A Message from Pastor Anderegg



God's Good Gift of Government

ow is a good time to remind ourselves that God is in control. It's also a good time to remind ourselves that government is good and is "instituted by God." While this is sometimes hard to swallow it remains true since it appears in the one book in which truth resides. So I will quote the passage that speaks most clearly about God's good gift of government:

¹ Let every person be subject to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and those that exist have been instituted by God. ² Therefore whoever resists the authorities resists what God has appointed, and those who resist will incur judgment. ³ For rulers are not a terror to good conduct, but to bad. Would you have no fear of the one who is in authority? Then do what is good, and you will receive his approval, ⁴ for he is God's servant for your good. But if you do wrong, be afraid, for he does not bear the sword in vain. For he is the servant of God, an avenger who carries out God's wrath on the wrongdoer. ⁵ Therefore one must be in subjection, not only to avoid God's wrath but also for the sake of conscience.

Let's break this down verse by verse. In verse one God tells us that there is no authority except from God. This takes some really hard head-scratching because we know that some governing authorities have carried our horrific violence. We've also seen a governing authority who, despite having a harsh, condescending, etc. demeanor did more for the Christian church/faith than nearly any in my lifetime. So it must be a matter of degree. Every governing authority is instituted by God, but some do the Lord's work more often, while others "keep the peace" in a menacing way (I'm referring here to those outside the "umbrella" of American democracy.

Moving on to verse two we learn that if you resist the governing authorities you run the risk of incurring judgment upon yourself. Fortunately, in our country, the governing authorities don't force us to do things that would go against our conscience (although that may be changing). Nevertheless, our "new" governing authorities may have ideologies and policies which we don't like or that actually go against God's will (abortion is an easy one to spot). So as we live with these new authorities we ought not have in our mind the notion that they are evil. Remember, they are instituted by God. And God is not

This is the point at which I've heard people say, "Well, I just don't be-



lieve that. They're doing such horrible things they have to be all bad." But Scripture, and particularly the text above does not bear that out. In fact, when the Holy Spirit inspired Paul to write the words above the governing authorities were, in fact, much more evil than any of our leaders. They were actually persecuting Christians. Yet, the Lord had Paul warn the members of the congregation that they should not seek to commit insurrection.*

*An asterik is important here because there have been rulers who were in fact evil, as you know. And there have been times when even a Lutheran pastor participate in a plot to assassinate Adolf Hitler. His name was Dietrich Bonhoeffer. Again, however, by the grace of God, we do not live in a country in which crimes against humanity are forced upon any one given people or

A pologetics (Ten reasons we can believe that the New Testament is true.)

Reason #8 - The New Testament (NT) authors challenge their readers to verify their claims. Some of the claims of accuracy include Luke's overt declaration to Theophilus (Luke 1:1-4); Peter's testimony that they "did not follow cleverly devised tales but were eyewitnesses"; Paul's brave pronouncements to Festus and King Agrippa (Acts 26) and statement of an early creed that mentioned 500 eyewitnesses of the risen Christ

(1 Cor. 15). Also Paul makes another claim to the Corinthians that attest to the truth of his preaching: that he had performed miracles to them (2 Cor. 12:12). He tells them, "The things that mark an apostle – signs, wonders and miracles – were done among you with great perseverance." If he actually had not done those miracles, he would have de-



stroyed his credibility among them. The only real conclusion is that Paul really did them and was a true apostle.

Who is a "Nones"?

Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly handling the word of truth.

2 Timothy 2:15

Do you know somebody who is a "Nones?"

In truth, I didn't know what a "Nones" was until I read the Dallas news story which spoke of Americans who don't identify with any religion. The "Nones" get that name because when they're asked about their religious affiliation they say, "None." The rest of the article gave the explanations of experts as to why someone might be a "Nones." One scholar said, "In the news media "Christians" are routinely depicted as narrow-minded bigots bent on keeping out anyone who is the slightest bit different. They are defined by what they are against, not by what they stand for. Love is rarely talked about while judgment is always talked about." Another said, "Christianity has been used historically as an excuse for pogroms, wars, crusades, Inquisitions, and others terrible things." Yet another suggested, "over the last 50 years people are finding supportive communities in many forms, from book clubs to rugby clubs, and religion seems not only "outgrown" but unnecessary." One final expert (that I'm going to share) said, "Religion has done a poor job generally of answering the difficult questions about the mysteries of human existence and the meaning or purpose of life in the face of a world that has lost its imagination." According to these experts, Christians haven't done much of anything right. And if they're right, that's a shame. Maybe that's why St. Paul encouraged Timothy (and us) to do our best, to become, by the Holy Spirit's power, a worker who needs not be ashamed, rightly sharing God's Word of truth and eternal life. St. Paul was right. All too often, and unfair as it may be, unbelievers judge the Savior by what we His servants do and say. That's why, as we take seriously the job Jesus has entrusted to us, we need to be good mirrors for our Redeemer, doing our best to accurately reflect the gracious sacrifice of the Savior to those "Nones" who constantly are looking for reasons not to need or believe in

