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Christian Symbols



Nimbus

The nimbus is a halo of light often shown in art behind the head of a religious

figure such as Mary, Joseph, the disciples, the four evangelists and so forth. Though often just a simple circle, one with three rays symbolizes the Trinity, so this style of nimbus — or a triangular one — may be seen behind Christ.

Anchor

Because in ancient times an anchor represented safety, early Christians adopted it as a symbol of

their hope in Christ. "We have this hope as an anchor for the soul, firm and secure" (Hebrews 6:19, NIV). Word play may have been involved: ankura, Greek for "anchor," sounds similar to en kurio, or "in the Lord." As Latin became Christians' primary language, however, the "anchor-Lord" connection would have faded.

Communion of Saints

very Sunday, we confess that we believe in the "communion of saints." This phrase is not about the Lord's Supper (yes, I know we sometimes call it **Holy Communion!**) It refers to the fellowship between members of their invisible church, both in the paradise with the Lord and with us on earth.

Theologians call Christians who have died trusting in Jesus for their salvation the *Church Triumphant*. They have been cleansed of their sin. God has dried every tear in their eyes. They praise the Lamb of God night and day with great joy. In Jesus, they have conquered sin, death and the power of the devil. On the last day, God will raise them from their graves and we will join them forever at the Marriage Feast of the



The Christians in this world, who still fight every day with the Devil and his forces, the world and its pressures to worship other gods and the old Adam, are called the *Church Militant*. The word is Latin for "to fight like a soldier." When the Christian dies, he or she enters the Church Triumphant. William W. How describes the relationship between the two states of the church well in his beloved hymn, "For All the Saints:"

O blest communion, fellowship divine

We feebly struggle, they in glory shine;

Yet all are one in Thee, for all are Thine.

Alleluia! Alleluia! (TLH 463 Stanza four)

When a Christian dies and enters eternal life, they no longer are aware of this world. We do not pray for them, because they no longer need prayer. We do not pray to them, because they do not answer, nor is

there anything they can do for us. We pray to the Father and the Son and sometimes the Holy Spirit. They are where help can be found.

But there is a time when we pray *with* them. When we gather for worship, we are not just praying with those in the room with us. We pray together with the whole church — both the Church Militant around the world of all nations, races, languages and places, with Angels and Archangels, and the Church Triumphant, the whole company of heaven. The day will soon enough come — today, tomorrow, decades from now, or at the end of time — when we will worship in the presence of God as members of the Church Triumphant. For now, we join them every time we gather to praise God. It is why theologians often call Sunday the eighth day of the week. It is a time outside of time itself in eternity, when the clock stops for us until the pastor makes the sign of the cross at the end of worship and we realize about an hour has past in the world around us!

ANSWERING OBJECTIONS TO THE FAITH

The Basics of Christian Apologetics

Questions and Suggestions

Are those who say they don't believe in the Bible actually taking a blind leap of faith away from Christianity? How might you respond to someone who says this?

Those who say they don't believe in the Bible, in most cases, are taking a blind leap of faith. It is actually worse than that- they are taking a leap of faith that is contrary to the evidence. They should be directed to the question of Jesus in Matthew 15:16 ("Who do you say that I am?") and be invited to read how Peter answered that question as well as how the other Gospel writers answered the question.

What would you say are some of the qualities of a good teacher? Do these qualities fit Jesus?

The most important quality is pursuit of truth; also being knowledgeable, being willing to challenge popular opinions, passion for one's students, being a good communicator, being honest, fair, straightforward, and be willing to sacrifice for the sake of truth. We can describe the qualities of Jesus as such; they will be one and the same. The conclusion can be drawn: Jesus was the master teacher.

All Alone

If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord. So then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's. For to this end Christ died and lived again, that He might be Lord both of the dead and of the living. Romans 14:8-9

hile looking for stories for the Daily Devotions, my eye was caught by the title of an article located on another web page. The title said, "Man Dies All By Himself." Was the story about a forgotten movie star, or some homeless individual, or a hiker who had taken a climb beyond his level of expertise?

Maybe this was the story of a hoarder who had been crushed by a falling pile of beloved possessions. It was the kind of title I had to investigate. Clicking on the link produced a large picture of a hollow-cheeked old man. Above his head, in very large letters were the words "Man Dies All By Himself."

There was no article, nothing to explain the picture. Then it clicked. The man who had died all by himself was Dr. Jack Kevorkian, the man who had helped terminate the lives of over 130 people -- people who had incurable and painful diseases,

who had no hope, no value, nothing to keep them linked to this world. At least that's what Kevorkian said. It's what many others believe.

Recently, a past executive director of Lutheran Hour Ministries went home to his Lord.
Rodger Hebermehl was his name. Many of you knew him.
Those who didn't missed the acquaintance of a special man, a gentle, Christian man, who loved his Lord and had a tremendous longing for the lost souls of humanity.

Over the last few years Rodger had suffered from an illness that he knew would end his life. Gradually the things he could do were diminished. Did Rodger say there was no hope, that he had no value or purpose, nothing to keep him here? If you think that, you don't know Rodger.

Allow me to share that when Rodger no longer could get around by himself, when limitations were many and opportunities few, he prayed he might share the Savior's story with a few more unbelievers. He prayed he might be used by the Lord to let them know the transforming power of the Christ. He prayed the Holy Spirit might use him to bring a dozen people to faith.

May I tell you one other thing about Rodger? Rodger did not die all by himself. Yes, he had his loving wife Cassandra at his side and, yes, there had been many others with him during those last days. But when Rodger left this life he did so in the company of Jesus who had redeemed him -- the Savior he had considered it an honor to serve. No, Rodger did not die alone. Because of Jesus,

no Christian man or woman ever dies ... alone.

The A in LASSIE stands for "Ask."

(Ask questions that will encourage discussion.)

sking pairs well with Listen because asking questions encourages people to continue speaking.

It's a powerful way to learn more about people's worldview, spiritual perspectives, knowledge of God's Word, concerns about life, etc. And questions are always more effective than giving statements. It shows that we are interested in them as a person lending dignity to them.

Jesus often asked questions. An example is that of the blind beggar, Bartimaeus in Mark 10:46b-47, 51. "What do you want me to do for you?" Jesus made no assumptions or imposed no limitations on him thereby giving him dignity. Asking tends to encourage discussion, to think about a topic more deeply, and reduces people's resistance to being open.

Questions should line up with how the other person connects and communicates. Remember the HEAD, HEART and HANDS people.



For a **HEAD** person, one should ask questions that are information oriented to understand how the person thinks and what he understands.



A **HEART** person likely will respond best to questions that are centered on emotions.



A HANDS person will respond to practical matters that will gain insight to the person's sense of purpose and how it relates to spiritual matters.

How can you know how a person connects and communicates? By listening! As you listen, strive to pick up on their communication preference and then aim questions that line up with it.



Mercy and Grace Lead to Generosity



his is St. Paul's exclamation upon hearing the Corinthian church's response to the preaching of the Gospel of Jesus Christ and his request for support for the church in Jerusalem. The Christians in Corinth heard and received God's mercy in Christ, and they responded to St. Paul's call to support Christians in Jerusalem with a collection. The Corinthians' joy filled Jerusalem's need.

This is the reality of stewardship. Because of God's generosity in the giving of His Son to die on the cross for us, we are to be generous with all that we receive from Him. What do we receive? Everything. All that we are and all that

we have is the Lord's. He is the creator and the giver. We are His creatures and those who receive what He gives.

It sounds easy. And it is. But then again it isn't. Stewardship is easy because it is God's work.

Through what God gives, we give to others. Through what God gives, we support the work of the church for the life of the world. He gives; we receive. And like our generous Father in Heaven, we, as His children, use what He gives to us to love and serve others.

But stewardship is also difficult. That is because it goes against our natural inclination to think that what I have is mine to do what I want with. This is our sinful nature. It is our selfishness and our greed. How can we who have been given everything life, food, clothing, house, home, forgiveness, divine sonship, an eternal inheritance — be so stingy with what we give to the church, the place where we hear about and receive all that God gives us and does for us? We are all guilty of this kind of thinking. And the only godly response is to repent and trust in the Gospel.

For if God has given you His own Son, will He not give you all things? Yes. He will. This is His sure and certain promise. God provides for His people. He provides everything we need for this body and life and for the life that is to come.

The church is a mercy place. It's a place where God's mercy in the death and resurrection of His Son, Jesus Christ, is given and received. For us who believe it means forgiveness, life and salvation in the face of sin, death and the power of the devil. Here in the church, we inhale God's mercy in Word and Sacrament, and exhale this same mercy in love and service to our neighbor. And that is an enduring, joyful thing to do. Our joy fills our neighbor's need because His joy filled ours (Heb. 12:2). Thanks be to God for His inexpressible gift!
