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The Health of Peace's System

Way back in April, I began a series on conflict resolution. This is the second installment of that series since I chose to look at a societal issue in June. So, let's jump into the deep end.

ecall that at its lowest level conflict is simply a difference of opinion. Where we go wrong—indeed, the times we need to seek forgiveness—are very often times when we are convinced that our opinion is 100 percent accurate. Having just preached on the account of Mary and Martha, I concluded that Martha was 100 percent sure that her sister should have been helping prepare for the meal for Jesus. And Martha proceeded to tell Jesus

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that what Mary was doing (or rather was *not* doing) was wrong. Imagine being told, face to face, by Jesus that *you* were the one who was wrong *not* your sister!

It is oh so hard to do; to admit when we are wrong in a conflict. In fact, I'm convinced that with each sentence or paragraph two people have, what starts out as a simple difference of opinion gets converted and subverted. The Old Evil Foe increases our conviction that we are right about the subject. Thus, even minor differences of opinion escalate. For a good while now, when I have my head on straight, I remind myself of a phrase that I began using, some time ago: "I'm most dangerous when I'm right."

Now, add another issue into the mix. I believe we are all old enough to remember being taught to distinguish between fact and fiction. But today's younger generations are being taught that what they "feel" is right. Indeed, it's factual. And we sometimes fall prey to this

thinking ourselves. Our ideas, our picture of the way something *should be done*, our view of the situation . . . each or any of these can cause us to become quite stubborn in holding on to what we believe to be *the "fact" that we're right!*

Christians are uniquely poised to work through conflict, especially Christians who still confess their sins. If we take corporate confession and forgiveness seriously, we are admitting to God and ourselves that we do far more wrong than right; far more bad than good. Satan convinces us that what the other person did is far worse than what we did. Perhaps that's why Jesus made a statement that is one of the next steps in resolving conflict: "Remove the log from your own eye before trying to

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remove the speck from your brother's or sister's.

I heard a seminary professor say that the Lord may very well have been verbally "drawing" a cartoon for us believers when He said to take the log out of our own eye before trying to remove the speck from our brother's (and no doubt sister's). There is, of course, tremendous wisdom here. If one looks into the mirror of God's Law he or she sees a sinner who needs forgiveness *not* a holier than thou saint who does not. Have we forgotten how to apologize?

When I was teaching third grade at a Lutheran school in Memphis, there were plenty of times I'd see a conflict on the playground that was getting physical. I would then call the two students to come hither. One would say, "He started it. He did so and so." The other would have his own opinion of who started "it," and would voice it. Ultimately, in many cases, (even though I lack the wisdom of Solomon) I would say, "Now, I want the two of you to say you're sorry, give each other a hug, and go play." (By the way, it almost always worked!)

We are *not* third graders, and I'm not going to ask any of you to hug the other, but I am going to encourage you to look carefully at who you are before you judge another individual for his or her actions. Yes, there are times when we *are* confronted (even in a congregation) by someone who either has or seems to have declared us their enemy. It's at those times that we need, all the more, to remember that our fellow sinner/saints are just that.

There is a fine line between bravery and stupidity. Believe me, dear sisters and brothers in Christ, when I say that I am either bold enough or stupid enough to try to help with any conflict you face. Together, we can seek the Lord's assistance and be led by His Word to find a solution to both our minor differences of opinion or our major issues that keep us locked in a prison of anger, guilt, or taking offense.



ne of the differences between African and American culture is that in Africa it is normal to say, "I am lost. Please direct me to such and such place." On the other hand, it is often considered strange for an American man to ask for directions. When it comes to Christ the reverse is true, however. A person begins by admitting he or she is lost. This fact is made clear in the Gospel Jesus proclaims: He is seeking those who are lost. Until a person realizes he or she hasn't got a clue where they're going, it isn't very likely they will be asking for directions. The purpose of Christ's coming -- and of His cross and the empty tomb of His resurrection -- is to find and redeem the lost, to draw sinners to Himself. In Christ alone we have our salvation and our ultimate direction. God is still seeking those who are lost. Through His Word and the work of the Holy Spirit He reaches out, guiding those who cling to Him in faith back into His loving will for their lives. And it is among those without direction who are lost that we must come alongside as God works through us -- His search and rescue team -sharing the Good News of salvation in Jesus Christ.

Is God Unjust In The Way He Treats Us?

Last month we saw that Job's pain and suffering was not the result of some particular sin. So, why did God allow him to experience such terrible catastrophes? Even Job, at one point, thought God to be unjust and went so far as to ask God for a hearing as in a court of law. If God would grant him a hearing, he would prove himself righteous and God wrong in the way he was being treated. Like so many since, he believed he knew better than God matters like divine justice, goodness and mercy. All those who say that the existence of evil. pain, and suffering disprove the existence of a loving God are actually placing themselves above God in making that judgement. They have a pride problem more than an existence of evil problem. People don't reject God because of evil outside of themselves. They reject God because of their own evil pride being paramount. As we know, God did give Job a hearing. At that hearing God's first question was, "Where were you when I laid the foundations of the earth?" At that point, the debate was over. Job realized that for him to stand in judgement over the all-knowing creator God was the height of foolishness and arrogance. Later, God compared Job to the Behemoth and Leviathan He made. God demonstrated to Job, and to us, that we are very



small in comparison to God's other creatures, and we are not in a position to pass judgement on the God who made them and us. It is noted that in Job's attempt to understand his suffering, he vacillates somewhat between trusting God and believing Him to be unjust. But it is also true that God led Job to repentance and forgiveness in part through his suffering.


Witnesses and the Hidden Things Of God

(Witnesses cannot understand what God has revealed but not explained—i.e. God's mind)

"Oh the depths of the riches and wisdom and knowledge of God! How unsearchable are His judgements and how inscrutable His ways! For who has known the mind of the Lord, or who has been His counselor? (Romans 11:33-34)

od is God. In His wisdom, He has determined what to reveal to us and what to keep hidden. For reasons only known to Him, there are things clearly revealed that defy understanding. One example of the mysteries of God is the Trinity. He has revealed Himself as a Trinity. We can describe the Trinity as being three Persons in one Essence, but we cannot explain the nature of the Trinity. We confess it and we marvel at it as we do the real presence of Christ in the Lord's Supper. We know and confess that the body and blood of Jesus is present in, with, and under the bread and wine, but cannot explain how it can be. It's a mystery. Such is the election by

chosen a limited number of people for salvation, that He chose them before creation, and that He based His choice solely on His grace, but we do not and cannot know whom God has chosen, how many He has chosen, or when they will come to faith. These things belong to the mind of God. As Christ's witnesses, we do not need to concern ourselves with the things that God has not revealed to us. Trying to answer these questions (like "Why did God choose some people and not others?") will lead us into error because we cannot know what God has not revealed to us. Everything that He has not revealed is His concern, not ours.

Stewardship News

ave you ever noticed the subtle ceremony involved in receiving the offerings during the Divine Service? After all the offerings have been collected, they are brought forward and given to the pastor or one of his assistants. The pastor then turns toward the altar, and as he slightly bows his head, the collection plates with the offerings in them are raised slightly to the Lord and then placed either on the altar or a table for the offerings. Why do we do have this ceremony? And what does it teach us? For that is what ceremony does; it teaches, as the Augsburg Confession tells us, what we need to know about Christ (AC XXIV, 1–3).

Originally, this ceremony included more than simply bringing forward what was collected in the offering plates. The elements for the

Holy Communion—the bread and the wine—were brought forward along with the offering plates. As the offering plates and the elements were lifted toward the Lord, and placed upon the altar, the elements would be put in the center and the altar, now made a table, would be set for the Lord's Supper.



These gifts brought to the altar came from the sweat of

the people's brow. It is the bread and wine, the fruits of the peoples' labor in this fallen world. After six days of labor and toil, the people would bring a generous proportion for the Lord's work. It was set upon the altar and offered to the Lord for Him to take up and press into His service for His gracious work in and among them.

For what they offered to the Lord from the sweat of their brow, the bread of anxious toil, came back to them as the bread of life, the bread come down from heaven that whoever eats this bread and drinks this cup would receive life through the forgiveness of their sins.

This is not unlike what the Lord did for His people in the Old Testament:

You shall tithe all the yield of your seed that comes from the field year by year. And before the Lord your God, in the place that he will choose, to make his name dwell there, you shall eat the tithe of your grain, of your wine, and of your oil, and the firstborn of your herd and flock, that you may learn to fear the Lord your God always. And if the way is too long for you, so that you are not able to carry the tithe, when the Lord your God blesses you, be-

cause the place is too far from you, which the Lord your God chooses, to set his name there, then you shall turn it into money and bind up the money in your hand and go to the place that the Lord your God chooses and spend the monev for whatever you desire—oxen or sheep or wine or strong drink, whatever your appetite craves. And you shall eat there before the Lord your God and rejoice, you and your household.

What a blessing! God provides for us in all things. He provides bread from the sweat of our brows, and He receives this from us in the first fruits offerings we give to Him in thanksgiving and praise. He receives and turns it into spiritual bread, heavenly bread, the bread of eternal life and gives it back to us so that we might have joy. So, the next time you are in the Divine Service, watch this ceremony in wonder, that the Lord gives back to us, what we have given to Him so that we may rejoice in the salvation He has won upon the cross and gives to us in His supper.

- The removal of the white cross in the front yard was discussed. It was decided that an estimate will be sought to have it moved to an area in the cemetery. When the estimate is obtained, the council will make the decision regarding what action will be taken.
- We need to purchase lighted exit signs to comply with fire codes.

Closing: Pastor Anderegg closed with prayer.
