Christian Symbols



Chi Rho

The Chi Rho is an ancient monogram of Christ. The symbol is composed of the first

two letters of the Greek word for Christ: XPICTOC (pronounced Christos). There are many variations, but the most common form superimposes the "X" (Chi) on the "P" (Rho). Although it isn't considered to be a cross, the Chi Rho invokes Jesus' crucifixion. The symbol has been in use for more than 1,600 years. Early Christians used the Chi Rho as a sign of their faith, and Constantine the Great placed it on his soldiers' shields.



Chalice and Cross

The chalice is a symbol of Holy Communion. The pointed cross is known as the Passion Cross, Agony

Cross or Cross of Suffering. Together these symbols represent the agony of Christ's passion and his obedient suffering.

A Case of Mistaken Identity

ince I have been writing about reconciliation for a good while, now, I would like to talk about an obstacle that can easily derail the process of reconciliation. In his book—*The Peacemaker*: A Biblical Guide to Resolving Personal Conflict—Ken Sande comes very close to saying what I'd like to say. He lists two Biblical principles. He says that Christians should seek to glorify God as they seek to reconcile and that one should take the log out of his own eye *before* addressing the

speck in his neighbor's. These two Biblical principles, if followed, can change hearts and lives in a church that is plagued by negative conflict.

Remember that I have not seen unhealthy conflict at Peace. These articles I've been writing are simply things we can put into our *back pocket* in case a time comes when we need them. With that in mind, I will start where Ken Sande



starts. He tells us that many people are convinced that conflict, in and of itself, is bad. This is often a case of mistaken identity. Conflict might be a signal that something needs to change. Indeed, at its lowest level, conflict is simply a difference of opinion. In fact, this case of mistaken identity can lead a congregation to sort of have a "spirit" of unhealthiness, where people feel that they must hide how they feel about something.

But there is a bigger problem with thinking that conflict is *always* bad, and it's that the Old Evil Foe (the **Great Perverter** and **Master Converter**) can convert a person's decision to hide the conflict into a false notion that they're "keeping the peace." Satan can pervert the Christian's good intentions into a special kind of haughtiness.

More than a decade ago, I was able to verbalize a phrase that has helped me a great deal, when I think about *my role* as a pastor. To put it simply, "I'm most dangerous when I'm right!" Born and raised in a family where the unspoken rule was that whoever could yell the loudest and make the most sense, while doing so, could pretend to be the "winner." So, my particular unhealthy behavior is a little bit different. I'm almost always ready to work through conflict. In fact, when I used to do premarital counseling, I would try to get a couple to actually have an argument, so that we might discuss negative patterns of behavior.

Likewise, I would try to help a couple see that conflict is sometimes necessary by picturing it in the following manner. When we lived in the parsonage, we had two refrigerators—one upstairs, and the other in the basement. Picture your conflict as the leftovers of a meal. In particular, picture it as the meal that was leftover when our youngest daughter realized that there were certain kinds of seafood she didn't like. It was the clams that led her to announce that she didn't like it. Sara rescued her by switching meals with her. Unfortunately, she did not finish it, and there was some left over. However, the upstairs refrigerator was full, so she put it downstairs. Well, we promptly forgot about it. Imagine what it smelled like when, after a few weeks, I smelled an odd smell that seemed to be emanating from the refrigerator, even with the door closed! (I hate the smell of fish, by the way.)

The next time you sense that there's some conflict and might be tempted to think it should be hidden, remember that it has the potential to do harm to the relationships, whether it is between two people or dozens. In fact, what you're feeling *could* be a case of mistaken identity.

In October, we will talk more about defensiveness and the harm that overreacting when one is angry can cause.



n recent years the Word of God has been the focus of a great many attacks. Atheist and agnostic, doubter and denier, skeptic and cynic have all gleefully thrown their barbs and darts at Holy Scripture. If it weren't so sad, it would be almost laughable to see how they pounce on an imagined and what they believe to be newly discovered inconsistency of Scripture. Holding their breaths and stomping their feet, they demand the church explain these errors. Unfortunately, they seldom listen to anything that is said in response. Their actions all remind me of the time when churchman John Wesley received a critical note, which, in part, read, "The Lord has told

me to tell you that He doesn't need your book-learning, your Greek, and your Hebrew." Humbly, Wesley answered, "Thank you, sir. Your letter was superfluous, however, as I already know the Lord has no need for my 'book-learning,' as you put it. However, although the Lord has not directed me to say so, on my own responsibility, I would like to say to you that the Lord



does not need your ignorance either." Wesley was right.

God neither needs our booklearning, nor does He need the ignorance of His self-appointed detractors. What the Lord needs is people who see themselves as sinners and Him as a God who saves. What He wants is people who say, "Lord, be merciful to me a sinner" and, who believe, because of His Son's sacrifice that He is. What He needs is people who know they need the Savior and people who are willing to share Him. This is what Lutheran Hour Ministries tries to do. It is what your congregation tries to do. It is what God's people continue to do. Prepared to make a defense of the Gospel, we share the Savior with those who need to hear it the most. It is for such people that we pray today.

The Prayer: Dear Lord, Your Word and plan of salvation will always have its critics. Now I ask that those who delight in challenging Your Word may be equally open to hearing what that Word says. May they be humbled and realize that if they are ever to be forgiven and saved, it will only be through the blood of Jesus. Lord, I pray for myself. May I be prepared to make a defense of the Gospel to those who need to hear it. Guide and guard my words, so they are effective in touching the lost. This I pray in the Savior's Name. Amen. Athanasian Creed Section Two-Three

Three Distinct Persons

Encore Post: The exact date and author of the Athanasian Creed are unknown. It derives its name from the theological tradition of Saint Athanasius. It is typically dated to the late 4 or early 5 century AD. Augustine's *On the Trinity* (415 AD) has very similar language to the creed. Athanasius' lifelong battle against the heresies prevalent in the early Christian church of North Africa built a theological tradition, which heavily influenced the Western church.

"Just as we are compelled by the Christian truth to acknowledge each distinct person as God and Lord, so also are we prohibited by the catholic religion to say that there are three Gods or Lords."

In the second section of the creed, we confess personhood of the Trinity, each distinct from the other. This rejects *Modalism*, that God changes masks, appearance, or function, but is the same in person in each case. Rather, we confess that the individual persons of the Triune God possess unique attributes to the exclusion of the others.

This distinctness of person also describes the divine economy. That is economy in the sense of interrelationship, not of money. Within the Trinity there is an economy of relationship between the persons. The Father is eter-



nally neither made nor begotten. The Son is eternally begotten of the Father. The Holy Spirit is eternally proceeding from the Father and the Son, neither created nor begotten.

These expressions of the Christian understanding of the Trinity push against modalism by establishing a concurrence of personhood. It is impossible for the Father to put on a Son mask. He is eternally the Father, and His personhood is unique from the Son. The Son cannot put on a Holy Spirit mask because His attributes in His person are distinct from the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit cannot wear the attributes of the Father because they are unique from His own attributes. All of these attributes are eternally the attributes of the persons of God.

But, these immutable characteristics do not a hierarchy make. All persons of the Trinity are equally God. And, none is before or after another.

The Father is not the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is not the Son. The Son is not the Father. The Holy Spirit is God. The Son is God. The Father is God, coeternal and coequal.

Dear Baptized, the Trinity in Unity and the Unity in Trinity is to be worshipped!

Paul said that those who never learned the Ten Commandments still "show that the work of the law is written on their hearts" Romans 2:15. In our daily lives we can readily observe evidence of natural law in the minds of all people. For example, when we hear of murders, rapes, and terrorism on the news, do any of us think that those acts are morally defensible? Do newscasts have to tell us that these acts are wrong? Or do they assume that viewers will naturally reach that conclusion on their own? Of course, those who commit acts of terrorism have been indoctrinated to think that such acts are morally acceptable and are exceptions to the rule overriding natural law. When one concludes that such

behavior is wrong, they are unconsciously appealing to a moral standard, not just for themselves or Americans only, or even only Christians. It is a universal standard of right verses wrong for everyone, which can't exist in a world of nature plus nothing (materialism). It's an inherent part of the worldview of the viewers. As atheist Richard Dawkins said, a world without God is a world without right and wrong.

Next month number five: **Be**cause natural law is observable, it is subject to scientific evaluation and description.



elievers are meant to be in fellowship with Christ and other believers. "As you come to Him, a living stone rejected by men but in the sight of God chosen and precious, you yourselves like living stones are being built up as a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ." (1 Peter 2:4-5)

Relationships aren't just the context in which we speak to people about Jesus, they are also one of the desired outcomes of our witness. Through our witness, we are hoping that people will become connected to Jesus *and* His Church. When we tell people about Jesus, we look to the Holy Spirit to work faith in them through the power of His Word. When He does, people are connected to Jesus by Him. But that doesn't



mean that our work as witnesses is done. God desires His people to be connected to one another. He conveys the corporate nature of the Christian faith by describing His Church as a body of "many members" who are "baptized into one body" and "made to drink of one Spirit" (see Corinthians 12: 12-13) By connecting to a local congregation, we carry out Jesus' commission to make disciples by baptizing and teaching them. (Matthew 28:19-20) Remem-

ber, the Great Commission is a corporate calling, not an individual's mandate. Our work as Christ's witnesses is to tell people about Jesus *and* connect them to a local congregation where God's people gather around Word and Sacrament.

Define Your Life by How You Give

Winston Churchill reportedly said that "we make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give." According to Churchill, our lives are defined not by what we have gotten, but by what we give away.

Our Lord's life is defined in this way. He gave completely of Himself for us. He became man for us. He taught the truth of God's Word. He healed those with many and various diseases. He died the death that we deserved for our sins. He gave of Himself in order to save us from sin, death and hell. And so it is that by giving completely of Himself, He got for Himself us, making us citizens of His eternal kingdom by grace.

As it was for Jesus, so it also is for us. We get more from giving than we do from simply getting. For giving softens our hearts and frees us from the grip which the worries of this world and making a living has on us. For when we are singularly focused on making a living, we are singularly focused on what we get. That mindset begins to bleed into all areas of our lives — or

into all areas of our lives — our relationships with friends and family, with neighbors and coworkers, and with the Lord. It shifts our focus from asking the question, "How can I be a



friend, family member, neighbor and servant to others," to asking the question, "What have they done for me lately?" We become more selfish instead of selfless.

But when we give, we do not have less, we do not become less; rather, we have more and become more. When we give, we join in the bond of friendship and family, the bond of service to those around us out of love for them. And love is the fulfillment of the Law. It is the nature of God Himself, for God is Love. Thus, we are participating in the divine nature. As Jesus said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35).
