figures bearing gifts. They stand next to

camels. Often they look like kings from the Middle Ages of Europe.

Yet these figures were not yet there on the night Jesus was born. Nor were they kings. They were scholars from Persia or Babylon, skilled in the study of the stars. No wonder the star got their attention. No one knows what the star was, but it appeared two years before they got to Bethlehem. They are in the stable because the Christian Church in the West celebrates their arrival on the 12th night after Christmas. It makes it easier to explain what is



happening on both holidays. You can read their story in Matthew 2.

The day that follows is called Epiphany — appearance. It is the first day of the season of Epiphany, when the Church celebrates the ways Jesus revealed himself through his ministry in ancient Galilee and Judea. The church cherishes the Wisemen because they were the first Gentiles to worship Jesus.

The child Jesus did not remain small, however. Like every one of us he grew up, learned his lessons, worked with his father and brothers as a craftsman. Both God and his community were very pleased. Yet this is

THE YEAR IN REVIEW

January

The 2024 officers were installed. The library window was replaced by Andersen Windows for \$5,000. Larry Trick replaced Earl Hartenstein as elder. We thank Earl for his many years of faithful service. The January council meeting was cancelled twice due to the weather. Repairs and updates are needed for the fire and security system. Two trees were cut down for a cost of \$400.

February

Due to the rising cost of trash removal it was suggested to cancel GFL. Tom's Heating and Cooling made a holder for the furnace filter to prevent the filter being sucked into the blower motor. Ash Wednesday Service and Lenten Services were held. Pastor Lehenbauer conducted services on Feb. 4 while Pastor Brandt was on vacation. Pat Callahan cleaned up the brush that was left by the bushes when they were taken out in front of the church.

March

Lenten Services, Holy Week and Easter services were held. Gravel was purchased to cover the areas where the bushes were removed along the front of the church. A new fee was negotiated with GFL at a cost of \$15.29 instead of \$72.68. Three organizations were selected to receive monetary donations for 2023: Kids Harbor, Medical Missions for Christ, and the Missouri Synod District Office. All Shores Electric repaired our exit and emergency signs. Council approved Eagle Security's bid to update our security and smoke alarm systems. On March 24, new members Rory and Amy Rathje were received by transfer. Christ the King agreed to provide pastoral care when needed. A new microphone cable was purchased.

April

LWML plans a fundraiser in the fall to help pay for the costs of the drainage system and emergency system. There will be an investigation into providing non-alcoholic wine for communion. Fertilizer was applied to certain areas of the cemetery. Southwest Electric will remove brush and spray on the church property this summer.

May

Eagle Security updated the smoke detectors. Jeff Emery talked to the council about emergency procedures. A crew will be formed to work on the leak by the basement door. Jayne Marie and Cindy attended the West Chamber meet and greet. Eagle Security updated the smoke detectors. Our current emergency procedures were reviewed. Medical procedures were posted. Emergency evacuation plans will be presented to the congregation. Each member will receive a copy of the Active Shooter Guide.

June

We obtained free soap and hand sanitizer dispensers. LWML hosted an ice cream social for all members. A funeral service was held for Shelia Hartenstein. The bushes will be removed near the back door of the church. Eagle Security will install new smoke alarms in the sanctuary. Bids will be obtained for cleaning the narthex and sanctuary carpets, pew cushions and kneelers. **Cemetery:** Weed killer was sprayed where needed. Fallen branches and leaves were hauled away.

July

Life Line screening was held. Most of the bushes have been removed from around the church. We received new members Judith Owens and son Robert Owens. Potluck meals will be held for those months that have a fifth Sunday. A tree was cut up that fell near the garage. Pat installed new gutter drains near the back door. Larry Trick built a display table for the LWML that was placed in the narthex. Donations to Heit's Point totaled \$200. An emergency operating plan was presented to the voters' at the July 21 voters' meeting. Ethan Hutton was not able to lead the July 7 service due to illness.

August

An LWML outing to Cole Camp. The 1993 John Deere tractor and attachments were sold. Ashley Carpet Cleaning was awarded the bid for cleaning the carpet, pew cushions and kneelers. Pastor Morris will lead services for September 29, October 6 and November 17. New sprinklers were purchased for the cemetery.

September

A security bar was installed on the sanctuary door. Pastor Brandt plans to retire in two years. There are candidates for most of the positions for the October election. Our CD was renewed. Best Pest Control applied insect repellent. The oldest furnace was checked by Tom's Heating and Air Service. Diane would like to get bids for an underground watering system in the cemetery. We received new member Candi Tostenrud.

October

LWML Fall Rally was held at Faith, Warsaw. LWML Italian Dinner fundraiser was held. An air conditioner compressor was ordered for one of the air conditioning units. A timer for the watering system was purchased for the cemetery. Church officers were elected. Thank you, to all the members that held an office throughout the year(s) and those that came forward to hold an office. New officers are

- **Director of Evangelism:** Cindy Kaminski agreed to accept the position of Director of Evangelism finishing Russell's term.

November

Thanksgiving Eve service was held. The church was decorated for Christmas. The baptism of Bryar Ann Methvin the daughter of Hannah Carlson and Ghunner Methvin was held. A security bar and an extra lock pin was placed on the sanctuary door. Tom's Heating and Air installed a new compressor on one of the downstairs furnaces. A new pipe was installed to replace a leak in the watering system of the cemetery. A No Trespassing sign will be installed at the cemetery. The church carpets, pew pads, and kneelers were cleaned by Ashley Carpet Cleaning.

December

Advent Services were held. Soup supper, Holiday Gift Shoppe, cookie sale and a silent auction were held before each of the Advent services. Christmas Eve Service was held. LWML Christmas party was held. We thank Russell Schulz for serving six years as evangelism chair. A new compressor was installed on one of the furnaces. The mailbox will be replaced do to leaking rainwater.