itnessing is about Jesus wanting "to have to do with" broken people. It's about Jesus "having to do with" us. That Jesus would want to have to do with us comes as a surprise—as it should. We have rebelled against Him. It's our fault that our spiritual condition is horrible and hopeless. All the pain, suffering, and death in the world is what we deserve, and worse, by our sin we deserve God's judgment, condemnation, and eternal suffering. In order to come to us, Jesus had to empty himself of his glory, power, and majesty to enter into our sinfilled world. In order to help us, He had to endure the judgment, condemnation and death that we deserve. Why would Jesus want anything to do with us? In Mark 5, Jesus sought out the man banished to suffer in the tombs of the Gerasenes, and came to him to bring him relief, set him free from spiritual bondage, to give him a new life. Though the man didn't deserve it, Jesus demonstrated His great love and compassion. Jesus wanted to come to this broken, pathetic, and hopeless man and give him what he so desperately needed but didn't deserve. And the man's surprised response is, "What have You to do with me, Jesus?" Jesus still comes to people. While he comes to us to address our need, He does not come to us because of our great need, but because of His great love and compas**sion.** It's not about us and our brokenness but about His mercy and grace. Jesus wants to have to do with broken people and He comes to them through His witnesses- witnesses who speak the life-giving Word to the broken and hopeless in their everyday lives.

Have you ever tried to tell someone about Jesus but found it difficult to do so? The Every One His Witness program (EOHW www.eohw.org), prepared for the LCMS by Pr. Mark Wood, is an evangelism course that churches and schools are using to teach effective ways on how to speak to others about Jesus using the LASSIE approach: Listen, Ask, Seek, Share, Invite, and Encourage. The newsletter evangelism columns beginning with the Feb 2019 newsletter provides the essentials of the course giving the tools that will help in speaking to others of Jesus. Answers to the Christmas Quiz

- 1. False While December 25 is the traditional date to celebrate Christ's birth in the Western church, it's more likely that Jesus was born in the spring (during lambing season, when shepherds would have been watching their flocks by night on the hillsides). So how did we get to December 25? It may have been an attempt by the church to create a holiday during the dark midwinter. More likely, however, it's counting forward nine months from March 25, the traditional date of Christ's crucifixion (an old tradition held that Christ was conceived and crucified on the same day of the year).
- 2. False The Bible does not mention a star shining on the night Jesus was born. The star is first mentioned in relation to the Wise Men, who may have arrived as much as two years after Jesus' actual birth. While it's possible the star was there, the angels did not mention it to the shepherds as a sign to look for; they were told to look for a child in a manger.
- 3. True Nearly every Nativity set comes with three Wise Men (even though the actual Wise Men didn't arrive until well after Christ's birth). Over the years, they've been given names, nationalities, and stories of their own. But in reality, the Bible simply says that Jesus was visited by a group of Wise Men. The tradition of three comes from the three gifts they brought: gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Maybe there were actually eight, ten, or even more!
- **4. False** While the mean innkeeper is a fixture of Nativity plays, the Greek word kataluma is better translated as "the place where they were staying" rather than "the inn." Joseph is more likely to have looked for a place to stay with relatives. With the town full for the census, you can imagine those relatives squeezing them in to any small space available—a space not large enough to have a baby. So Mary probably gave birth in the main room of a relative's home, a place where domestic animals would be brought in at night for safety and warmth—hence the

We know that Herod the Great, who plays such a role in the Christmas story, died around 4 B.C., giving us the last possible year in which Jesus could have been born (dates B.C. are counted backwards, so 6 B.C. comes before 4 B.C.).

hristmas is coming. It is a joyous time of feasting. The Church feasts upon the Word of God in sermon, song, and sacrament.

We hear the proclamation of the message of the angels: "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord" (Luke 2:10-11). We mingle our voices with theirs as we sing, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased" (Luke 2:14)! We receive the proclaimed Savior, Christ the Lord, not wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in manger but wrapped in bread and wine placed into our mouths for the forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation. We feast in great joy indeed because of this great blessing from our Lord and God.

God's people in ancient Israel also feasted with great joy. The Lord showered His abundant blessing on His people. And He commanded them to feast upon it (Deuteronomy 16). The people were to go to the place appointed, where the Lord would make His name dwell, and give offerings, each man as he was able, according to the blessing of the Lord that He had given them (Deut. 16:10, 15, 17).

And there the Lord would bless them with joy as they feasted upon what the Lord had provided. They ate of the choice parts of their offerings. They enjoyed the company of all the people of God as they together heard His promises of blessing, sang of His bountiful goodness, and partook of what He gave.

We feast on the Word who became flesh to dwell among us, not just during Christmas but throughout all We feast on the Word who became flesh to dwell among us, not just during Christmas but throughout all the year. We feast not just on the salvation He has wrought for us in His Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, but we feast also on all the temporal blessings that God gives out



of His fatherly divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in us. We enjoy the rich bounty that God provides, not only in Word and Sacrament, but also in house and home, property and income, family and friends.

Let us then, as did our brothers in the faith from ancient Israel, give as we are able, according to the blessing of the Lord our God that He has given us. Let us, like them, give generously of the first fruits of our income, which He gives, so that all may know and enjoy the salvation He gives and the joy we have in the Savior born in the city of David, who is Christ the Lord.

- Pastor Brandt and Diana Schwab have both declined to accept payment for playing the organ. We thank the both for sharing their talent with us.


New Business: President Mic Carlson reported the following:
