# A Message from Pastor Anderegg

n my July 19 sermon I indicated that I had some more thoughts and that I would include them here rather than making the sermon longer. But first, a brief review of the content of the sermon would be in order. In the sermon I discussed God's very frank acknowledgment that the world does not currently work the way He originally designed it.

As one seminary professor puts it: "Ever since Adam and Eve took that first lunch break the whole world has been out of whack!" I then compared living in this pre-resurrection era to sculptures Michelangelo was not able to finish before his death.

Michelangelo, I was told, saw himself as freeing figures from stone rather than carving them into it. And so we live at a time when we experience the "not yet" of being God's chosen people. Our lives are changed, here and now, by Jesus Christ and his death and resurrection for us, but we still live in a time when certain things trap us. It is quite easy to see this in the current struggles with the coronavirus. The image that I couldn't help but think of when putting the finishing touches on that sermon was the one described by C. S. Lewis in his classic The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe. As I recall it, the White Witch has cast her spell upon many "good" Narnians (inhabitants of Narnia). These are the faithful Aslan-seeking believers, and the witch has turned them into stone. They are stuck in a state of being inanimate. This is perhaps the way Lewis pictured death, although we do not believe in soul sleep. The tragic-looking, indeed very sad, statues decorate the White Witch's castle and courtyard. They are her prizes!

The good news comes after Aslan's death and resurrection! (Aslan is clearly a "Christ character," as a different seminary professor taught the concept.) He immediately proceeds to the castle and simply blows upon the statues, one at a time. Each one comes back to life and is somewhat surprised that they are no longer where they were. Theirs is a joyful celebration.

This picture of what it will be like when Christ returns to make all things right should drive our lives. When we feel depressed due to a pandemic we should remember that eternal life has yet to begin. When the struggles of this life (the death of a loved one, marital discord, you name it) lead us to wonder if God is still in charge we should know that He is. In a way similar to the old phrase, "Be patient. God isn't finished with me yet," we might think to ourselves, "Be patient. God isn't finished with this world yet.

This is why so many hymns point us to the resurrection. This is why our funeral liturgy is filled with resurrection language. This is why I consider the Gospel to not only include the fact that Jesus died to pay the price we owed for our sins but also to include the promise that we will someday live in a sinless world, unstained by the garbage and junk with which we currently live. Take heart, my friends. Be patient when you see just how fallen this fallen world is. God isn't finished with it yet! Pastor Anderegg



t's easy to forget that this world isn't your home, that you're going to spend eternity with Christ in a home specially prepared for you, and when


Jug you get to heaven you'll be rewarded for how well you fulfilled your God-given assignment here on earth. The Bible not only teaches this, it spells out the specifics. Here are three you need to keep in mind. 1) Your greatest reward will be in heaven, not on earth. Yes, there are earthly rewards (see *Mark* 10:30), but God reserves His greatest blessings for the day when 'each man's work will become evident' and 'he will receive a reward' (1 Corinthians 3:13-



14). Always give God your best. 2) Your reward will be based on quality, not quantity. We are impressed with size and status, but God is moved by sincerity. When He rewards you it will be based on what you did with what you had, and the 'heart' you put into it. That means we all have equal opportunity when it comes to rewards. 3) Your reward may be delayed, but it will never be denied. Think about that. When you've done what was needed yet you were ignored and misunderstood, remember, 'Your labor is not in vain.' When you've done the right thing but received neither credit nor acknowledgment, remember, 'Your labor is not in vain.' When you've served, given, and sacrificed, then willingly stepped aside so God would get all the glory, remember, 'Your labor is not in vain.' In the words of Jesus: 'Your Father, who sees everything, will reward you' (Matthew 6:4).

# **Volunteer Your Time**

Volunteers are the backbone of Citizens Against Domestic Violence (CADV). Our volunteers are extraordinary people who give much of their time and energy so that CADV can run smoothly. These people are as important to the operating of the center as the Board and Staff. We appreciate all they do for us and for those whom we provide services to. If you are interested in becoming a volunteer, the following are some positions available and brief descriptions. Each requires agency training and criminal background check before beginning.

#### •Crisis Line Work

Volunteer answers 24-hr hotline to provide telephone crisis intervention, information, and referral and complete a Hotline Contact Sheet documenting each call received.

#### Hospital Advocate

Involves face-to-face contact with victims and their families. Advocates are on call for a scheduled period of time each month. Advocates will respond as needed to the hospital emergency department to provide support and information to domestic and sexual violence victims that are brought in to be treated and their injuries documented.

#### Administrative/Clerical Support

Assists the administrative staff with daily duties including answering the office telephone, making copies, filing, preparing mailings, maintaining databases, etc.

#### Transportation

Provides transportation for clients and their children to and from various locations such as Dr. appointments, pharmacies, attorneys, school activities, etc.

#### •Child Care

Provides child care for women during support groups, educational groups, court, and Dr. appointments. Many of these hours are Tuesday evenings while mothers (both sheltered and not) are attending support group.

#### •Life Skills Class Facilitator

Trains residents in life skills, such as balancing check books, finances, basic health care, and dietary needs for selves and children.

#### Informational Booths & Speakers Bureau

Provides assistance with planning and implementing special events such as school fairs, health fairs, church events, and educational booths throughout the Tri-County area.

#### After Care Program

Provides transitional assistance to specific clients in moving through the continuum of care necessary for a violence-free life after shelter or other CADV services.

#### •Building & Yard Maintenance

Assists with general maintenance such as painting, carpentry, electrical, trimming trees, mowing, etc.

#### Donations

Assists with picking up, sorting through, and distributing donations received.

#### Translation

We see a growing number of victims in our community that speak little or no English. We are in need of volunteers who are fluent in foreign languages such as Spanish, Russian and others to translate so that victims may also receive the same high-quality crisis services that English speaking victims receive.

## **Thoughts from Our President**



s I sit and ponder on what the past few months have brought upon us, it makes me angry and sad.

Covid-19, which our country and the world reacted and continues to reacted too; shutting down our country, putting millions on unemployment, adding a pandemic additional \$600 a week to most people's unemployment, seeing our government react by sending everyone a check for \$1,200, making every issue that came up a political issue, pitting democrats against republicans, liberals against conservatives and family members against family members.

What we have gone through the past twenty years and particularly this past year is very Orwellian. 1984 was required reading when I was a young man in high school. I don't remember exactly when, but I do remember when they tried to ban the book. It was supposedly anti government and too sexually explicit. I am re-reading the book today, and it was unfortunately so very prophetic.

You know, many of us in this congregation can remember when as high school graduates (1950's and 1960's) our thoughts of the year 2000 were non-existent, so far away I could not imagine. My parents got their first car when I was eight. Living in a rural state, my family did not own a television until I was 12 or 13. Initially we could only get one station that came on around 10:00 am in the morning, and signed off around 10:30 pm playing our national anthem. Rocket ships were a thing movies were made about with Buck Rogers. There was airline travel, but limited. When we went to a high school football game, they played the national anthem and everyone stood and they did not have to tell people to remove their hat. We all new the words and sang the anthem with all our heart. Not exactly the same way today. When I would go to one of Hayden and Hannah's wrestling meets there were perhaps a dozen of us who sang the national anthem when it was played. That was just five or six years ago. Today our overpaid and pamper athletes disrespect the very country they live

when it was played. That was just five or six years ago. Today our overpaid and pamper athletes disrespect the very country they live in, never fought for or did anything for, but reap huge financial rewards because of our sports crazed society.

All of you can remember when the first satellite was shot off and orbited the world in space. If I remember correctly that was October 4, 1957. I remember it because I was in advanced basic training in Ft. Hood, TX, and we were preparing to go to Germany in December. While in Germany I visited the World's Fair in Brussels, Belgium in 1958. One of the highlights of the Russian Pavilion was a mock up of the Sputnik. What I remembered most was how small it was. That was when I came to understand it was not the military value of this tiny vessel, it was the potential of the concept of the use of space. You will also remember the United States orbited the Explorer January 31, 1958, 484 days after the Russian Sputnik orbited (in a much lower orbit) the earth.

Sorry it took all of that thought process. But as I look at all the happenings over my tender 81 years, I realize that there is not much I can do about our citizenry's inability to learn from history and our willingness to forget the great sacrifices made over the years to keep this country, under God, a government of the people, by the people and for the people.

Ontinuing the special revelation of Jesus Christ and ten reasons that we believe the New Testament writers told the truth.

(From the book "I Don't Have The Faith To Be An Atheist" by Norman Geisler and Frank Turek)

**Reason 4:** The New Testament (NT) writers carefully distinguished Jesus' words from their own. Though quotation marks did not exist when the NT was written, it is clear that the writers set apart Jesus' words from their own. Why is this evidence of their truthfulness? Because it would've been very easy to solve the theological conflicts by putting words into Jesus' mouth. Think about it. If one was to make up the Christian story to pass off as truth, wouldn't it be more convenient to just make Jesus say things that would solve the disputes and end the debates brought on by what Jesus actually said and did? They could have easily solved the problems such as circumcision, obeying the Law of Moses, speaking in tongues, women in the church, and many others just by making up quotes from Jesus. The writers never did that. They took what Jesus said at face value and never made up sayings that would more easily solve conflicts between believers. Paul, who wrote nearly half of the NT, dealt with many of these controversial issues. When he quotes Jesus he explicitly distinguishes his words from Jesus'. (1 Cor.7:10-12) Why would he be so careful if he wasn't telling the truth? The best explanation for the accuracy of the NT writers is that they were really telling the truth.

# Insights from Every One His Witness

"Grace to you and peace from Him who is and who was and who is to come, and from the seven spirits who are before His throne, and from Jesus Christ the faithful witness, the firstborn of the dead, and ruler of kings on earth." (Rev. 1:4-5). Our witness begins and ends with Jesus. He is the faithful witness. He came from Heaven to bear witness to the world. When Jesus speaks, He witnesses the truth. In John's gospel, Jesus explains that when He speaks such truth, He is bearing witness about himself - which is reinforced by the witness of the Father. Jesus answered, "Even if I do bear witness about Myself, My testimony is true, for I know where I came from and where I am going... I am the one who bears witness about Myself, and the Father who sent me bears witness about me." (John 8:14-18). His witness brings life to the world. He is the promised one of whom the prophets testified (John 5:39-40, 46). Jesus is also the subject of the Holy Spirit's witness. Jesus told His disciples "when the Helper comes... He will bear witness about Me." (John 15:26). Hebrews 10:15 states that "the Holy Spirit also bears witness to us" so that we receive the forgiveness of sins through Jesus' offering of Himself as the full and final sacrifice for our sins. It is Jesus' ultimate witness to world. He validates the testimony and witness of the prophets. He witnessed to the Jewish leaders when they asked for a sign. His answer – his witness - was, "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up." (John 2:18-19) Then John 2:22 shows the impact that Jesus' witness had on His disciples: "When He was raised from the dead, His disciples remembered He had said this, and they believed the Scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken." The witness of Jesus continues today as the Holy Spirit testifies about



Him: "This is He who came by water and blood- Jesus Christ; not by the water only but by the blood. And the Spirit is the one who testifies because the Spirit is the truth. For there are three that testify.

## **Giving More than Getting**

Winston Churchill reportedly said, "We make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give." According to Churchill then, our lives are defined less by what we have gotten and more by what we give away.

### July 14, 2020

- He noted that our two outdoor services went well.


## **Old Business**