January Devotion





When Jesus was baptized, immediately He went up from the water, and behold, the heavens were opened to Him, and He saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and coming to rest on Him; and behold, a voice from heaven said, "This is My beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased." Matthew 3:16-17.

S o, do you remember where you were and what you did last Epiphany? You really don't have to answer that question. I'm impressed anytime someone from the western branch of the Christian Church remembers Epiphany is the day to celebrate the coming of the Wise Men to worship the baby Jesus.

If anyone remembers the day and what he or she was doing, well, that's a bonus. On the other hand, if you are a member of the Russian Orthodox Church and live in Moscow or just about any city in that immense land, I would be surprised if you didn't remember what you did last Epiphany.

Why the difference?

In the Russian Orthodox Church, Epiphany marks the baptism of the Savior. In many places it is celebrated by the local church by cutting a very large cross-shaped hole into the ice of a local river. When that is done, many of the believers from the church jump into the water as a remembrance of Jesus' work and their baptisms. This year that meant people jumped into the river when it was about 13 degrees below zero outside (Fahrenheit). One man, his hair frozen into miniicicles, said, "After the Epiphany dive, all your illnesses, all your problems just fade away."

Now if you're thinking that custom is a bit strange, you won't get any argument from me. And if you're thinking that's the kind of custom that is probably dying off, well, you'd be absolutely wrong. More and more people -young people -- are participating in the ceremony. There are probably all kinds of reasons why they would do such a thing, but more than one has said this: "Jesus suffered for me and His baptism was the beginning of that suffering. I suffer for a moment to remember how His suffering, His death, and His resurrection have taken away my sins." If that's what they believe, that's wonderful! I'll join them!

In the belief, it is not, the river.

Let Us Pray: Dear Lord Jesus, I

give thanks for all You did for my salvation. Help me. Help me remember and share with others the love and sacrifice You made so my sins might be washed away. In Your Name, I ask it. Amen.

Ask: Challenge Questions

(Ask Questions that Target World Views and Beliefs)

hallenge questions take the conversation deeper by prompting a person to explain his worldview or religious beliefs. Questions of this nature are likely to shut down a person if they are asked too soon in a relationship or conversation and can quickly end it.

Asking in a way that belittles or attacking a point of view can also end the conversation. Still asking such questions in an honest and sincere way can be effective in getting a person to examine and reflect on

her beliefs. Such questions are driven by context that may come from the conversation such as world events or something going on in the person's life. They may also come from the person's answers to basic or exploratory questions as discussed



in a previous column, or may just come up in the conversation.

When asking challenging questions, make sure to use open-ended questions such as "What if..." "Why do you believe that?" "How would you respond to..." "How would you answer..." and so forth, to encourage the person to go beyond the standard answer.

Keep in mind that these questions are to keep the conversation going so don't be afraid to ask questions to which you do not know the answer. Not knowing the answer may actually help one to listen more effectively. Even so, don't assume you know the answer they're about to give. Listen to their answer.

Sometimes people don't understand the worldviews and religions they adhere to. Whether it lines up with "official teaching" or not will provide important insights.

Repenting of "Feasts that Know No Fast"

resh off the Christmas season and the retail frenzy that accompanies it, January brings a shot of frigid air into the lives of the people we know and love. This is not a meteorological statement either. While it is true that January is one of the colder months for those in North America, the cold front blast that hits us is the full force of credit card spending that fueled the retail frenzy. The bills for the gifts, the parties, the food and the travel have now come due. The credit card makes things convenient, but it also requires more discipline than many can muster. When the bills come in January for December's celebration, it really puts a damper on things.

Congregations often make the same mistake in stewardship. We often charge forward in doing what



we always do or starting new endeavors without counting the cost. But at the end of the month, or the end of year, when the bill comes due, the red ink on the congregational balance sheet smacks the people in the face like a stiff north wind in January. We hunkered down. We circle the wagons. We start to panic. The work of the Gospel suffers.

The fifth verse of "Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness" (*LSB* 788) addresses this January situation. The words penned by William Watkins Reid are very needful for us to hear as we start a new year, while dealing with the bills of past efforts and expense.

"Forgive us, Lord for feast that knows not fast ..." This hits us hard, doesn't it? We love when the money is flowing, the parties are going, and things are getting bigger

and better. But there is a time in life, and most especially in our spiritual disciplines, that we need to fast. The purpose of a fast is to step back, lay something aside for a time, and replace it with meditation on Scripture and prayer. This is designed to keep us from turning something that may well be good into an idol that separates us from the God who loves us in Christ. "For joy in things that meanwhile starve the soul" In "The Parable of the Sower,"

we hear Jesus talk about how the worries and cares of life choke out the growth of the seed of the Word that was planted. We know how this happens in our lives. Professional and youth sports do this. Materialism does this. Travel and leisure and do this. There is a list of things that we enjoy that starve the soul.

But it also happens in our congregations. When corporate stewardship is not managed in a responsible way, it can and does destroy individual stewardship. Is it good individual stewardship to support a ministry that doesn't take its corporate responsibility seriously?

"For walls and wars that hide vour mercies vast and blur our vision of the Kingdom goal." This is the ultimate end of the idolatry of failed stewardship. We build walls between believers within the church and hamper those who are outside from coming to the Light of Life that is Jesus. The wars we fight over money and its impact on ministry do the same. It eventually blurs our vision of what we are here to do: share the Good News of Jesus. When the wintry blast of January hits us in this fashion, we are called to repent.

When the Holy Spirit uses the cold front of the call to repentance, we meet the God who forgives and restores. That is what He does for
