or quite a while now, I have been writing about the interplay between Christians and politics. And I have to say that it has gotten really old. You don't need me to tell you what's wrong or right with our country. If only I could pack it all in one or two words I would. But here are a few: supply chain problems; inflation the likes of which we haven't experienced for decades; a huge spike in gasoline prices; a pandemic; etc.

I'm sure you could easily add to the list, but I'll stop. In fact, that's precisely the point of this article . . . stop. I want to encourage you to take a Christmas break, perhaps even similar to those you experienced in college that lasted three or four weeks. You see, if you track every issue or problem in our country it seems almost inevitable that you will fret over them. So I want to encourage you to bring the "warrior child" front and center for as long as you can. Instead of allowing your head to be filled with the problems of the day fill your

heart with Jesus. (If this were a sermon I would pause for several seconds to allow you ponder the notion of filling your heart with Jesus.)

Now, the problem is that we can't really do that. Rather, it is the work of the Holy Spirit. But to do that we need to make room for Him (both the Spirit and the Son). And we are in control of how much we allow our heart to be troubled. Recall that



in His Sermon on the Mount Jesus said not to worry about clothing or food. Wow! Does it strike you the way it did me? I worry about what some politicians are doing to our country, and Jesus says not to worry about from whence our next meal will come. My worries pale when held up against those who have little to nothing this season. Surely, I can take time out for a Christmas break.

Now, if I handed this to a bunch of fellow pastors they might *really* take issue with it and accurately state that Christmas doesn't really begin until December 25th, after the season of Advent. Well I am personally declaring a state of emergency and saying "we need a little Christmas, now". Oh, boy do we need a little Christmas to fill our hearts.

If I were to say that what you think about affects the way you feel an entire "army" of counselors would applaud in agreement. So won't you join me in battling this state of emergency by allowing the Holy Spirit to fill your heart with Jesus, starting ASAP? But how? Someone in the counseling realm once

I'm sure the problems we're experiencing in our country will be roughly the same after January 6. It's a little ironic that the season of Epiphany begins that day; a day that has become famous for an entirely different reason. Regardless, we can look at the problems of the day and shrug and perhaps even say to ourselves, "There's nothing new under the sun."

So where do we start? How do we do a therapeutic shrug about the absolute mess that seems to be reigning—almost ruining—our country. In short of a shot-gun style I'll just pour out a few thoughts. Naturally, attending church is one way to have our attention refocused. Advent devotions, just like the good old days, allow the Holy Spirit to enter in. Singing hymns that focus our hearts and mind on the coming Christ will help. Perhaps we need to stop watching the news, or at least stop reacting to it by picturing ourselves as Elvis, who they say literally shot his television.

But here's the controversial part, at least for the more conservative pastors. I say that this year is a good year to break a few rules. (Well, they're actually not rules, just logical guidelines.) To my knowledge Carol would be the winner in this contest, if it were one. Her house is "dressed to the hilt" in Christmas! She has more Christmas trees, more decorations, and the house is more festive than any I've ever seen. And I say "amen!" That's a great way to remind yourself, every day, that we are nearing the celebration of the incarnate God. Myself? I started listening to Christmas music about a week before



Thanksgiving. (Shh! Don't tell anyone.) Yes. I know that those songs aren't exactly Jesus, but they put us in the mood for letting the Lord of Life take center stage on Christmas Eve or Day. "Secular" Christmas-like things aren't harmful, as long as you don't mistake them for religion.

So I even say to use your memory. Remember Christmases you had together as a family. (Right now, I'm thinking of a green bottle shaped in the form of a football and filled with Old Spice aftershave. My older brother gave it to me when I was twelve or thirteen. I didn't even *start* shaving for at least a decade.) My brother died less than two years ago. One way to "baptize" Christmases with those who have died is to remind yourself of such wonderful memories and follow those remembrances with the knowledge that because Jesus was born, lived, died, and rose again we will see those who have died in the faith again.

Oh, there are so many more ways to let this season, and most of all Jesus, fill your heart. Alas, however, I need to stop. So one final thought. Remember that when it seems as though the world is going to hell in a handbasket there was one who's birth bed was in many ways similar to a basket. So live it up! And "have yourself a merry little Christmas." Pastor Anderegg


Every One His Witness

Read Matthew 28:18-20, Jesus' Great Commission

verything that the Lord has ✓ entrusted to you is designed to enable you to be a faithful witness to those he has chosen to belong to His people. Witnessing is your only reason for remaining in this world. The fact that you are still in this world is proof that you still have work to do. What a joyful work it is! You are a priest of the Most High God. He has called, consecrated, and equipped you to join His mission to seek and save those who are lost-those whom he will include in His people. And He has invited you into His joy of gathering them into His light. Many Christians are quite familiar with the Great Commission. We know it as Christ's command to go out into the world and make disciples. In some ways, our familiarity gets in the way of understanding what Jesus was calling us to do when He first gave it to His disciples. On closer examination, it doesn't start out as a command to "go therefore," and it isn't

tion, it doesn't start out as a command to "go therefore," and it isn't given as something that believers take on as a personal goal or mission. The Greek word for "go" is not actually a command but a statement of ongoing action. A better translation would be "as you are going." Jesus wasn't commanding us to go somewhere different than where we are or to people we don't know (though some are called to do this). The "go" is His call for us to witness as an ongoing part of our everyday lives – to people we already know or will come to know – those in our work places, neighborhoods, families, and so on. His mission is to seek and save the lost people whom we know as friends, co-workers, and family members. The Great Commission is a call to join Him in this mission.

n a cold Chicago night, four-year-old Barbara climbed onto her father's lap and asked, "Daddy, why isn't my Mommy just like everybody else's mommy?" Bob May stole a glance across his shabby two-room apartment. On the couch lay his wife, Evelyn, racked with cancer. For two years she had been bedridden and all Bob's income had gone to paying for her treatment. How do you explain cancer, poverty, and differences to a child? A cop-

ywriter for Montgomery Ward, Bob was deep in debt and depressed. Even so, that night he held his daughter near. Then, before he began, Bob prayed, he asked God to give him the words to answer his little girl's question. God gave Bob those words. This is how they came: "Once upon a time there was a reindeer named Rudolph, the only reindeer in the world that had a big red nose. Naturally, people called him, Rudolph, the Red Nosed Reindeer." As Bob went on, he tried to share with little Barbara the knowledge that, even though some people and things are different, God has a purpose for them. Bob's story continued: Rudolph and his family were embarrassed by his condition, and oth-

ers laughed at him. Even so, the time came when Rudolph was called upon to be the point-reindeer for Santa's sleigh. And so, it happened Rudolph became the most famous and beloved of all the reindeer. When Bob was finished, his daughter laughed. Every night Barbara asked for the story to be retold and every night the father repeated the tale of Rudolph. Eventually, Bob's wife died. And once again, Bob turned to God for help. Sitting at his desk in his lonely apartment he worked on "Rudolph." Through his tears, he worked at making the story into a poem, a Christmas gift for his daughter. Barbara loved that story. So did the folks at Montgomery Ward. In 1938 Bob was asked to an employee's Christmas party. He took his poem and read it. And the rest, as they say, is history. 

1 Article Apologetics

The Moral Argument by Allen Quist

from the Reason I Believe
Part 2

Last month's column made the case that a universal moral law must have a lawgiver and that even atheists must appeal to moral law. As the philosopher Immanuel Kant wrote and Christian apologist C. S.



Lewis restated: such a law can't exist without God. If the world consists of nature plus nothing, then the world has no moral component. We would be nothing more than "molecules in motion": chemical reactions governed by the laws of physics – which we know can't exist without God. Guilt would be only guilt feelings: emotions such as love, and admiration would merely be reduced to a feeling of affection. It would be a world where everything is moot and irrelevant: no purpose, meaning or destiny. Ideals such as freedom, loyalty, and good will become mere illusions and good and evil would be reduced to one's own opinion. Morality can't be put into a test tube nor a physics lab to probe what should be or should not be.

probe what should be or should not be. The animal world is not guided by morality. We may not like what lions, bears, mosquitoes do but we don't think their actions to be immoral. Why not? Because only humans are specially guided by moral law. Animals do what is instinctively necessary. We humans know what is right and wrong and govern our lives accordingly. Philosopher and writer Fyodor Dostoevsky said that if there is no God, then everything is permitted, every-thing is lawful. Then there are no rules we are obligated to obey. (Brothers Karamazov, 200) No One to answer to. So it follows: as there can be no laws in a country without a governing body, so also there can be no genuine laws of right and wrong without the governing Supreme Being who made them.

great physician of both body and soul, healed a man with dropsy by His Word on the Sabbath (Luke 14:1–6). Dropsy is a paradoxical ailment, with an unquenchable craving for drink even though the body is over inflated with fluid, a craving that, when indulged, served not to ease but to feed the disease.

And so, if a man drinks a great deal but is never filled, he sees a doctor to inquire about what ails him, what is wrong with his body, and how to remedy it. For that is not thirst but a disease (Seneca, *Consolation to His Mother Helvia*, 11.3).

But if the owner of five couches goes looking for 10, or the owner of 10 tables buys up as many again, and even though he has plenty of land and money, he remains unsatisfied and desires yet more, losing sleep and always in discontent, does he not also require a physician to diagnose the cause of this distress?

For this is not want or lack, it's a disease (Aristippus, quoted in Plutarch, Love of Wealth, 524b). As St. Augustine of Hippo wrote, "we may rightly compare the dropsical man to a covetous rich man: For the more the one is swollen with excess of water, the more he thirsts; so also the other: The more he abounds in riches ... the more eagerly he desires them" (The Sunday Sermons of the Great Fathers, 4:135). Both require physicians. Both require diagnosis and medicine applied from the outside to the inward being. For these are not desires to be fulfilled but diseases to be cured.

This is why our Lord instructs us to not to be consumed by money. "No one can serve two masters ... You cannot serve God and money" (Matt. 6:24; Luke 16:13). Our desire for money, like the dis-

money. "No one can serve two masters ... You cannot serve God and money" (Matt. 6:24; Luke 16:13). Our desire for money, like the disease dropsy, is never satisfied. We always desire more. We think, "If I just had this much then I would be happy."

But even when that much comes, which God gladly gives, happiness evades us. The desire for more is never satisfied. It demands our constant energy, either in procuring more or protecting what we already have. When this happens, God, in His mercy, shows us that the money that He has given is no longer serving us, but we it. We have another master.

To overcome this, we need a physician's diagnosis and a physician's remedy. And our Lord Jesus Christ, our great physician of both body and soul, applies His Word to us as He did to the man healed of dropsy. He shows us how we have put our fear, love, and trust in our money and not feared, loved, and trusted in Him above all things.

In essence, He says, "Stop chasing after these fleeting things. They are vanity. They are the things that moth and rust destroy. You cannot have two masters. Repent!" And in seeing our great error, we are sorry that we have not fully feared, loved, and trusted in God above all things. And, in the mercy and grace that He earned for us on the cross, He takes away this sin, restores us to health, and bids us to live.

But then what? What do we do with this healing balm and care that our great physician has given? Do we simply go back to our old ways? "By no means!" St. Paul says (Rom. 3:31; 6:2). We do not just go back to the old ways, the ways that lead us to death. No, we live a new life, a life filled with the grace, mercy and love of God toward us. And God's great mercy,

Luke 16:13 ESV

So we no longer hoard money and possessions. We no longer scrape and crawl our way to amass more. We give to those around us, as God in Christ has given to us. We press our money and possessions into service for those who need it: our family, our society and our church. For money is God's gift to us to serve us and others. Not the other way around. It serves us because it is a gift from our Father in heaven.

The minutes from the October 12, 2021 meeting were approved as printed.

Financial Secretary: Vicki presented her report. The report was approved and accepted.

Treasurer: Mic Carlson presented the Treasurer's report. The report was accepted and approved.

Elders: no report.

Ushers: The Usher team captains are experienced and basically do the duties of the Head Usher.

Member at Large: No report

Trustees: No report.

Education: Sara reported that we currently only have two Bible studies. Our Sunday morning and the LWML Bible studies. It is her hope to begin a Tuesday morning men's Bible study after the first of the year. Her report was accepted and approved.

Evangelism: Russell reported the following:

- Jeff pointed out that we will need a special voters meeting to approve the final recommendations of the Council on Missions and the Sign Committee..


