A Message from Pastor Anderegg

Continuing our series on government and religion, I would like to say something I have said for years: Everybody “believes” something. Last summer, and again on January 6 of this year, we saw people’s “beliefs” on display in a way that was very easy to spot. Nearly every rioter, including those who were involved in the riot in Washington at the U.S. capitol, displayed raw emotion. I’m sure there were some people who were not involved in the havoc, but they were either few and far between, simply not recorded by the cameras or wound up on the editing room floor, metaphorically speaking.

Now, we’re going to get to the religion part, so I want you to hold your toes out because I may very well step on them. In short, I’m convinced that Satan was having himself a “hay day” with each riot that took place. The following is “Anderegg theory” and is not something you have to believe. But it seems as though the reservoir of intense emotions is like a magnet inside of us, and Satan loves to draw us into sin by way of “connecting” to this magnet.

Oh, it is easy enough to see in those with whom we disagree, and especially those who break the law. Maybe it *was* a peaceful protest to begin with, but before all was said and done a lot of people allowed their “beliefs” to draw them into some pretty bizarre behavior (hurling Molotov cocktails, throwing heavy objects at the police, rampant looting, and worse). Easy enough to see! Their sinful nature was drawn by the Old Evil Foe. Terrible, sinful, unlawful behavior! (By the way, part of my theory is that more and more people are drawn to “demonstrations” because fewer and fewer people are attending church nowadays. There is, therefore, an even larger reservoir of intense emotions from which to draw. But that’s the subject of either a discussion in Bible class or another newsletter article.)

Those who attend the Sunday morning Bible class might be seeing a little “dupe and zap” coming. What might Satan be doing to Christians as we watch all of this? Does he induce righteous indignance? Does he lead us to feel holier than thou (with the thou being a different political party or even a particular race or culture). Once the Prince of the Air has got you whiffing the smell of “those people are _____ (crazy, inhuman, idiots, and I better stop) he

Last thought . . . and the closest I have come to your toes yet: Is it more often than not the case that we look at those who get out of hand—commit crimes, hurt anyone who stands in their way, and destroy millions of dollars in property—with a sense of superiority; today’s modern-day form of Pharisaical thinking? You are free to agree or disagree at this point, since all of this, though not running against Holy Scripture, is conjecture. I, however, have come to the conclusion that although I have not always sinned when thinking about the crowds that have become out of control there are still plenty of times that I need to place those thoughts (even words or deeds) at the foot of the cross. Thank the Lord for His forgiveness and the opportunity to do better in the futuROBOS4MAXre!

Meanings in the Meal

Jesus instituted Communion while celebrating the Jewish Passover with his disciples. The meal's ritual foods hold meaning for Christians, too, because our faith story is interwoven with that of Judaism.

Matzoh: This unraised bread recalls the Israelites' hasty departure from oppression in Egypt. Jesus used the Passover bread to symbolize his body, which delivers us from bondage to sin and death.

Salt water: It symbolizes the tears of the Hebrews and of all who suffer in any time and place. Christians believe that in Jesus, God embraced human suffering so we need never face it alone.

Parsley: Dipped in the salt water, this green, leafy vegetable represents the Hebrews' rebirth out of sorrow into the joy of freedom. Easter's celebration of resurrection proclaims a coming day when God "will wipe every tear from [our]

proclaims a coming day when God "will wipe every tear from [our] eyes [and] there will be no more death" (Revelation 21:4, NIV).

Shankbone: A lamb slaughtered for each Hebrew household meant life for those within. The meat strengthened them for the escape

journey, and the blood, swabbed on their doorframe, signaled for Death to "pass over." Jesus used wine at the Passover meal to symbolize his blood — of the Lamb of God — which he would shed for our salvation.

Egg: For Jews celebrating Passover, an egg symbolizes memory of the Exodus and renewal of faith. For Christians at Easter, eggs — especially open, empty ones — call to mind Jesus' empty tomb, renewal and abundant life.

But the widow didn't get home with them either. At the grocery store, she came upon a tearful young girl. The roses cheered the bedridden woman, but even she didn't keep them. “They're too beautiful not to share,” she told her pastor when he came to visit the next day. “I'd like the church to have them.” So the pastor took them and placed them in the sanctuary where his congregation could see and enjoy them. After the service, the minister gave single roses to some of the church members as they left. The beauty of the flowers was extended once more before they wilted. There's a beautiful poem entitled, “Flowers Leave Their Fragrance on the Hand of the Giver,” and the words are true. Every good deed, every selfless kindness, every thoughtful action which comes from a heart full of faith -- a heart touched by the abundance the Lord has freely given -- has a way of blessing the giver and multiplying the gift. Like the ripple effect of a stone tossed into water, the circles that emanate can reach many unseen shores. So it is with the greatest love of all. Jesus' redemptive work on the cross comes to us through God's Word. By the sanctifying power of the Holy Spirit, we are made clean and acceptable to God through faith in the salvation Christ has won for us. 

Stewardship

Our Father in heaven sent His Son, Jesus, to be our Savior. His atoning sacrifice is the first fruits of all the dead, a pleasing aroma to His Father, so that His perfect life and death count for all who believe in Him. He claimed us as His own children in Holy Baptism. He sustains and strengthens our faith with His Holy Word and His Body and Blood.

As new creatures, who have put on Christ, we bear good fruit. We do the good works prepared for us, which He makes known to us in His Word. By faith then, trusting in the Word of God, we do what he says because He does not lie and always keeps His promises. For “with-out faith it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to him must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who earnestly seek him” (Heb. 11:6).

And so the Lord promises: “Honor the Lord with your wealth and with the first fruits of all your produce; then your barns will be filled with plenty, and your vats will be bursting with wine” (Prov. 3:9-10). How do we honor the Lord with the wealth that God has given us in His generosity? By giving generously to those whom the Lord has called us to love and support your family, your society, and your church. And His promise is that, in so doing, you will never lack.

A common counterpoint is: “But that’s from the Old Testament!” Our

A common counterpoint is: “But that’s from the Old Testament!” Our Lord Jesus Himself gives us similar promises in the New Testament. He says, at the conclusion of the parable of the talents: “For to everyone who has will more be given, and he will have an abundance” (Matt. 25:29).

And then at the end of the parable of the dishonest manager, he says: “One who is faithful in a very little is also faithful in much, and one who is dishonest in a very little is also dishonest in much. If then you have not been faithful in the unrighteous wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? And if you have not been faithful in that which is another’s, who will give you that which is your own? No servant can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money” (Luke 16:10-13).

And in His sermon on the mount, he says: “Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where

elves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal, but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also” (Matt. 6:19-21).

We have become conditioned against these promises because of their misuse by the peddlers of the prosperity gospel – the guys on TV who say you get rich by putting God in your debt. And thus, we miss out on the fact that God does reward temporal faithfulness in temporal matters with temporal blessings. It’s no quid pro quo. It’s all from God’s grace and His fatherly divine goodness and mercy. But those Bible passages do in fact say what they say! It’s not the Old Testament’s problem. It’s ours. It is almost as if we have become so jaded against this that we think it a virtue to be stingy with our offerings.

But our Father in heaven still loves to bless those who bless others. He loves to give to those who give freely and generously. In fact, he challenges us to challenge Him: “Bring the full tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. And thereby put me to the test, says the Lord of hosts, if I will not open the windows of heaven for you and pour down for you a blessing until there is no more need” (Mal. 3:10).

And so, while we don’t give so that we would get, we do receive from the Lord in order to give, and He will bless your giving with more receiving. As St. Paul wrote in Rom. 8:32: “He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things?”



- Plans for emergency situations are being written and will be posted throughout the facility.


New Business:
