

The Health of Peace's System

In February, I mentioned that I was going to be writing a series of articles that look at the health of a congregation, specifically Peace Lutheran Church. This is a continuation of that series.

So here is a question that every church should ask and one that those who are trained in helping congregations navigate some tricky areas ask: True or false, a healthy congregation is one that **doesn't have any conflict**. The answer is false. It is not conflict that creates unhealthy congregations but rather how the members navigate work through the conflict.

To be clear, I have not seen any serious conflict at Peace that has been mishandled, nor do I have any "secret knowledge" of past conflict. So please under-

stand that this is somewhat like a dry run that a couple makes before the wife is going to give birth. That analogy breaks down very quickly as well, because neither I nor anyone I know is "expecting" any conflict. (Had to get a little word play in there!) Also, much of what I have learned about conflict resolution comes from an organization called "Peacemaker Ministries" and their flagship book entitled The Peace Maker: A Biblical Guide to Resolving Personal Conflict by Ken Sande. I also attended a three or four day training put on by the group.

Several times the authors of the book mention that conflict is, at its lowest level, a difference of opinion. Imagine if we all thought exactly the same thing about every aspect of life at Peace. First of all, we would all agree that my sermons are just the right length. Aha! Perhaps there is some conflict among us, now that I think about it. More seriously though there would likely be less and less growth in the congregation

(and for now I won't explain what I mean by growth) than there is now.

How many Lutherans does it take to change a light bulb? Change?!! Are you kidding me? Another answer is that it takes six, five to be on a committee to study what was good about the old light bulb and one to do the changing. (By the way, humor is a good way to keep your perspective "level-headed.")

I encourage you to go to peacemakerministries.org and/or do an internet search for *The Slippery Slope*. There you will find twelve different ways that people deal with conflict. On one side of the slope are the worst possible turnouts of navigating conflict, with *peace faking* as the label for that side. There, the worst form of handling conflict is to <u>escape</u> by resorting to suicide. Thankfully, few people make such radical and irrational decisions. On the exact opposite side of the slope is *peace breaking*, with the worst form being attacking someone physically and killing them.

Whew! Thank the Lord that such radical irrational reactions are currently not present at Peace Lutheran Church (PLC) Camdenton. But it's possible to hate someone enough that you'd wish them dead and thereby break the Fifth Commandment without actually physically harming the person. And it's possible to break other commandments through the other unhealthy ways of navigating conflict.

Because this is getting long already, I will simply use the information above to set the stage for my next newsletter article, which will be in June. Until then, I invite you to join me in the following prayer: Lord God, through your Son you proclaimed that peacemakers are blessed. Bless our congregation, as we navigate whatever conflict may arise in the future. Grant that we would bring glory to you through all that we do. Amen. Pastor Anderegg

Apologetics

What we know 🚿

First, Dr. Norman Giesler and Frank Turok in their book I Don't Have the Faith To Be An Atheist give ten reasons to believe that the Gospel writers told the truth and that they didn't just fabricate the life of Jesus.

1. The Gospel writers included embarrassing details about themselves.

2. They included difficult sayings of Jesus.

3. They left in demanding words of Jesus and

4. Carefully separated Jesus' words from theirs.

5. They would not have included the remarkable and unusual events of the resurrection, i.e. that the first witnesses were women, the conversion of priests, and the Jewish officials attempt to explain away the empty tomb.

6. At least thirty historically known people were included.

7. Some information appears to contradict other writer's accounts, leading to the conclusion that the Gospel writers did not collude or conspire.

8. Their readers are told to verify their accounts – even miracles.

9. The details about miracles are described in simple unembellished accounts like other historical events.

10. The authors abandoned their longheld sacred beliefs and practices and proclaimed the truth through persecution and even death. All of these reasons point to the

fact that the Gospel authors told the truth. We are also able to give good reasons to believe that God created Heaven and earth and all life. That the universe with hundreds of physical laws, specifications, and criteria had to be created by an eternal, allpowerful, all-knowing, benevolent being, that the DNA of every living being could not have arisen on its own, and moral Laws and duties suggest One who is holy, just, merciful and gracious. And, finally, we can see that the Holv Spirit has worked to bring people to faith and preserve His Church even through today. Therefore, we can, at least, give good reasons for the faith within us. But there are still some lingering hard questions that skeptics bring up. How do we answer objections such as: the problem of evil, Darwinism, the so-called hiddenness of God? What can we say to those who believe that God of the Old Testament is capricious, wrathful, and tyrannical? There are answers! We'll see what the apologists have to say starting next month.



Preachin' and Witnessin'

s a preacher, I regularly enjoy reading the messages of some of the great sermonizers of the past. The messages of Dwight L. Moody are high on my list of solid sermons. Even so, Moody, himself, admits he was far from perfect. Perhaps the greatest mistake he made in a message was on October 8, 1871. That night he had a tremendous audience and he preached on "What will you do then with Jesus who is called the Christ?" Moody concluded his sermon with the words: "Now I give you a week to think that over. And when we come together again, you will have opportunity to respond." The sermon ended and the soloist began to sing. The words were drowned out by the sound of fire bells. That night was the beginning of the Chicago fire, which killed hundreds and left thousands without a home. In reflection, Moody remarked that he would give his right arm before he would ever give an audience a week to think over the Gospel's message. All of this verifies the words of St. Paul who told us to be prepared to preach the Word. Sharing the Savior's story of salvation is not something that should be confined to Sunday mornings. Telling the lost of the forgiveness and redemption which has been won for all through Jesus' perfect life, His innocent suffering and death, and His glorious resurrection, is something that needs to go on 24/7. Understand, St. Paul is not telling us we need to preach a message with great oratorical skills, as did Dwight Moody. Our



lives, lived in thanks to the Christ are a sermon ... a sermon that the Holy Spirit can use to lead people to the Word. So, today, let's do some serious preachin' by solid Christian witnessin'. (From a devotion originally written for "By the Way")

The Prayer: Dear Lord, we will never know when our last day or the last day of those around us might come. While the Holy Spirit alone calls people to faith, may He use us as people who verify the truth of Scripture and the greatness of Jesus' sacrifice. In the Savior's Name I ask it. Amen.


Every One His Witness Witnessing Is Centered In Justification

It's easy to get caught up in the activities of witnessing and lose sight of its important aspects. Keeping the main thing the main thing is important if we are going to be faithful and effective witnesses. What is that main thing? It is the central teaching of the Bible: justification. In other words, the main thing in witnessing is sharing the message of salvation by grace through faith alone in Christ alone. Three teachings from the Bible that we can use to help keep the main thing the main thing in witnessing are :

- 1. The proper use of First Article gifts as we engage the world with the Gospel.
- 2. The correct understanding of the role of the Holy Spirit and our reliance on Him through Third Article witnessing.
- 3. The comfort and assurance that the doctrine of election by grace provides us.

In the explanation of the first article of the Apostles Creed, Martin Luther explains that God has given us every kind of gift, which enables us to do the word He has given us. Such is the account of Paul and Barnabas speaking to the crowd at Antioch. (Acts 13:13-52) They were using the First Article gifts of travel, the freedom to gather in worship, discourse, and public speaking to share the message of salvation. In the Third Article of the Apostle Creed, we confess that we do not have the power to come to faith, but that the Holy Spirit

does this work through the Gospel. Paul and Barnabas demonstrate this in Acts13:47, citing that the Lord has called His people to bring salvation to the earth. Acts 13:48 makes clear about election by grace when it states the results of Paul and Barnabas proclaiming God's Word. Despite the Biblical clarity, this doctrine – also known as predestination – is challenging. The false teaching that



before the foundation of the world God chose who would be saved and those who would not (I.E., double predestination), that God chose people because of something good about them or something they would do in the future, or that God is simply confirming our decision to believe in Him. These are not harmless errors, for they make something other than justification by grace through faith the main thing and rob Christ's witnesses of the comfort that this doctrine is meant to bring us. (Don't forget to LASSIE -Listen, Ask, Seek, Share, Invite, Encourage).

Blessed Shall You Be

This is God's promise to the Israelites as they stood beyond the Jordan outside of the Promised Land. He promises blessing to His people. He will make them prosper, whether they are in the city or the field. He will make their fruit of their work to prosper, whether from the ground, their wombs, their flocks, or their herds. He will make them to prosper in all things, whether upon their coming in or their going out.

But there's a catch. He would do this for Israel only "if you obey the voice of the LORD your God." (Deut. 28:2b) If they did that. He would cause that "all these blessings shall come upon vou and overtake vou." (Deut. 28:2a). If they didn't obey the voice of the Lord, if they didn't keep the commandments of the Lord and "walk in his ways" (Deut. 28:9), they would be met with curse and woe. The blessings would be replaced with curses. Everything that the Lord promised to prosper and bless would be cursed and fail.

Thanks be to God that our Lord Jesus Christ has come into our flesh and fulfilled the law for us – in our place and for our benefit. Our Lord Jesus Christ died for us – in our place and for our benefit. Our Lord Jesus Christ is risen from the dead for us – in our place and for our benefit. By this we have justification before God. We are forgiven, clean, holy, and righteous. The blessing of God is promised to us in Christ Jesus. "Blessed shall you be in the city, and blessed shall you be in the field. Blessed shall be the fruit of your womb and the fruit of your ground and the fruit of your cattle, the increase of your herds and the young of your flock. Blessed shall be your basket and your kneading bowl. Blessed shall you be when you come in, and blessed shall you be when you go out."

(Deuteronomy 28:3-6)

It depends upon his work, not ours.

All this is ours in Holy Baptism. For in Holy Baptism, God claims us as His own, makes us His children, His heirs, and His holy people. And so it is that the work of our hands and its fruit is holy because we are holy in Christ. It is pressed into His service, and it thereby becomes a blessing to us and to our neighbor.
